ISSUE STATEMENT

In honor of Independence Day on July 4, there will be a recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag, and a reading from the Declaration of Independence and the Bill of Rights.

BACKGROUND

Per City Council Operating Agreements, formal council meetings will begin with a voluntary recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag at those meetings closest to the following holidays: Memorial Day, Veterans Day, Flag Day, and the Fourth of July.

According to the United States Code, Title 4 (U.S. Flag Code), the Pledge "...should be rendered by standing at attention and facing the flag with the right hand over the heart. When not in uniform, men should remove any non-religious headwear with their right hand and hold it at the left shoulder, the hand being over the heart. Persons in uniform should remain silent, face the flag, and render the military salute."

The Pledge is as follows: "I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America, and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

PROCLAMATION

- WHEREAS: Steve Prefontaine rose from humble beginnings to international prominence, and inspired generations of athletes and fans with his relentless pursuit of excellence—never losing an NCAA race in distances from 3 miles to 10,000m during his time at the University of Oregon; and
- WHEREAS: At the time of his passing, Prefontaine held every American distance record from 2,000m to 10,000m, including a 5:01.4 record for 2,000m run in Coos Bay and a 27:43.6 for the 10,000m run in Eugene, showcasing his incomparable talent and unyielding competitiveness; and
- **WHEREAS**: Prefontaine was recognized as the finest American distance runner of his era, and he used his platform to inspire and uplift others, including advocacy for amateur athletes and opportunities for athletes in general; and
- **WHEREAS**: Prefontaine's influence extended far beyond competition—he volunteered with incarcerated individuals, encouraged the public through media interviews, and helped ignite the running boom of the 1970s; and
- **WHEREAS**: Pre's legacy and magnetism endure today, as seen in two feature films about his life, the continuous presence of aspiring athletes at his trail and memorial in Eugene, and the international prominence of the Prefontaine Classic; and
- WHEREAS: May 30, 2025 marked the 50th anniversary of his death; and
- **WHEREAS:** On July 5, Track Town USA and the Oregon Track Club will commemorate Steve Prefontaine's unequaled accomplishments and indelible impact with the 50th edition of the Prefontaine Classic, held every year in his honor since June 7, 1975.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Kaarin Knudson, Mayor of the City of Eugene, Oregon, do hereby proclaim July 5th, 2025 to be

"Steve Prefontaine Day"

in recognition of Steve Prefontaine's extraordinary accomplishments and enduring legacy as an inspiration to runners, athletes, and people of all ages and abilities to do and be their very best.

MINUTES

Eugene City Council Work Session Eugene, Oregon 97401

May 12, 2025 5:30 p.m.

Councilors Present: Eliza Kashinsky, Matt Keating, Alan Zelenka, Jennifer Yeh, Mike Clark, Greg Evans, Lyndsie Leech, and Randy Groves

Mayor Knudson opened the May 12, 2025, work session of the Eugene City Council in a hybrid format at 500 E 4th Avenue, North Building, Eugene OR 97401.

1. Executive Session pursuant to ORS 192.660(2)(f) (ORS 192.355(1) and ORS 192.355(2)) and ORS 192.660(2)(a)

2. WORK SESSION: Police Auditor Selection

Assistant City Manager, Kristie Hammitt, introduced Keri Beraldo, Employee Resource Center Co-Director, to discuss the opportunity to hire a new Police Auditor.

Councilor Discussion:

- Councilor Zelenka noted he was impressed with Mr. Renetzky's background and strong references; stated eagerness to have him join the City as Police Auditor.
- Councilor Groves noted he was impressed with Mr. Renetzky's interview and background investigation results; stated he is comfortable moving forward with the hiring process.
- Councilor Clark noted he is looking forward to having Mr. Renetzky join the organization.
- Councilor Yeh stated she agrees with her colleagues; noted her appreciation for the work of staff throughout this process.
- Councilor Leech noted she is looking forward to working with Mr. Renetzky; stated his qualifications seem well-suited for the role.
- Councilor Zelenka noted his appreciation for former Police Auditor Mark Gissiner for serving as the interim Police Auditor during the recruitment process.

MOTION: Councilor Evans, seconded by Councilor Leech, moved to appoint Craig Renetzky as the Eugene Police Auditor and to authorize the Council President to negotiate an employment agreement with an annual salary that falls within the advertised range of \$125,798 to \$169,811, with final employment agreement approval to be given by Council through the consent agenda prior to its execution. **VOTE: 8:0 PASSED** **IN FAVOR:** Kashinsky, Keating, Zelenka, Yeh, Clark, Evans, Leech, and Groves. **OPPOSED:** None.

3. Work Session: City Manager Recruitment Process (Initial Steps)

Assistant City Manager, Kristie Hammitt, introduced Mia Cariaga, Central Services Director, to discuss process options for the recruitment process.

Councilor Discussion:

- Councilor Zelenka noted the importance of the hiring process for this position; stated the recruitment should be a Council-driven process; cautioned against using a subcommittee of Council for critical decision points; stated he is in favor of option 1; noted a preference to complete the process as quickly as possible.
- Councilor Kashinsky noted that selecting a new city manager is an important decision which requires care; asked about the process options for crafting the job description; clarified what decisions are made by Council during the process; stated her support for a recruitment subcommittee.
- Councilor Groves stated the importance of this hiring decision; spoke in favor of shortening the recruitment timeline if possible; noted he was glad to see community engagement included in the process; asked to include labor units and a survey of employees in the process; stated the important role the media could play during this recruitment in educating the public about the role and responsibilities of a city manager.
- Councilor Clark spoke against forming a recruitment subcommittee; stated the community should have an opportunity to meet the candidates; stated the value of including diverse community groups in the process; noted a preference that the process be shortened to eight to ten months; believes there is a benefit if every Councilor is a part of every step in this process.
- Councilor Keating stated the full Council should be involved in the process; noted this is one of the most important decisions they will make as a Council.
- Councilor Leech stated she does not have a strong preference between options 1 and 2 because the final decisions will come before the full Council; noted not all of Council participated fully in every step of the Police Auditor recruitment; noted the work required for the recruitment process is serious and timeconsuming.
- Councilor Evans noted a small recruitment subcommittee will help expedite the initial steps of the process; suggested Council leadership and at least one other Councilor work to review the Request for Information (RFI) going out to recruitment firms and then review the firms' applications; suggested the subcommittee then present their finding to the full Council; stated all other decisions should be made by the full Council.
- Councilor Yeh stated support for Councilor Evans' approach; noted she does not have strong opinions about the options; stated the Council is a good team and can trust each other to share tasks.
- Councilor Groves stated his support for Councilor Evans' suggestion because it streamlines the initial steps of the process; noted the importance of the full Council interviewing the candidates; noted he has participated in the City

Manager hiring process as an executive manager for the City; suggested an informal mixer with candidates as part of the interview process; stated the importance of the position of City Manager.

- Councilor Zelenka believes a subcommittee would not save time and may lead to more or longer discussions; stated the full Council should weigh in on the position description.
- Councilor Kashinsky noted one benefit of forming a subcommittee of Council is that they can meet outside of Council's regular scheduled meetings; noted for example the subcommittee could meet in August, during Council's regularly scheduled summer break; asked if additional Council meetings would need to be scheduled to speed up the process.
- Councilor Evans believes a subcommittee could narrow the options for recruitment firms through recommendations and it would speed up the process; noted the final decision will still come before the full Council.
- Councilor Zelenka stated his expectation that extra Council meetings will be needed during this process; stated support for a volunteer subcommittee.
- Councilor Clark noted Lane County had recently gone through a similar hiring process; noted the University of Oregon may be able to help in this process.

MOTION: Councilor Evans, seconded by Councilor Leech, moved to proceed with Option 1 as outlined in Attachment A to this AIS, with the additional caveat that Step 1 of the process be made up of Council leadership and any volunteers from Council.

Councilor Discussion:

• Councilor Kashinsky – asked how many Councilors would constitute a quorum.

VOTE: 8:0 PASSED

IN FAVOR: Kashinsky, Keating, Zelenka, Yeh, Clark, Evans, Leech, and Groves. **OPPOSED:** None.

Councilor Discussion:

- Mayor Knudson asked for volunteers for the subcommittee.
- Councilor Keating clarified the meaning of the motion.
- Councilor Zelenka asked if the subcommittee would be making a recommendation on the hiring firm or a decision; asked how many firms the committee intends to recommend.
- Mayor Knudson asked to confirm that Councilors Zelenka, Yeh, Evans, and Leech will serve on the subcommittee; asked if she had a role on the subcommittee; noted she would be happy to volunteer if needed.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:35 p.m.

Mayor Knudson opened the June 11, 2025, Eugene City Council Work Session in a virtual format.

1. WORK SESSION: City Manager Update

City Manager, Sarah Medary, provided updates on the federal funding landscape and current grant-funded projects in the City.

Councilor Discussion:

- Councilor Kashinsky asked what policy changes are being requested in federal grants that the City of Eugene cannot meet; stated the community holds strong values around inclusion; asked if diversity, equity and inclusion laws are part of long-standing federal laws protecting certain classes; asked if policy discussions would be held at Council before any changes are made to comply with federal guidelines that may contradict the City's policies against discrimination; asked if there have been challenging impacts or requests made by the federal administration outside of the federal grants process.
- Mayor Knudson asked staff to list the four airport projects impacted by delays in receiving federal funds; asked staff to confirm whether half of the federal funds on hold are for airport projects and the other half are throughout the City in projects related to infrastructure improvements and housing.
- Councilor Evans asked how funding delays may jeopardize the execution and implementation of projects; noted the City will need to communicate with partners regarding delays due to federal funding being held back.

City Manager, Sarah Medary, provided updates on other federal funding impacts to various grant projects in Lane County and at Lane Community College and the University of Oregon.

• Councilor Evans – asked if Council could receive regular updates on the local and financial impacts of federal actions.

- Councilor Groves noted confidence in the City Manager's ability to bring important matters to the Council.
- Councilor Keating asked how the City is communicating with the community regarding the paused status of projects slated to receive federal funds.
- Councilor Evans noted the City cannot remove Avelo Airlines from the Eugene Airport; asked if there is a plan for short- or long-term protests regarding deportations and other federal actions; asked if there is a plan in place to address any potential bad actors in the protests.
- Mayor Knudson noted there may be significant impacts to Lane County Public Health and emergency services with the continuation of funding freezes; asked staff how the City can collaborate with agency partners to provide information to the community regarding the services that may be impacted or become unavailable.
- Councilor Yeh noted appreciation for the way that staff are providing facts and status updates; stated that communication to the public about impacts is an important role for the City to address.

ISSUE STATEMENT

This is an action item to appoint a member to the Metropolitan Wastewater Management Commission (MWMC).

BACKGROUND

The Metropolitan Wastewater Management Commission is an intergovernmental partnership of the City of Eugene, City of Springfield, and Lane County to provide regional wastewater collection and treatment services for about 280,000 community members in the metropolitan region. The governing body for the Metropolitan Wastewater Management Commission is comprised of seven members, including two from the City of Springfield, two from Lane County, and three from the City of Eugene. Of the seven members, each agency has one elected-official member (Councilor Yeh is the current elected representative for Eugene). The remaining four members are appointed to the Metropolitan Wastewater Management Commission and are referred to as citizen representatives or citizen members.

Eugene's Citizen members are nominated by the Mayor and appointed by the Council. The citizen members serve for three-year terms and/or at the pleasure of the governing body appointing that member and may serve for as many terms as determined by the governing body.

Peter Ruffier, a citizen member representing City of Eugene, stepped down from service on May 13, 2025. This appointment will fulfill the rest of the term of a Eugene Citizen Representative spot on the MWMC until January 31, 2027 in accordance with the MWMC Bylaws.

The MWMC opened the application process for two weeks beginning on May 12, 2025. Staff received one application, from Dawn Lesley. Dawn Lesley is a licensed engineer with over 30 years of experience in municipal water and wastewater utility engineering. Additionally, she has represented the community on multiple local boards and commissions. Mayor Knudson nominated Dawn Lesley to serve out the remainder of the term as a Eugene citizen representative on the Metropolitan Wastewater Management Commission.

RELATED CITY POLICIES

The <u>City of Eugene Strategic Plan</u> outlines direction and organizational priorities for the 2023-2026 period. The strategic plan identifies four key focus areas: Urgent Community Needs, Culture of Belonging, Communication and Outreach, and Organizational Wellbeing.

This recruitment process aligns with the Culture of Belonging focus area strategic goal: Strengthen relationships with the whole community, with emphasis on the inclusion of the most marginalized groups.

High Impact Action: Increase engagement efforts with people from the most marginalized groups to increase participation from these groups on boards, commissions, panels, and other City-sponsored entities.

BYLAWS OF THE

METROPOLITAN WASTEWATER MANAGEMENT COMMISSION

ARTICLE 1. Establishment

The Metropolitan Wastewater Management Commission has been officially established through the authority of the Metropolitan Wastewater Management Commission Agreement, dated February 9, 1977, signed by the governing bodies of Eugene, Springfield, and Lane County.

ARTICLE II. Purposes and Objectives

The purposes and objectives of this Commission shall be to provide sewerage on a unified basis for the projected Eugene-Springfield metropolitan area. The Commission may take any action necessary or convenient to perform its functions and duties as specified in the establishing agreement. The Commission's responsibility as set forth in the establishing agreement includes, but is not necessarily limited to, the following:

- (a) To construct, operate, and maintain regional sewerage facilities as described in Appendix "A" of the establishing agreement;
- (b) To recommend the boundaries of a county service district to the Lane County Commissioners;
- (c) To compensate Springfield and Eugene for existing sewerage facilities as defined in Appendix "A" of the establishing agreement;
- (d) To salvage abandoned sewerage facilities;
- (e) To implement a financing plan, based on the financing criteria described in Appendix "B" of the establishing agreement, an annual budget, and an annual financial statement for regional sewerage facilities;
- (f) To adopt a schedule of sewer service charges and connection charges for regional sewer services;
- (g) To establish billing and collection systems, if necessary, in locations where such systems are not provided by others;
- To contract with Eugene, Springfield, and Lane County for operation and maintenance of the regional sewerage facilities and for other services as necessary;
- (i) To contract for consultant services;

- (j) To provide service only to Eugene, Springfield, and Lane County;
- (k) To comply with State and Federal standards;
- (I) To adopt minimum uniform standards for pretreatment requirements for industrial and other wastes as necessary;
- (m) To adopt minimum standards for construction and maintenance of local sewage collection systems; and
- (n) To plan and make recommendations to Eugene, Springfield, and Lane County for expansion and improvement of regional sewerage facilities.

ARTICLE III. Membership and Voting

- Section 1. The Commission shall consist of seven voting members.
- Section 2. Each of the governing bodies shall appoint to the Commission one elected official of the governing body.
- Section 3. The City Council of Eugene shall appoint two additional members to the Commission. The City Council of Springfield and the Lane County Commissioners shall each appoint one additional member to the Commission.
- Section 4. Members of the Commission shall serve for three-year terms and/or at the pleasure of the governing body appointing that member. Commission members may serve for as many terms as determined by the governing body.
- Section 5. Notwithstanding the terms of office specified, the members first appointed to the Commission shall serve for terms as determined by the following:
 - (a) The elected officials who are appointed to the Commission shall serve for terms determined as follows:
 - (1) Eugene's representative shall serve for a term ending on February 1, 1978.
 - (2) Springfield's representative shall serve for a term ending on February 1, 1979.
 - (3) Lane County's representative shall serve for a term ending on February 1, 1980.
 - (b) The remaining Commission members shall serve for terms determined by the following: Restated MWMC Bylaws

- (1) Lane County's representative shall serve for a term ending on February 1, 1978.
- (2) One Eugene representative, as designated by the Eugene City Council, shall serve for a term ending on February 1, 1979.
- (3) Springfield's representative and Eugene's remaining representative shall serve for a term ending on February 1, 1980.
- ARTICLE IV. Meetings of the Commission
 - Section 1. Regular meetings of the Commission shall be held at least monthly in a location and at a time specified in advance of said meetings. Regular meetings may be held more frequently, as necessary.
 - Section 2. Special meetings of the Commission may be called by the President of the Commission. Notice of any special meeting of the Commission, setting forth the time, location and purpose thereof, shall be given at least twenty-four hours prior thereto by personal contact or by mail to each member.
 - Section 3. Five members of the Commission shall constitute a quorum, provided that at least one member appointed by each governing body is present. Decisions of the Commission shall require a majority vote of the entire membership unless otherwise provided in the establishing agreement or these bylaws.
 - Section 4. Each member shall be entitled to one vote on all issues presented at meetings at which the member is present.
 - Section 5. Commission members shall be entitled to vote through any designated alternate, but not by proxy.
 - Section 6. All meetings shall be conducted in accordance with "Robert's Rules of Order."
 - Section 7. Members may attend meetings and cast votes via telephone or similar communications equipment, provided that arrangements are made to enable all persons participating in the meeting to hear each other and that allow the public to listen to all communications made over the telephone when required by law.

ARTICLE V. Officers and Duties

Section 1. The members of the Commission shall elect a President, who shall preside at all meetings, and a Vice-President, who shall perform the duties of the President in the latter's absence.

- Section 2. The officers, with the exception of those first elected, shall be elected annually at the first meeting in March.
- Section 3. A member of the Commission's staff shall attend all meetings, keep minutes of the meetings, and be the custodian of the Commission records.
- Section 4. The Commission will adopt all administrative rules and policy statements through a formal resolution process.
- ARTICLE VI. Hearings Procedure and Notice Requirements
 - Section 1. The Commission is adopting procedures and notice requirements governing the conduct of hearings pursuant for complaints from property owners who are aggrieved (hereinafter "Appellant") by any of the following:
 - (a) Rule of the Commission;
 - (b) Sewerage rules, regulations, policies, or practices of Eugene, Springfield, or Lane County; and
 - (c) Any aspect of the sewerage operations of Eugene, Springfield, or Lane County.

The procedures are intended to promote a hearing process that is simple, efficient, and expeditious for all parties. The Commission encourages informal resolution of complaints. The Commission, the Commission's Executive Officer, or a designee of the Commission's Executive Officer may appoint a hearings official to conduct hearings and report recommended findings and conclusions to the Commission.

- Section 2. A Request for Hearing must be submitted to the Commission as follows:
 - (a) A Request for Hearing in the form attached hereto as Attachment 1, or as specified by the Commission's Executive Officer or a designee of the Commission's Executive Officer, must be completed and signed by Appellant;
 - (b) A copy of the decision being appealed must be included with the Request for Hearing; or, if applicable, a concise description of the rule, regulation, policy, practice, or aspect of sewerage operation that Appellant is aggrieved by must be included with the Request for Hearing;
 - (c) If oral argument before the Commission or hearings official is desired by Appellant, it must be requested at time of filing or it will be waived, unless requested by either the Commission or any other party;

- (d) Failure to file the Request for Hearing with all required information may result in dismissal;
- (e) A hearing date will be set by the Commission's Executive Officer, a designee of the Commission's Executive Officer, or the hearings official if one is appointed. Unless otherwise mutually agreed to by all parties and approved by the Commission's Executive Officer, a designee of the Commission's Executive Officer, or the hearings official, the hearing date will generally be within 60 days of the date of filing the Request for Hearing;
- (f) The Request for Hearing and all required information must be filed (received by the Commission at its office at 225 Fifth Street, Springfield, OR 97477) no later than 5:00 p.m. on the last day set for appeal by any applicable provisions of the Eugene Code, Springfield Code, or Lane County Code; and
- (g) The Commission's Executive Officer, a designee of the Commission's Executive Officer, or the hearings official if one is appointed shall generally provide at least 15 days prior written notice of the hearing to each party and such notice shall include whether the hearing will be before a hearings official or the Commission.
- Section 3. Written submissions to the Commission or hearings official shall comply with the following:
 - (a) Appellant's initial brief, and any documentary evidence, must be filed within 14 days of the date Appellant filed the Request for Hearing;
 - (b) Respondent's brief (including a request for oral argument), if any, and any documentary evidence, must be filed within 14 days of the date Appellant's brief was filed;
 - (c) Appellant's reply brief, if any, must be filed within 7 days of the date that Respondent's brief was filed;
 - (d) Copies of all briefs must be served on all other parties on the day of filing; and
 - (e) Brief length may be limited by the Commission's Executive Officer, a designee of the Commission's Executive Officer, or the hearings official.
- Section 4. Oral argument, if requested, shall be conducted by the Commission or the hearings official as follows:
 - (a) Appellant may first present oral argument;

- (b) Respondent may present oral argument;
- (c) Appellant may rebut Respondent's oral argument;
- (d) Oral argument may be limited by the Commission or the hearings official;
- (e) The hearing shall be an informal hearing: the rules of evidence shall not apply, and neither witnesses nor cross-examination of other parties shall be allowed unless ordered by the Commission, the Commission's Executive Officer, a designee of the Commission's Executive Officer, or the hearings official; and
- (f) The hearing may be adjourned from time to time by the Commission or the hearings official if necessary.
- Section 5. (a) The Commission or the hearings official may make summary determination on all or part of the appeal at any time;
 - (b) The Commission shall issue a written decision. The decision shall generally be issued within the time set by any applicable provisions of the Eugene Code, Springfield Code, or Lane County Code;
 - (c) The Commission or the hearings official may decide that the Commission has no basis to make the requested determination or make a recommendation;
 - (d) The Commission, the Commission's Executive Officer or the hearings official may dismiss the Appellant's Request for Hearing for failure to comply with these procedures; and
 - (e) The Commission, the Commission's Executive Officer or the hearings official may modify any of the above procedures for good cause shown or when the interests of justice so require.

ARTICLE VII. Budgetary Procedures

As soon as practicable, the Commission shall adopt within these bylaws procedures and standards for governing the preparation of an annual and supplemental budgets.

ARTICLE VIII. Central Office

Written notice of proposed amendments and the nature thereof shall have been given to the membership of the Commission at least seven days prior to the date of the meeting at which the amendments are to be considered.

Oregon Local Budget Law (ORS 294.471) allows for supplemental budgets in the event of "an occurrence or condition that is not ascertained when preparing the original budget or a previous supplemental budget for the current year or current budget period and that requires a change in financial planning." ORS 294.471 also allows for a supplemental budget if there are, "funds that are made available by another unit of federal, state or local government and the availability of which could not reasonably be foreseen when preparing the original budget or a previous supplemental budget for the current year or current budget period." This supplemental budget does not authorize any increase in the property tax levy and has been published in compliance with the Oregon Local Budget Law.

BACKGROUND

This fourth supplemental budget of the 2023-2025 biennium recognizes new revenue, authorizes other unanticipated changes in legal appropriations, and includes one-time funding for strategic initiatives. A summary of items included in this supplemental budget is presented below.

Appropriations are organized by the <u>City of Eugene Strategic Plan</u> Key Focus Areas. The strategic plan provides overall direction and organizational focus for the 2023-2026 period and was approved by Council on July 26, 2023. The plan is designed to position the organization to focus on issues identified by the community and organization as top priorities, and provides guidance for our programs and services, while also recognizing resource constraints. Key Focus Areas include Urgent Community Needs, Culture of Belonging, Communication and Outreach, and Organizational Wellbeing.

Changes to Non-General Funds are also included in this supplemental budget. The largest component of the Non-General Fund supplemental budget items is for grants and revenue-backed requests, which fund new and existing projects. One-time requests and administrative adjustments are also included for items that were not anticipated at the time of budget adoption. See Attachment B for details on Non-General Fund requests.

RELATED CITY POLICIES

Supplemental budget items are related to the <u>2023-2026 Strategic Plan</u> focus areas Organizational Wellbeing and Urgent Community Needs.

PREVIOUS COUNCIL DIRECTION

The supplemental budget includes some budget changes as a result of previous Council direction and discussion. Some of the recent Council meetings that have resulted in supplemental budget appropriations include, but are not limited to:

June 26, 2023, Meeting

City Council held a public hearing and took action to adopt the 2023-2025 Biennial Budget for the City of Eugene as recommended by the Budget Committee, that includes motions made by the Budget Committee and City Council, and the Capital Carryover and Reserve for Encumbrance.

Councilor Groves, seconded by Councilor Keating, moved to approve Resolution Electing to Receive State Revenue Sharing Funds Pursuant to Section 221.770 of Oregon Revised Statutes. Passed 8:0 Councilor Groves, seconded by Councilor Keating, moved to approve a Resolution Adopting the Budget, with the Addition of the City Manager's Proposal to Add \$160,000 to the Community Safety Payroll Tax Fund for Prevention and Youth Related Programming and Materials, and Making Appropriations for the City of Eugene for the Biennium Beginning July 1, 2023, and Ending June 30, 2025. *Passed 8:0*

Councilor Clark, seconded by Councilor Yeh, moved to amend the 2023-2025 Budget to move \$50,000 from the Road Fund to the Transportation Capital Project Fund to provide funding for a traffic calming project on Holly Avenue between Gilham and Norkenzie roads. *Passed 8:0*

December 11, 2023, Meeting

City Council held a public hearing and took action on the 2023-2025 Biennium December Supplemental Budget:

Councilor Groves, seconded by Councilor Keating, moved to adopt a resolution adopting a supplemental budget; making appropriations for the City of Eugene for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023 and ending June 30, 2025. *Passed 7:0 (Absent: Councilor Leech)*

May 13, 2024, Work Session

Council directed the City Manager to schedule a public hearing for an ordinance concerning charges for stormwater and parks service and amending Section 6.406 of the Eugene Code, 1971 with the following motion:

Councilor Keating, seconded by Councilor Groves moved to direct the City Manager to schedule a public hearing on an ordinance amending the definition of "stormwater service" to add the operation and maintenance of city-owned parks and open space as set out in Attachment A to this AIS.

Passed 7:1 (Opposed by Councilor Clark)

June 17, 2024, Meeting

Council held a public hearing for an ordinance concerning charges for stormwater and parks service and amending Section 6.406 of the Eugene Code, 1971. One person testified on behalf of the Eugene Chamber of Commerce Local Government Affairs Council which did not take a formal position on the ordinance.

June 24, 2024, Meeting

The City Council approved the second supplemental budget for the 2023-2025 biennium. Actions included General Fund Budget Gap Strategies and other one-time items.

Councilor Groves, seconded by Councilor Zelenka, moved to adopt a resolution adopting a Supplemental Budget; making appropriations for the City of Eugene for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023 and ending June 30, 2025. *Passed 7:0 (Absent: Councilor Evans)*

Also during this meeting the City Council took action to expand the definition of "stormwater service" to add the operation and maintenance of city-owned parks and open spaces. Councilor Groves, seconded by Councilor Zelenka, moved to adopt an Ordinance amending Section 6.406 of the Eugene Code, 1971 as set forth in Attachment A in the AIS. *Passed 5:2 (Opposed: Councilors Semple and Clark, Absent: Councilor Evans)*

October 14, 2024, Meeting

The City Council, acting as the Urban Renewal Agency (URA) Board, approved the purchase of the North Butterfly Lot and the 8th and Pearl Lot and transfer ownership from the City to the URA: Councilor Groves, seconded by Councilor Zelenka, moved to offer to purchase the North Butterfly Lot for \$1,060,000 and the 8th and Pearl Lot for \$1,020,000 from the City of Eugene and direct the Agency Director to include \$210,000 from the Downtown Urban Renewal District and \$170,000 from the Riverfront Urban Renewal District for these purchases in the December 2024 Supplemental Budget and take all necessary actions to acquire the properties.

Passed 7:0 (Absent: Councilor Keating)

December 9, 2024, Meeting

The City Council approved the third supplemental budget for the 2023-2025 biennium: Councilor Keating, seconded by Councilor Groves moved to adopt a resolution adopting a Supplemental Budget; making appropriations for the City of Eugene for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023 and ending June 30, 2025. *Passed: 8:0*

COUNCIL OPTIONS

Particular requests requiring more information or discussion may be removed from the supplemental budget and delayed for action in a future supplemental budget in the next biennium. In certain cases, there may be a financial or legal impact to delaying budget approval. These impacts may include Oregon Local Budget Law violations due to exceeding the legal appropriation levels. Council may also adopt amended appropriation amounts or funding sources for specific requests in the supplemental budget.

CITY MANAGER'S RECOMMENDATION

The City Manager recommends approval of the resolution in Attachment D adopting the fourth supplemental budget for the 2023-2025 biennium.

SUGGESTED MOTION

Move to adopt a resolution adopting a supplemental budget; making appropriations for the City of Eugene for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023 and ending June 30, 2025.

Special Events Reimbursable Overtime: Recognizes \$320,000 in reimbursement revenue and associated Police overtime expenses incurred during special events in FY25, including support during football games and at the Lane County Fair.

Comprehensive Plan Update Grant: Recognizes \$166,000 in state grant funding related to the Planning and Development Department's Transportation Growth Management (TGM) program. The TGM program supports better integration of transportation and land use planning through updates to the City's Community Engagement, Housing, and Compact Development chapters of the Comprehensive Plan.

Hult Center Increased Activity: Provides \$1,500,000 to recognize additional revenue in the Cultural Services Subfund (031) for the Library, Recreation and Cultural Services department for expenses at the Hult Center. This is due to increased activity above what was projected in the 2023-2025 Adopted Budget.

Senior Alternative Response Unit: Recognizes \$308,000 in state grant funding in the Ambulance Transport Fund (592) for the Fire and Emergency Medical Services department to support a Senior Response Unit (SRU). The SRU will respond to calls from Senior Care Facilities that do not require transport to the hospital. The SRU supports the balance of calls to the right services, making engines and ambulances available for other call response.

State Wildfire Response Reimbursement: Recognizes \$11,000 in the Community Safety Payroll Tax Fund (136) and \$5,000 in the Ambulance Transport Fund (592) for reimbursement revenue and associated expenses from the state wildfire responses in 2024. Eugene Fire and Emergency Medical Response staff responded to 10 wildfires in 2024. *Healthcare Preparedness Program (HPP) Grant Amendment:* Recognizes an additional \$8,000 in state grant funding in the Ambulance Transport Fund (592) for Fire and Emergency Medical Services department appropriations to replace materials and supplies in the Emergency Response Trailer.

Police Radio Loan Repayment: Provides \$360,000 in the Telecom Registration & Licensing Fund (135) to repay an interfund loan from the Fleet Fund (616). In FY18, the Fleet Fund loaned \$1,200,000 to purchase Police radios. This Supplemental Budget was published in accordance with ORS 294.471(3).

Section 4.

This resolution complies with ORS 294.471(4), and does not authorize an increase in the levy of property taxes above the amount in the Adopted Budget publication.

ISSUE STATEMENT

This meeting is to conduct a public hearing and take action to adopt the 2025-2027 Biennial Budget for the City of Eugene. Oregon Local Budget Law requires the City to conduct a public hearing to receive testimony on the 2025-2027 Biennial Budget for the City of Eugene as recommended by the Budget Committee and on the proposed uses of the State Revenue Sharing funds. Resolutions electing to receive State Revenue Sharing funds and certifying that the City of Eugene provides municipal services required for receipt of state-shared revenues are also required in order to continue receiving those funds under ORS 221.760 and 221.770. Finally, ORS 294.456 requires the City Council to pass resolutions adopting the biennial budget and making appropriations, and determining, levying and categorizing the ad valorem property taxes for the next fiscal year.

BACKGROUND

The City Council has consistently met the provision of the Oregon Local Budget Law which requires that a jurisdiction adopts a budget by June 30. If a jurisdiction elects to receive State Revenue Sharing funds, it also must hold a public hearing on the proposed uses of the funds and adopt resolutions or ordinances electing to receive the funds and certifying that the City provides qualifying municipal services.

Financial and Resource Considerations

Financial and resource considerations are detailed in the 2025-2027 Amendments to the Proposed Budget and in the 2025-2027 Proposed Budget document, available at <u>www.eugene-or.gov/budget</u>, and in the Budget Committee meeting materials, which are available at <u>https://www.eugene-or.gov/3384/Budget-Committee-Webcasts</u>.

2025-2027 Amendments to the Proposed Budget and Budget Committee Recommendation

The City Manager presented the 2025-2027 Amendments to the Proposed Biennial Budget, a set of budget changes that modify the 2025-2027 Proposed Budget, to the Budget Committee for consideration on April 30, 2025. The Budget Committee's review of the 2025-2027 Biennial Budget consisted of four meetings held on April 30, May 14, May 21, and May 28. A public comment period was held at the May 14 and May 21 meetings, and a public hearing was held at the May 28 meeting.

Prior to Budget Committee action on May 28, the City Manager modified the 2025-2027 Amended Proposed Budget to include City Council direction from their May 21 work session. These changes include raising the stormwater rate to collect an additional \$4.7 million annually to fund parks and open space expenditures in the stormwater fund and allocate funds as set forth in the Modified Budget Allocation Table included in Attachment A, Exhibit A.

The Budget Committee recommendation consists of the City Manager's 2025-2027 Amended Proposed Biennial Budget that has been modified with Budget Committee amendments.

The Budget Committee's final recommendation, approved on May 28, 2025, is as follows:

Move that the Budget Committee recommend to the Eugene City Council the 2025-2027 Budget for the City of Eugene that consists of the City Manager's Amended Proposed 2025-2027 Budget that has been modified to include City Council direction from the May 21, 2025, Council Work Session and the City Manager's recommended allocation of that funding to: to raise the stormwater rate to collect an additional \$4.7 million annually to fund moving \$4.7 million in parks and open space expenditures to the stormwater fund and allocate funds as set forth in the document identified as the Modified Budget Allocation Table. Including updated property tax levies and/or rates, amended to reflect appropriations for prior year encumbrances and prior year capital projects with the following amendments:

 Move to recommend the City Manager include in the long-term financial stability conversation by the Council potential ongoing funding for programs that are currently funded with one-time funds in the City Manager's budget proposal, including Homeless Services Program Transition, Downtown Clean Up and Beautification, Alternative Response Transition, Central Services Communications and the Sustainability Program. Passed: 11, 3

Opposed: Councilor M. Clark, Councilor M. Keating, M. Mann **Absent**: Councilor G. Evans, J. Maldonado

Move to recommend the City Council direct the City Manager to investigate how the alternative response program with CAHOOTS-like services could be provided and identify potential sources of funding for approximately \$2.2 million annually, including potentially reallocating existing Community Safety Payroll Tax funds, and bring back the results before the end of October.

 Opposed: M. Mann
 Absent: Councilor G. Evans, J. Maldonado

The additional motions passed by the Budget Committee were procedural in nature, and do not have a financial impact on the 2025-2027 budget.

The Budget Committee recommendation includes appropriations for prior budget period encumbrances and estimated unexpended capital project funds. Encumbrance carryover is for operating budget items contracted for, but not expended, in the 2023-2025 biennium. Capital project carryover is for capital appropriations that are estimated to remain unexpended at the end of the 2023-2025 biennium. A summary of the Budget Committee changes to the 2025-2027 Proposed Biennial Budget is provided in Attachment A.

State Revenue Sharing

The 2025-2027 estimated revenues from State Revenue Sharing for the two-year period are \$4,107,000. The proposed use of these revenues is to support General Fund services. Attachment B includes the resolution requesting state revenue sharing funds, and Attachment C certifies that the City provides the services required in order to receive state revenue sharing funds. State Revenue Sharing must be requested and certified each budget period via a resolution.

Determining Tax Amount for Fiscal Year 2026

Under Oregon Local Budget Law, Council must determine the ad valorem property tax levy to be certified each fiscal year. This resolution is included in Attachment D.

Timing

Under Oregon Local Budget Law, the City of Eugene budget must be adopted by June 30, 2025, and copies of the adopting resolutions must be filed with the Lane County Assessor by July 15, 2025. Additionally, the City must elect to receive State Revenue Sharing funds and file a copy of the corresponding resolution with the State of Oregon Department of Administrative Services by July 31, 2025.

Other Background Information

The 2025-2027 Amendments to the Proposed Budget, 2025-2027 Proposed Budget, and Budget Committee meeting materials and budget motions are available on the City's website at: <u>www.eugene-or.gov/budget</u>.

RELATED CITY POLICIES

The <u>City of Eugene Strategic Plan</u> outlines direction and organizational priorities for the 2023-2026 period. City of Eugene biennial budget adoption aligns with the Organizational Wellbeing focus area.

COUNCIL OPTIONS

After the public hearing on the 2025-2027 Biennial Budget, as recommended by the Budget Committee, the City Council may make changes to the budget. The City Council may reduce budgeted appropriations in any fund by any amount, as long as resources and requirements remain in balance. No additional process steps are required when appropriations are reduced by the City Council. The City Council may also increase budgeted appropriations. Per ORS 294.456, no additional procedural steps are required if the estimated expenditures for each fund in a biennial budget are not increased by more than \$10,000 or 10 percent of the appropriations recommended by the Budget Committee, whichever is greater. However, if the appropriations in any fund are increased by more than those limits, the City Council must publish a revised budget notice and hold another public hearing before the adjusted budget can be adopted. Due to the timing requirements associated with the budget notice publication, the last option would effectively not be possible, assuming adoption of the 2025-2027 Biennial Budget by June 30, 2025.

If the City Council decides to amend the 2025-2027 budget resolutions, the motion must contain specific appropriation line(s) being altered in the resolution, and each motion must be self-balancing, meaning that a resource and a requirement must exactly offset each other.

CITY MANAGER'S RECOMMENDATION

The City Manager recommends passage of the two State Revenue Sharing resolutions, the resolution determining the City's ad valorem property tax, and the resolution adopting the Budget Committee's recommended budget for the City of Eugene.

SUGGESTED MOTIONS

Move to approve a Resolution electing to receive State Revenue Sharing funds pursuant to Section 221.770 of Oregon Revised Statutes.

AND

Move to approve a Resolution certifying that the City of Eugene provides the municipal services required by Oregon Revised Statues Section 221.760.

AND

Move to approve a Resolution determining, levying and categorizing the annual ad valorem property tax levy for the City of Eugene for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2026.

AND

Including updated property tax levies and/or rates, amended to reflect appropriations for prior year encumbrances and prior year capital projects with the following amendments:

- 1. Move to recommend the City Manager include in the long-term financial stability conversation by the Council potential ongoing funding for programs that are currently funded with one-time funds in the City Manager's budget proposal, including Homeless Services Program Transition, Downtown Clean Up and Beautification, Alternative Response Transition, Central Services Communications and the Sustainability Program.
- 2. Move to recommend the City Council direct the City Manager to investigate how the alternative response program with CAHOOTS-like services could be provided and identify potential sources of funding for approximately \$2.2 million annually, including potentially reallocating existing Community Safety Payroll Tax funds, and bring back the results before the end of October.

ISSUE STATEMENT

This meeting is to conduct a public hearing and take action to adopt the 2025-2027 Biennial Budget for the Urban Renewal Agency (URA) of the City of Eugene. Oregon Local Budget Law requires the Board of the URA (Agency Board) to conduct a public hearing to receive testimony on the 2025-2027 URA Biennial Budget as recommended by the Budget Committee. ORS 294.456 requires the Agency Board to pass resolutions adopting the biennial budget and making appropriations, and declaring the amount of tax to be certified for the next fiscal year.

BACKGROUND

The Agency Board has consistently met the provision of the Oregon Local Budget Law which requires that a jurisdiction adopts a budget by June 30.

Financial and Resource Considerations

Financial and resource considerations are detailed in the 2025-2027 Proposed Biennial Budget document, available at <u>www.eugene-or.gov/budget</u>, and in the Budget Committee meeting materials, which are available at <u>www.eugene-or.gov/budgetcommittee</u>.

Budget Committee Recommendation

The Budget Committee's final recommendation on the 2025-2027 URA budget, approved on May 28, 2025, is as follows:

Move that the Budget Committee recommend to the Eugene City Council, acting as the Urban Renewal Agency Board of Directors, the 2025-2027 Budget for the Eugene Urban Renewal Agency that consists of the City Manager's 2025-2027 Amended Proposed Budget, including the property tax levies and/or rates contained therein, amended to reflect appropriations for prior year encumbrances and prior year capital projects.

The Budget Committee recommendation includes appropriations for prior budget period encumbrances and estimated unexpended capital project funds. Encumbrance carryover is for operating budget items contracted for, but not expended, in the 2023-2025 biennium. Capital project carryover is for capital appropriations that are estimated to remain unexpended at the end of the 2023-2025 biennium. A summary of the Budget Committee changes to the 2025-2027 URA Proposed Biennial Budget is provided in Attachment A.

Certifying Taxes Annually

Under Oregon Local Budget Law, the Agency Board must declare the amount of taxes to be certified each fiscal year. This resolution is included in Attachment B.

Timing

Under Oregon Local Budget Law, the URA budget must be adopted by June 30, 2025, and copies of the adopting resolutions must be filed with the Lane County Assessor by July 15, 2025.

Other Background Information

The 2025-2027 Proposed Biennial Budget document, Budget Committee meeting materials and Budget Committee 2025-2027 budget motions are available on the City's website at <u>www.eugene-or.gov/budget</u>.

RELATED CITY POLICIES

The <u>City of Eugene Strategic Plan</u> outlines direction and organizational priorities for the 2023-2026 period. Urban Renewal Agency biennial budget adoption aligns with the Organizational Wellbeing focus area.

AGENCY BOARD OPTIONS

After the public hearing on the 2025-2027 URA biennial budget as recommended by the Budget Committee has been held, the Agency Board may make changes to the 2025-2027 biennial budget. The Board may reduce budgeted appropriations in any fund by any amount, as long as resources and requirements remain in balance. No additional process steps are required when appropriations are reduced by the Board.

Budgeted appropriations may also be increased by the Board. If the total appropriation increase in any of the reporting funds is less than \$10,000 or 10 percent of the fund's appropriations as recommended by the Budget Committee, whichever is greater, then no additional process steps are required. However, if the appropriations in any fund are increased by more than those limits, the Agency Board must publish a revised budget notice and hold another public hearing before the adjusted budget can be adopted. Due to the timing requirements associated with the budget notice publication, the last option would effectively not be possible, assuming adoption of the 2025-2027 biennial budget by June 30, 2025.

If the Agency Board decides to amend the 2025-2027 budget resolutions, the motion must contain specific appropriation line(s) being altered in the resolution, and each motion must be self-balancing, meaning that a resource and a requirement must exactly offset each other.

AGENCY DIRECTOR'S RECOMMENDATION

The Agency Director recommends passage of the resolution declaring the amount of tax to be certified by the Urban Renewal Agency, and the resolution adopting the Budget Committee's recommended budget for the Urban Renewal Agency.

SUGGESTED MOTIONS

• Move to approve a Resolution of the Urban Renewal Agency of the City of Eugene declaring the amount of tax to be certified for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2026.

AND

• Move to approve a Resolution of the Urban Renewal Agency of the City of Eugene adopting the budget and making appropriations for the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2027.

A RESOLUTION OF THE URBAN RENEWAL AGENCY OF THE CITY OF EUGENE DECLARING THE AMOUNT OF TAX TO BE CERTIFIED FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING JULY 1, 2025, AND ENDING JUNE 30, 2026.

The Urban Renewal Agency Board of the City of Eugene finds that:

A. The Urban Renewal Plan for the Downtown Urban Renewal District (the "Downtown Urban Renewal Plan") was initially adopted on July 3, 1968, by Resolution No. 257 of the Urban Renewal Agency of the City of Eugene (the "Agency"), and on December 19, 1968, by Resolution No. 1609 of the Eugene City Council. The Downtown Urban Renewal Plan has subsequently been amended, most recently by Ordinance No. 20690, effective July 16, 2023, which increased the total maximum indebtedness of the plan, thereby converting the plan from a Reduced Rate Plan as defined in ORS 457.010(14) to a Permanent Rate Plan as defined in ORS 457.010(11).

B. On September 11, 1985, the City Council passed Ordinance No. 19352 adopting the Riverfront Research Park Urban Renewal Plan. On March 10, 2004, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 20313 changing the name of the "Riverfront Research Park Urban Renewal Area" to the "Riverfront Urban Renewal Area," adding acreage to the Riverfront Urban Renewal Area, and adopting the amended Riverfront Urban Renewal District Plan ("the Riverfront Urban Renewal Area," to the "Riverfront Urban Renewal Plan"). The Riverfront Urban Renewal Plan has subsequently been amended, most recently by Ordinance No. 20700, effective February 25, 2024, which increased the total maximum indebtedness of the plan, thereby converting the plan from a Standard Rate Plan as defined in ORS 457.010(15) to a Permanent Rate Plan as defined in ORS 457.010(11).

C. The Urban Renewal Agency of the City of Eugene finds that declaring the amount of tax to be certified is necessary under ORS 294.305 to ORS 294.565.

NOW, THEREFORE, based on the above findings,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Urban Renewal Agency of the City of Eugene, as follows:

Section 1. That the following be certified to the County Assessor of Lane County, Oregon for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2025, and ending June 30, 2026:

<u>The Downtown Urban Renewal Plan Area:</u> The Urban Renewal Agency for the City of Eugene (Agency) shall receive the maximum amount of revenue that may be raised within the Downtown Urban Renewal Plan Area by dividing the taxes under section 1c, Article IX, of the Oregon Constitution. This plan shall be certified under Part 5, Permanent Rate Plans.

The Riverfront Urban Renewal Plan Area: The Agency shall receive the maximum amount

of revenue that may be raised within the Riverfront Urban Renewal Plan Area by dividing the taxes under section 1c, Article IX, of the Oregon Constitution. This plan shall be certified under Part 5, Permanent Rate Plans.

<u>Section 2.</u> That the City of Eugene Finance Officer is hereby requested to certify the levies as herein made and set forth to the County Assessor of Lane County, Oregon, and shall file with the Lane County Assessor and the Lane County Clerk documents as required by ORS 294.458 and ORS 310.060.

The foregoing Resolution is adopted this 23rd day of June, 2025.

ISSUE STATEMENT

The City Council is scheduled to take action on a request for a right-of-way vacation submitted by McDougal Bros Investments, LLC (City File VRI 25-1). The requested vacation of improved public right-of-way consists of a portion of First Avenue West located within the plat of Pioneer Resources Business Park. A vicinity map and aerial photo of the proposed vacation area is provided as Attachment A and the Ordinance is provided as Attachment B.

BACKGROUND

The applicant has requested a vacation of a portion of First Avenue West, which is a public rightof-way, to allow for the extension of a private gated street and fencing to help secure the industrial properties along First Avenue West.

The vacation process serves as a means to evaluate the need for public ways as land develops and uses change over time, and to address the manner in which the City may dispense with public ways. Public ways are defined by the Eugene Code as follows: "Any street, road, alley, rightof-way, pedestrian or bicycle easement or accessway, or utility easement for public use that is controlled by the city, county, or state."

The area proposed to be vacated includes approximately 415 linear feet of First Avenue West public right-of-way. First Avenue West, more commonly referred to as West 1st Avenue, formerly served as a loop road providing access to the industrially zoned properties abutting the street. However, following the City Council's approval of the vacation of the western portion of the loop in 2024 (City Vacation File VRI 23-1), the loop now terminates at two dead ends. This requested vacation is for right-of-way abutting the prior vacation area along the northern portion of the former loop street. The applicant has proposed to reserve a public utility easement over the entire vacation area.

The right-of-way area proposed for vacation is located in a subdivision known as the plat of Pioneer Resources Business Park. The vacation area abuts two properties, one on the north side of the street and the other on the south side. The properties abutting the area to be vacated are undeveloped. The properties are zoned I-3 Heavy Industrial, which allows for a variety of industrial uses. As explained in greater detail by the applicant, the entire business park is heavily impacted by the existence of a now sealed Bethel-Danebo landfill. Due to issues associated with the landfill site, it was deemed uninhabitable, and no permanent human occupancy is permitted within the footprint of the landfill. Additionally, the applicant cites numerous issues on the properties abutting the area proposed for vacation, including camping and crime, that have required City intervention and police response. If the City Council approves the proposed vacation, the applicant intends to expand the existing fence and secure area established following the previous vacation in 2024, adding this requested vacation area to the now private gated industrial park.

More details on this request can be found in the full record of application materials to date, which was provided separately to Councilors. Consent of Abutting and Affected Property Owners

In accordance with Oregon Revised Statutes (ORS) 271.080, the applicant has provided evidence of consent to the vacation from owners of at least two-thirds of the property within the "affected area." In this case, ORS 271.080 defines the "affected area" as the land lying on either side of the vacated area to the next lateral street, and 400 feet beyond each terminus of the proposed vacation area of West 1st Avenue.

Based on the signed consent forms submitted with the application, the applicant has obtained consent to the proposed vacation from the property owners of approximately 95 percent of the affected area, which exceeds the minimum requirements of ORS 271.080 and Eugene Code (EC) 9.8710. The applicant is also required to obtain consent from the abutting property owners. All properties abutting the proposed vacation are owned by McDougal Bros Investments, LLC.

A map showing the affected area, and the area of property owner consent, is included in the application file for reference.

Utilities

Public Works has reviewed this application and the surrounding facilities and infrastructure affected by the request. Concurrences from franchise utilities, including Eugene Water and Electric Board, have been included with the application. The right-of-way currently includes underground wastewater and other utilities. To ensure the City and utility companies have the necessary perpetual access for the operation and maintenance of public utilities that remain in the vacated area, the applicant has proposed a Public Utility Easement (PUE) over the entire area to be vacated.

Determination of Assessment

Pursuant to EC 9.8710(5), the applicant is required to pay a deposit equal to the assessment of special benefit resulting from the vacation. The amount of money to be deposited is to be determined by the City Manager. Typically, the assessment is equivalent to the land value, plus the cost incurred by the City for construction of the public improvements (e.g. streets and sidewalks). In this case, the improvements were constructed by the developer as a Privately Engineering Public Improvement (PEPI) associated with the original subdivision. Given this fact, the City did not incur any cost for the construction of the streets or other infrastructure and the amount of

money to be deposited only accounts for the land value of the right-of-way.

The City provided a notice to the applicant of the assessment more than 20 days prior to the public hearing, in accordance with code requirements. The assessment was determined to be a total of \$10,000, which considered the value of the land area to be vacated, less the value of the public utility easement (PUE) to be reserved over the vacated area. At least five (5) working days prior to the public hearing, the applicant was required to submit a deposit of the full assessed amount with the City. If the application is approved and the vacation becomes effective, the deposit will be retained by the City. If the application is denied or the vacation fails to take effect for another reason, the deposit will be returned to the applicant.

Procedural Summary

The vacation request process serves to evaluate the need for public ways as land develops and uses change over time, and to address the manner in which the City may dispense with public ways. This request for vacation is being considered in accordance with EC 9.8700-9.8725 and ORS 271.080-271.230, and procedures in EC 9.7445-9.7455.

Notice of the May 19, 2025 <u>public hearing</u> for the requested vacation was provided in the following manner: On April 18, 2024, notice was mailed to owners of property within 100 feet of the vacation area and interested parties. On May 6, 2025, the property was posted in the immediate vicinity of the requested vacation; and on May 12, 2025, legal notice was published in The Register-Guard newspaper. The May 19, 2025 <u>public hearing</u> was conducted in accordance with quasi-judicial procedures in State law and as set forth in EC 9.7065-9.7095. No public testimony was received for this vacation request.

Applicable Criteria

In making a decision on the proposed right-of-way vacation, the Council must apply the following approval criterion:

The city council shall approve, or approve with conditions and reservations of easements, the vacation of improved public right-of-way, public ways acquired with public funds, or undeveloped subdivision and partition plats, or portions thereof, including public right-of-way and improved public easements located therein, only if the council finds that approval of the vacation is in the public interest.

Findings demonstrating compliance with these requirements can be found in Exhibit C to the proposed vacation ordinance attached as Attachment B to this AIS.

ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE VACATING A PORTION OF FIRST AVENUE WEST LOCATED WITHIN THE PLAT OF PIONEER RESOURCES BUSINESS PARK AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

The City Council of the City of Eugene finds that:

A. The City Council of the City of Eugene approved an agenda scheduling a public hearing at 5:30 p.m. on May 19, 2025, for the purpose of hearing protests and remonstrances to the proposed vacation of the following described right-of-way:

The right-of-way identified as a portion of First Avenue West, located within the plat of Pioneer Resources Business Park, more particularly described on Exhibit A and depicted on Exhibit B attached to this Ordinance.

B. Notice was duly and regularly given of the public hearing and, on May 19, 2025, the City Council held a public hearing and heard all objections to the proposed vacation.

NOW, THEREFORE,

THE CITY OF EUGENE DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The City Council of the City of Eugene finds that notice of the public hearing on the proposed vacation was published and posted as required by law, that consents required by EC 9.8710(6) and ORS 271.080(2) and statements of concurrence to the vacation from affected utility providers have been filed in the proceedings, and that vacation of the right-of-way described in Exhibit A and depicted on Exhibit B attached to this Ordinance is in the public interest, as described in the Findings attached as Exhibit C to this Ordinance and hereby adopted in support of this Ordinance.

Section 2. The right-of-way described on Exhibit A and depicted on Exhibit B attached to this Ordinance is hereby vacated, except that the the City reserves a public utility easement for the entire area described in Exhibit A. The vacated right-of-way shall revert pursuant to the statutes of the State of Oregon.

Section 3. The City Recorder is directed to file a certified copy of this Ordinance, including all attachments, with the Recorder of Lane County, Oregon. In addition, a certified copy of this Ordinance shall be filed with the Lane County Assessor and a certified copy shall be filed with the Lane County Surveyor.

Section 4. Notwithstanding the effective date of ordinances as provided in the Eugene Charter of 2002, this Ordinance shall become effective 30 days from the date of passage by the Eugene City Council and approval by the Mayor, or upon the recording of the public utility easement described in Section 2 of this Ordinance in a form acceptable to the City Manager, whichever is later.

FINDINGS IN SUPPORT OF VACATING A PORTION OF FIRST AVENUE WEST, LOCATED WITHIN THE PLAT OF PIONEER RESOURCES BUSINESS PARK

APPLICATION OVERVIEW

Name (File Number):	Pioneer Resources Business Park (VRI 25-1)
Applicant:	McDougal Bros Investments LLC
Subject Property:	A portion of First West Avenue.
Zoning:	Abutting property zoned I-3 Heavy Industrial
Location:	0.76 acres (29,050 square feet) of improved right-of-way at the western terminus of West 1 st Avenue to the west of South Bertelsen Road and within the Pioneer Business Park.

BACKGROUND

McDougal Bros Investments, LLC (the applicant) filed a request for a portion of First West Avenue (commonly referred to as West 1st Avenue), which is an improved public right-of-way, to allow the applicant to construct a private gated street and fencing to help secure the industrial properties along West 1st Avenue.

The area to be vacated, a total of 0.67 acres or 29,050 square feet, includes approximately 415 linear feet of West 1st Avenue public right-of-way. The requested vacation is for the right-of-way within the Pioneer Resources Business Park Subdivision recorded June 29, 1998 with Lane County Deeds and Records. First Avenue West, more commonly referred to as West 1st Avenue, formerly served as a loop road providing access to the industrially zoned parcels abutting the street. However, following the City Council approval of the vacation of the western portion of the loop in 2024 (City Vacation File VRI 23-1), the loop now terminates at two dead ends. This requested vacation is for right-of-way abutting the prior vacation area along the northern portion of the former loop street.

To ensure access to existing utility services, the applicant has proposed a public utility easement over the entire area to be vacated.

FINDINGS

The vacation process serves as a means to evaluate the need for public ways as land develops and uses change over time, and to address the manner in which the City may dispense with public ways. Public ways are defined by the Eugene Code as follows: "Any street, road, alley, right-of-way, pedestrian or bicycle easement or accessway, or utility easement for public use that is controlled by the city, county, or state."

This vacation is being considered in accordance with Sections 9.8700 – 9.8725 of the Eugene Code (EC) and Oregon Revised Statutes (ORS) 271.080 – 271.230 and processed pursuant to EC 9.7445 – 9.7455. EC 9.8710(3) which requires that any vacation of an improved right-of way be considered and decided upon by the City Council in accordance with the procedures in EC 9.7445 through 9.7455. The public hearing is being conducted consistent with quasi-judicial procedures in State law and as set forth in EC 9.7065 – 9.7095.

EC 9.8710(5) requires the applicant to pay a special assessment to the City equal to the assessed value of the real property and any costs incurred by the City in the construction of public improvements as determined by the City Manager. The applicant has provided the required assessment.

In accordance with ORS 271.080, the applicant has provided evidence of consent to the vacation from owners of at least two-thirds of the property within the affected area defined by ORS 271.080. In this case, ORS 271.080 defines the "affected area" as the land lying on either side of the vacated area to the next lateral street, and 400 feet beyond each terminus of the right-of-way to be vacated. Based on the signed consent forms submitted with the application, the applicant has obtained consent for the proposed vacation from all the abutting property owners and the owners of approximately 95 percent of the affected area, which exceeds the requirements of ORS 271.080 and EC 9.8710.

City of Eugene Public Works has reviewed this application and the surrounding facilities and infrastructure affected by the request. Concurrences from franchise utilities, including Eugene Water and Electric Board, have been included with the application. The right-of-way currently includes underground wastewater and other utilities. To ensure the City and utility companies have the necessary perpetual access for the operation and maintenance of public utilities that remain in the vacated area, the applicant has proposed a Public Utility Easement (PUE) over the entire area to be vacated.

Compliance with Approval Criterion

Per EC 9.8725, the sole approval criterion for this vacation requires City Council to find that approval of the requested vacation is in the public interest. The full text of the approval criterion is provided below, with findings demonstrating compliance:

EC 9.8725: <u>Approval Criteria for the Vacation of Improved Public Right-of-Way, Public</u> <u>Ways Acquired with Public Funds, and Undeveloped Subdivision and Partition Plats</u>. The city council shall approve, or approve with conditions and reservations of easements, the vacation of improved public right-of-way, public ways acquired with public funds, or undeveloped subdivision and partition plats, or portions thereof, including public right-of-

way and improved public easements located therein, only if the council finds that approval of the vacation is in the public interest.

The following findings demonstrate that vacation of a portion of First West Avenue is in the public interest. This determination is based on the conclusion that vacation of the improved right-of-way will provide an opportunity for the efficient use of land and will not negatively impact the transportation system, surrounding uses, or emergency access. As referenced by the applicant, the purpose of the vacation request is to allow the expansion of the private gated street and fencing to help secure the industrial properties along West 1st Avenue.

The vacation of the right-of-way will allow for flexible and efficient use of lands zoned for heavy industrial uses, which may facilitate future economic stimulation in the long undeveloped site. As detailed in the application materials, the lots adjacent to the requested right-of way vacation have been deemed uninhabitable due to the former landfill site and a legal settlement (Frontier Recovery LLC vs. Lane County, Oregon), which required that no permanent human occupancy on the footprint of the landfill be allowed. The result is that there are very limited uses that can be developed on the site. Vacation of the public right-of-way will further limit potential negative impacts on humans from the existing landfill and will allow for flexible use of a site constrained by detrimental historic uses.

Regarding public interest in managing City resources, the West 1st Avenue has been subject to settling and deterioration since its construction. Upon vacation, right-of-way maintenance will no longer be the responsibility of the City. The elimination of this maintenance cost for the City will allow for resources to be allocated to other street and maintenance projects. The vacation of the public right-of-way will allow for controlled access onto the property. The applicant cites documented illegal activities in the vacation area that create an unsafe environment. As a result of the vacation, access to the area can be managed by the property owners. While not guaranteed, a possible outcome of controlled access is a reduction in calls for City police, fire, and parking services associated with activities currently occurring within the right-of-way.

Conclusion

The applicant's requested vacation of a portion of First West Avenue right-of-way is in the public interest, based on the above facts and the terms of the ordinance.

ISSUE STATEMENT

The City Council is scheduled to take action on a request for a right-of-way vacation submitted by the University of Oregon (City File VRI 24-01). The University has requested the vacation of a portion of the improved public right-of-way of Moss Alley, located south of East 17th Avenue and north of East 19th Avenue. A vicinity map and aerial photo of the proposed vacation area is provided as Attachment A, and the Ordinance is provided as Attachment B.

BACKGROUND

The applicant has requested vacation of a portion of Moss Alley that is located south of East 17th Avenue and north of East 19th Avenue, in order to create a contiguous development site for the proposed future construction of a University of Oregon student residence hall.

The vacation process serves as a means to evaluate the need for public ways as land develops and uses change over time, and to address the manner in which the City may dispense with public ways. Public ways are defined by the Eugene Code as follows: "Any street, road, alley, rightof-way, pedestrian or bicycle easement or accessway, or utility easement for public use that is controlled by the city, county, or state."

The area proposed to be vacated includes approximately 500.2 lineal feet of the Moss Alley public right-of-way. The block containing the portion of the alley to be vacated is bounded by East 17th Avenue to the north, Moss Street to the east, East 19th Avenue to the south, and Columbia Street to the west. The portion of Moss Alley proposed for vacation currently provides public access between East 17th Avenue and East 19th Avenue and serves as secondary access to properties abutting the alley to the east and west. The applicant has proposed that the City retain a Public Utility Easement within the vacation area to allow the City access to existing City utility infrastructure located within the vacation area.

The area proposed for vacation abuts property that is zoned PL Public Land, with some adjacent property being within the /EC East Campus Overlay Zone. To the south of the area proposed for vacation is privately-owned land, which is zoned R-1 Low-Density Residential. Except for two vacant lots, all properties abutting the area to be vacated are developed with existing institutional uses. The zoning of abutting properties directly reflects the intended development of campus-related uses on land owned by the University of Oregon.

The University of Oregon's Next Generation Housing Development Plan, a long-range plan for oncampus housing and infrastructure, has identified the land directly south of East 17th Avenue, between Columbia Street and Moss Street, as a potential site for on-campus student housing development. The vacation is also intended to limit vehicular access to the subject portion of Moss Alley, enhancing pedestrian safety in the vacation area while minimizing impacts to the transportation system.

As described by the applicant, the purpose of the vacation request is to create a contiguous development site, which will accommodate the development of a new student residence hall directly south of East 17th Avenue. If the vacation is approved, the construction of the dormitory would be permitted outright in accordance with the current PL Public Land zoning of the property, and would not require any zone change, land use code amendment or plan amendment. The University's eventual goal is to create a campus-scale block within the area surrounded by East 17th Avenue, Villard Street, East 19th Avenue, and Columbia Street. Vacation of the subject portion of Moss Alley, and the resultant consolidation of campus land abutting the alley to the east and west, will serve that goal by creating new opportunities for campus-scale, pedestrian-friendly redevelopment in the vacation area.

Consent of Abutting and Affected Property Owners

In accordance with Oregon Revised Statutes (ORS) 271.080, the applicant has provided evidence of consent to the vacation from owners of at least two-thirds of the property within the "affected area." In this case, ORS 271.080 identifies the "affected area" as the land lying on either side of the proposed vacation area to the next lateral street, and 400 feet beyond each terminus of the proposed vacation area.

The applicant has provided a consent form confirming that consent for the proposed vacation has been obtained from the owners of 100 percent of the abutting property and 76 percent of the affected area, which exceeds the minimum requirements of ORS 271.080 and Eugene Code (EC) 9.8710. A map showing the affected area, and the area of property owner consent, is included in the application file for reference.

Utilities

Public Works has reviewed this application and the surrounding facilities and infrastructure affected by the request and has coordinated with the University of Oregon to ensure continued access to utilities. Concurrences from franchise utilities, including Eugene Water and Electric Board (EWEB), Comcast, NW Natural, and Lumen, have also been included with the application.

The right-of-way currently includes City stormwater facilities and underground wastewater service, as well as utilities operated by Comcast, NW Natural, Lumen, and EWEB. To ensure that access to the existing utilities is retained in the area surrounding the subject portion of right-of-way, the applicant has provided a Public Utility Relocation Plan, which is located in the application

file for reference. The proposed Relocation Plan is designed to allow for the orderly and efficient extension of utility services to existing and future development in the affected area. As proposed, the University of Oregon will be responsible for relocating utilities that are currently within the public right-of-way proposed for vacation.

The applicant has also provided two separate Public Utility Easement (PUE) documents, both of which have been reviewed by the City's Public Works Department and signed by the applicant. One of the provided PUEs covers the utilities that will be rerouted from Moss Alley to connect to existing utilities in Columbia Street. The other PUE covers the entire vacation area to ensure that the existing utilities in the Moss Alley right-of-way remain accessible to the City and affected utility companies for operation and maintenance until the utilities are relocated out of the vacation area.

If the application is denied or the vacation fails to take effect for another reason, the deposit will be returned to the applicant.

Notice of the <u>May 19, 2025 public hearing</u> regarding the requested vacation was provided in the following manner: On April 18, 2025, notice was mailed to owners of property within 100 feet of the vacation area and to interested parties. On May 6, 2025, public notice was posted in the immediate vicinity of the requested vacation; and on May 4, 2025, legal notice was published in The Register-Guard newspaper. The <u>May 19, 2025 public hearing</u> was conducted in accordance with quasi-judicial procedures in State law and as set forth in EC 9.7065-9.7095.

Seven pieces of public testimony were received prior to the close of the public record. Two pieces of the provided public testimony discussed concerns related to vehicular access and traffic; four pieces of testimony expressed support for the proposed vacation; and one piece of testimony was submitted as a response to the access-related concerns raised in the first piece of testimony. All testimony provided is included in the application record for reference. At the public hearing, two members of the public spoke in support of the requested vacation. Additionally, Councilor Keating requested a response from staff regarding access and transportation plans that would be in place following the vacation to mitigate potential impacts on other properties abutting the alley. A response to public testimony and to Councilor Keating's request is provided in a staff Memorandum included as Attachment C to this AIS.

Applicable Criteria

In making a decision on the proposed right-of-way vacation, the Council must apply the following approval criterion:

The city council shall approve, or approve with conditions and reservations of easements, the vacation of improved public right-of-way, public ways acquired with public funds, or undeveloped subdivision and partition plats, or portions thereof, including public right-of-way and improved public easements located therein, only if the council finds that approval of the vacation is in the public interest.

Findings demonstrating compliance with these requirements can be found in Exhibit C to the proposed vacation Ordinance attached as Attachment B to this AIS.

ORDINANCE NO. _____

AN ORDINANCE VACATING A PORTION OF MOSS ALLEY AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

The City Council of the City of Eugene finds that:

A. The City Council of the City of Eugene approved an agenda scheduling a public hearing at 5:30 p.m. on May 19, 2025, for the purpose of hearing protests and remonstrances to the proposed vacation of the following described right-of-way:

The right-of-way identified as a portion of Moss Alley located south of Seventeenth Avenue East and north of Nineteenth Avenue East, which is more particularly described in Exhibit A and depicted on Exhibit B attached to this Ordinance.

B. Notice was duly and regularly given of the public hearing and, on May 19, 2025, the City Council held a public hearing and heard all objections to the proposed vacation.

NOW, THEREFORE,

THE CITY OF EUGENE DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1</u>. The City Council of the City of Eugene finds that notice of the public hearing on the proposed vacation was published and posted as required by law, that consents required by EC 9.8710(6) and ORS 271.080(2) and statements of concurrence to the vacation from affected utility providers have been filed in the proceedings, and that vacation of the right-of-way described in Exhibit A and depicted on Exhibit B attached to this Ordinance is in the public interest, as described in the Findings attached as Exhibit C to this Ordinance and hereby adopted in support of this Ordinance.

<u>Section 2</u>. The right-of-way described in Exhibit A and depicted on Exhibit B attached to this Ordinance is hereby vacated, except that the City reserves a public utility easement for the entire area described in Exhibit A. The vacated right-of-way shall revert pursuant to the statutes of the State of Oregon.

<u>Section 3</u>. The City Recorder is directed to file a certified copy of this Ordinance, including all attachments, with the Recorder of Lane County, Oregon. In addition, a certified copy of this Ordinance shall be filed with the Lane County Assessor and a certified copy shall be filed with the Lane County Surveyor.

Section 4. Notwithstanding the effective date of ordinances as provided in the Eugene Charter of 2002, this Ordinance shall become effective 30 days from the date of passage by the Eugene City Council and approval by the Mayor, or upon the recording of the public utility easement described in Section 2 of this Ordinance, in a form acceptable to the City Manager, whichever is later.

FINDINGS IN SUPPORT OF VACATING A PORTION OF MOSS ALLEY

APPLICATION OVERVIEW

Name (File Number):	Moss Alley (VRI 24-1)
Applicant:	University of Oregon
Subject Property:	A portion of Moss Alley
Zoning:	Abutting property zoned PL Public Land, partially within the /EC East Campus Overlay Zone
Location:	.24 acres of improved right-of-way of Moss Alley, located south of East 17th Avenue

BACKGROUND

The University of Oregon (the applicant) filed a request for vacation of a portion of Moss Alley, which is an improved public right-of-way, to allow for the creation of a contiguous development site for the proposed future development of a new residence hall and dining facility for undergraduate University of Oregon students.

The area proposed to be vacated, a total of 0.24 acres or 10,330 square feet, includes approximately 500.2 lineal feet of Moss Alley public right-of-way. The block containing the portion of alley proposed to be vacated is bounded by East 17th Avenue to the north, Moss Street to the east, East 19th Avenue to the south, and Columbia Street to the west. Moss Alley currently provides public access between East 17th Avenue and East 19th Avenue, and serves as a secondary access to properties abutting the alley to the east and west. Abutting properties are zoned PL Public Land and R-1 Low-Density Residential, with some of the properties in the Public Land zone being within the /EC East Campus Overlay Zone.

The applicant has proposed a plan to modify and relocate utilities that are currently located within the area proposed to be vacated. In order to ensure continued access to existing utility services, the applicant has also provided a Public Utility Easement (PUE), which will cover the entire vacation area.

FINDINGS

The vacation process serves as a means to evaluate the need for public ways as land develops and uses change over time, and to address the manner in which the City may dispense with public ways. Public ways are defined by the Eugene Code as follows: "Any street, road, alley, right-of-way, pedestrian or bicycle easement or accessway, or utility easement for public use that is controlled by the city, county, or state."

This request for vacation is being considered in accordance with Sections 9.8700 – 9.8725 of the Eugene Code (EC) and Oregon Revised Statutes (ORS) 271.080 – 271.230, and processed pursuant to EC 9.7445 – 9.7455. EC 9.8710(3) requires that any vacation of an improved right-of way be considered and decided upon by the City Council in accordance with the procedures in EC 9.7445 through 9.7455. The public hearing is being conducted consistent with quasi-judicial procedures in State law and as set forth in EC 9.7065 – 9.7095.

EC 9.8710(5) requires the applicant to pay a special assessment to the City equal to the assessed value of the real property and any costs incurred by the City in the construction of public improvements as determined by the City Manager. The applicant has provided the required assessment.

In accordance with ORS 271.080, the applicant has provided evidence of consent to the vacation from the owners of at least two-thirds of the property within the affected area. In this case, ORS 271.080 defines the affected as the land lying on either side of the vacated area to the next lateral street, and 400 feet beyond each terminus of the right-of-way to be vacated. Based on the signed consent forms submitted with the application, the applicant has obtained consent for the proposed vacation from 100 percent of the abutting property owners and the owners of approximately 76 percent of the affected area, which exceeds the requirements of ORS 271.080 and EC 9.8710.

The City of Eugene Public Works Department has reviewed this vacation application, as well as the surrounding facilities and infrastructure affected by the request. Letters of concurrence from franchise utilities, including Eugene Water and Electric Board (EWEB), Comcast, NW Natural, and Lumen, have been included with the application.

In its current condition, the vacation area contains City stormwater facilities and underground wastewater lines, as well as franchise utility services operated by Comcast, NW Natural, Lumen, and EWEB. The applicant has provided two separate Public Utility Easement (PUE) documents, both of which have been reviewed by the Public Works Department and signed by the applicant. One of the provided PUEs covers the utilities that will be rerouted from Moss Alley to connect to existing utilities in Columbia Street. The other PUE covers the entire vacation area and is intended to be an interim measure, to ensure that the existing utilities in the Moss Alley right-of-way remain accessible to the City and affected utility companies for operation and maintenance on a temporary basis, until the utilities are relocated out of the vacation area. **Compliance with Approval Criterion**

Per EC 9.8725, the sole approval criterion applicable to vacation of improved public right-ofway requires City Council to find that approval of the requested vacation is in the public interest. The full text of the approval criterion is provided below, followed by findings demonstrating compliance: EC 9.8725: <u>Approval Criteria for the Vacation of Improved Public Right-of-Way, Public</u> <u>Ways Acquired with Public Funds, and Undeveloped Subdivision and Partition Plats</u>. The city council shall approve, or approve with conditions and reservations of easements, the vacation of improved public right-of-way, public ways acquired with public funds, or undeveloped subdivision and partition plats, or portions thereof, including public right-ofway and improved public easements located therein, only if the council finds that approval of the vacation is in the public interest.

The following findings demonstrate that vacation of the subject portion of Moss Alley is in the public interest. This determination is based on the conclusion that vacation of the improved right-of-way will provide an opportunity for the efficient use of land and will not negatively impact the City's transportation system, surrounding uses, or emergency access.

As referenced by the applicant, the purpose of the vacation request is to create a campus-scale block within the area surrounded by East 17th Avenue, Columbia Street, East 19th Avenue, and Moss Street, to create a safer pedestrian environment and accommodate the eventual development of a new student residence hall. The University of Oregon's Next Generation Housing Development Plan, a long-range plan for on-campus housing and infrastructure, has identified the land to the east and west of the vacation area as a potential site for on-campus housing development. Vacation of the subject portion of Moss Alley will create a contiguous development site owned by the University of Oregon, allowing for campus-scale building design, limiting vehicular access, and enhancing student safety. As discussed in the application materials, the proposed vacation is anticipated to result in minimal impacts to the transportation system.

All properties abutting the vacation area are developed with University-related and campus uses. To the south of the proposed vacation area, within the area of affected property identified in ORS 271.080, there are several privately-owned properties developed with existing residential uses. No residential properties directly abut the vacation area.

The vacation is in the public interest because, upon vacation, maintenance of the Moss Alley right-of-way will no longer be the responsibility of the City. The elimination of this maintenance cost for the City will allow for resources to be allocated to other street and maintenance projects.

Additionally, the ongoing growth and expansion of the University of Oregon campus will result in a more vibrant and diverse landscape for the surrounding neighborhood and for Eugene's community as a whole, and will continue to support the University's commitments to education, research, and service to the state.

Conclusion

Based on the above facts and the terms of the Ordinance, the applicant's requested vacation of a portion of Moss Alley public right-of-way is in the public interest.

BACKGROUND

On May 19, 2025, the City Council held a <u>public hearing</u> on a right-of-way vacation request for a portion of the Moss Alley right-f-way, south of East 17th Avenue. Two individuals provided testimony at the public hearing in support of the requested vacation. In addition to the verbal testimony, seven pieces of written public testimony were received prior to the close of the public record. Four pieces of testimony expressed support for the proposed vacation. Two pieces of public testimony expressed opposition to the request and voiced concerns related to vehicular access and traffic. The final piece of testimony was provided by the Applicant's representative, which served as a response to the access-related concerns raised in the two written comments in opposition. All public testimony is included in the public record for this vacation request.

Following the public testimony at the public hearing, Councilors requested information from staff about two topics related to the vacation. One of the topics of interest was the route typically used by delivery trucks serving the University of Oregon Central Kitchen. The Central Kitchen facility is on the west side of Moss Alley, adjacent to the vacation area. The requested vacation will impact the Central Kitchen's current vehicular traffic patterns for deliveries.

Councilors also requested additional information about the student residence hall (dormitory) that is proposed to be developed in the future in the vacation area. The future dormitory was discussed throughout the application materials and was also referenced in some of the public testimony. The proposed student residence hall is described as the purpose for the proposed vacation of a portion of Moss Alley, as the vacation would facilitate the creation of a contiguous development site to allow compact, "campus-scale" development between Columbia Street and Moss Street.

This memorandum summarizes information provided in the record, serves as a supplemental staff response to public testimony, and clarifies the topics of interest from City Councilors.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON CENTRAL KITCHEN TRAFFIC ROUTE

As noted above, testimony regarding this vacation request expressed concern related to traffic resulting from delivery trucks accessing the University of Oregon Central Kitchen.

Currently, delivery vehicles accessing the Central Kitchen property use the northern end of Moss Alley for access. As addressed by the applicant, the route taken by trucks making deliveries to the Central Kitchen would be modified following the proposed vacation, because the subject portion of Moss Alley

would no longer be accessible to vehicular traffic.

The current route used for deliveries to the Central Kitchen was established through a 2014 Site Review approval. However, the 2014 Site Review approval was recently discontinued, as evidenced by the Notice of Discontinuance submitted into the record on May 14, 2025. The Site Review Discontinuance was requested by an applicant when it was identified that the Site Review approval for the Central Kitchen is no longer necessary due to changes in the zoning in the area. As such, the Central Kitchen property is no longer beholden to the prior Site Review approval and its designated delivery route.

A Technical Memorandum produced by Kittleson and Associates, Inc. was submitted by the applicant as evidence of the impact the proposed vacation will have on the transportation network. The memorandum concludes that, "the vacation of Moss Alley would have a negligible impact on traffic volumes and circulation patterns in the immediate vicinity." The Technical Memorandum also included diagrams of the current delivery truck routes and the proposed future route. These diagrams have been provided as Exhibit A of this memorandum to illustrate the change in delivery route following a vacation of Moss Alley. According to the memorandum, deliveries are made to the Central Kitchen twice per day, and this is not proposed to change following the vacation.

PROPOSED STUDENT RESIDENCE HALL

Five pieces of public testimony expressing support for the proposed vacation were submitted, all of which acknowledged the vacation as a response to a need for additional student housing on campus.

For context, the University of Oregon's Next Generation Housing Development Plan, which was completed by the University in 2024, is intended to guide on-campus housing at the University of Oregon for the next twenty years. The Next Generation Housing Development Plan includes conceptual plans for City land use actions to be initiated by the University, many of which are identified as aspirational goals which may be pursued in the future as a means of increasing allowance for student housing.

In the short term, to address immediate student housing needs, the University of Oregon is proposing the construction of a new residence hall, referred to as "Phase 1" in the Next Generation Housing Development Plan. This new dormitory would be an approximately 800-bed student housing project planned to be constructed by Fall 2027. The Phase 1 residence hall is proposed to be located south of East 17th Avenue, between Columbia Street and Moss Street, directly to the north of the Central Kitchen. The development of this dormitory is a primary reason that the applicant is requesting this portion of the Moss Alley Right-of-Way be vacated. The property proposed for development of the Phase 1 residence hall is zoned PL Public Land, with no zoning overlays. If the proposed vacation is approved, the residence hall would be permitted outright in accordance with the PL Public Land zone. Development of a residence hall in the PL Public Land zone is not dependent upon any other changes in zoning or the land use code. As such, approval of the vacation request and of necessary building permits are the only City approvals necessary for the University to obtain to construct the Phase 1 residence hall as planned.
