ISSUE STATEMENT

This item is to elect the 2023 City Council President and Vice President.

BACKGROUND

Each year the City Council elects a new president and vice president. The City Charter and City Code specify the office of Council President; the City Code outlines the process of selecting the President and Vice President.

Section 13 of the Charter states:

"Council - President.

- (1) Each year, at the first regular meeting of the council, or as soon as practicable, the council shall choose by ballot one of its members to serve as council president.
- (2) The council president shall preside at council meetings when the mayor is absent.
- (3) The council president shall function as mayor, with the powers and subject to the limitations of the office of mayor when the mayor:
 - (a) is absent from the city on leave granted by the council;
 - (b) has been absent from the city for 30 days or more; or
 - (c) has been physically unable to function as mayor for 30 days or more."

Further, the Section 2.009 of the City Code states:

- (1) The council president shall be elected for a one-year term. That person who has served the longest on the council and has not previously acted as council president shall normally be entitled to election as the president. A councilor may be re-elected as president of the council only after the expiration of one year from the date the councilor last served as such president unless two-thirds of the total membership of the council votes otherwise. A councilor will not be eligible to be elected president who has not served as a councilor for at least two years.
- (2) The vice-president of the council shall be elected at the same time and in the same manner as the president of the council. A vice-president may be nominated and elected as president.
- (3) The candidates for president and vice-president of the council shall be nominated and elected by a majority vote at the first regular meeting of the council in each calendar year."

- Councilor Zelenka – asked how transition standards will be affected by HB 2001; asked for clarification on the definitional change that affects parks and schools.
- Councilor Clark – asked if the code contains a council-approved definition of the words residential character; asked if counsel interprets or merely creates the basis for findings and staff interprets; asked if a motion would be required to ensure a previously adopted definition of residential character would be used by staff; asked what action by Council is required for staff to interpret the definition of residential character in a similar way to the previously approved definition; noted that this is significant issue that should come back to Council for a discussion.
- Councilor Zelenka – asked if neighborhood transition areas are a city-wide policy.

MOTION AND VOTE: Councilor Evans, seconded by Councilor Keating, moved to adopt the Ordinance concerning clear and objective approval criteria for housing included as Attachment B. **VOTE: PASSED 7:0**

Councilors Present: Greg Evans, Matt Keating, Jennifer Yeh, Mike Clark, Randy Groves, Alan Zelenka and Emily Semple

Mayor Vinis opened the November 30, 2022, work session of the Eugene City Council in a hybrid format at 101 W 10th Avenue, Eugene OR 97401.

1. **EXECUTIVE SESSION: Pursuant to ORS 192.660(2)(e) real property transactions**
2. **WORK SESSION: Reconsideration of An Ordinance Concerning Clear and Objective Approval Criteria for Housing**

MOTION: Councilor Clark, seconded by Councilor Semple, moved to reconsider the ordinance passed Monday night on clear and objective housing standards.

Council Discussion:

- Councilor Clark – stated he was unclear of the implications of the original vote and feels the definition of residential character is not clear.
- Councilor Zelenka – asked to clarify the motion.
- Councilor Groves – supports the motion to reconsider.

VOTE: PASSED 5:2 (opposed by Councilors Keating and Yeh.)

MAIN MOTION ON TABLE: Move to adopt the Ordinance concerning clear and objective approval criteria for housing included as Attachment B.

MOTION TO AMEND: Councilor Clark, seconded by Councilor Semple, moved to add the following text to the beginning of the Policy 1 in the findings on page 18: “The City Council finds that ‘residential character’ in this refinement plan policy has the meaning as defined in EC 9.0500, i.e. “A combination of qualities and features that gives identity to a particular area where the predominant use is housing and that distinguishes the area from other areas.”

Council Discussion:

- Councilor Clark – stated that Council should create findings that an appeals body would refer to for defining pieces of the code; noted that clarity on the definition of residential character is important to establish.

- Councilor Zelenka – stated the definition is embedded in the findings for the refinement plan; asked why this would not be applied to all areas; stated he is unsure of the ramifications of this motion and would therefore not support at this time; would consider further discussions to make it broadly applicable; is not in favor of this being applied to one refinement plan.
- Councilor Groves – would like to see this apply universally across the city in the future; asked City Manager to provide clarity on the amount of staff work this would require.
- Councilor Yeh – asked how much time this motion would require for staff to implement; believes residential transition zones are a good idea; asked if this would create strict limits on future development for residential areas; noted this definition appears vague; would support further conversations regarding this topic for understanding.
- Councilor Keating – noted the definition of ‘residential’ is the key to clarifying the issue; stated the unintended consequences may have ramifications in the future; will vote against the amendment.
- Councilor Zelenka – asked if this were approved what impact it would have on West University and all other refinement plans; noted that this would make one neighborhood held to different standards; asked City Attorney if this definition would be applied to any other refinement plans;

MOTION TO SUBSTITUTE and VOTE: Councilor Zelenka, seconded by Councilor Yeh, moved to add a work session to discuss adding definition in Eugene Code 9.0500 to all refinement plans. **FAILED 3:4** (opposed by Councilors Evans, Groves, Semple and Clark)

Council Discussion:

- Councilor Yeh – asked staff if they anticipate any unintended or negative consequences in passing the motion to amend.
- Councilor Semple – asked to add a friendly amendment to add a work session to this amendment.

VOTE ON MOTION TO AMEND WITH FRIENDLY AMENDMENT: PASSED 4:3 (opposed by Councilors Keating, Yeh and Zelenka)

MAIN MOTION AS AMENDED RESTATED and VOTE: Councilor Clark, seconded by Councilor Semple, moved to adopt the Ordinance concerning clear and objective approval criteria for housing included as Attachment B, adding the following text to the beginning of the Policy 1 in the findings on page 18: “The City Council finds that ‘residential character’ in this refinement plan policy has the meaning as defined in EC 9.0500, i.e. “A combination of qualities and features that gives identity to a particular area where the predominant use is housing and that distinguishes the area from other areas” and scheduling a work session to discuss adding definition in Eugene Code 9.0500 to all refinement plans. **PASSED 6:1** (opposed by Councilor Keating)

3. WORK SESSION: Interim Ward 7 Appointment Process Discussion

City Manager, Sarah Medary and City Attorney, Kathryn Brotherton and City Recorder, Katie LaSala led a discussion regarding the ward 7 appointment process.

Council Discussion:

- Councilor Clark – is disappointed that a specific candidate was not put forward to interview via the process that was set forth; noted that Council can choose to appoint an interim councilor that is not interviewed; is not interested in changing the votes.
- Councilor Zelenka – stated it is not uncommon for people to change their mind; stated the deadlines were created by staff and are not law; likes the option to open the floor to change votes by the end of the day to modify the ballot.
- Councilor Yeh – would like to interview all of the candidates; would support the option to modify ballots.
- Councilor Keating – would like to hear from all eligible candidates, based on voter registration; noted that he would hope that Council would embrace the option to change votes.
- Councilor Semple – noted that she requested to change her ballot and would like to hear from more candidates.
- Councilor Clark – stated he would be open to interviewing anyone that is an eligible candidate.

MOTION: Councilor Keating, seconded by Councilor Semple, moved to allow until end of day today to allow every councilor the opportunity to supplement their ballot selections.

Council Discussion:

- Councilor Zelenka – supports the motion; noted that if a councilor wants to interview all candidates, they should modify their ballot to reflect such.

VOTE: PASSED 7:0

Mayor Vinis opened the December 5, 2022, special meeting of the Eugene City Council in a hybrid format at 101 W 10th Avenue, Eugene OR 97401.

1. SPECIAL MEETING: Interim Council Appointment Interviews, Ward 7

The Council interviewed Janet Ayres, Daniel Isaacson, Lyndsie Leech, Barbie Walker and Carol Zorn for Interim City Councilor, Ward 7. City Councilors asked each candidate the following questions:

- Councilor Clark – In a recent city sponsored community survey, nearly three quarters of the people who answered said they thought the city was “heading in the wrong direction”. Do you agree or Disagree? Why or Why not?
- Councilor Evans – In your view what are the top three issues/challenges facing Eugene currently? And What strategies would you advocate for addressing those issues/challenges?
- Councilor Groves – Ward 7 is one of the city’s most diverse in terms of opinion, ideological perspectives and issues of concern. How will you balance these different perspectives, what steps will you take to establish yourself as the Ward 7 city councilor, and how will you be responsive to what are sometimes opposing points of view.
- Councilor Keating – Learning from one’s mistakes is key – in any arena. While we hear a lot about your vision and values, what is your greatest failure and what have you learned from that experience that prepared you to best serve residents of Eugene’s Ward 7.
- Councilor Semple – The job of Councilor will be more demanding than you realize, no matter how much you think you understand Council, issues people. It will take immense time, energy and attention that you will no longer have to give to your own life, family, friends, other work, your home, hobbies and more. What things in your life fulfill you? What demands do you have on your time? How will you manage these challenges and keep yourself physically, mentally, and emotionally healthy?
- Councilor Yeh – The Council’s vision, values and goals includes being an Equitable Efficient and Accountable Municipal Government. What does equity mean to you in this context and what would you expect from an equitable government?
- Councilor Zelenka – In a survey done by the City, 75% of Eugene residents agreed that “climate change requires much stronger regulations of greenhouse gas

emissions”. Do you agree or disagree with this statement, and why? Secondly, when it comes to funding climate change projects do you see them being as being on par with other essential services like libraries, parks, police, and fire? Or do you think funding is more discretionary and we should fund these projects as money is available? Finally, how do you see alternative transportation options generally fitting in as part of our climate change actions, and specifically on River Road.

Mayor Vinis opened the December 12, 2022, work session of the Eugene City Council in a hybrid format at 101 W 10th Avenue, Eugene OR 97401.

1. WORK SESSION: Interim Council Appointment, Ward 7

MOTION: Councilor Evans, seconded by Councilor Clark, moved to appoint Barbie Walker to the interim Ward 7 City Councilor.

MOTION TO SUBSTITUTE: Councilor Keating, seconded by Councilor Zelenka, moved to substitute Lyndsie Leech.

VOTE ON MOTION TO SUBSTITUTE (to appoint Lyndsie Leech): FAILED 3:4
(opposed by Councilors Semple, Clark, Evans, and Groves)

MOTION TO SUBSTITUTE: Councilor Semple, seconded by Councilor Keating, moved to substitute for Thomas Hiura.

Council Discussion:

- Councilor Semple – noted that Thomas Hiura represents Asian and LGBTQ populations and that their diverse life experiences would help them serve the residents of Ward 7.
- Councilor Clark – noted that he wished he had given Thomas Hiura the chance to interview.

VOTE ON MOTION TO SUBSTITUTE (to appoint Thomas Hiura): FAILED 2:5
(opposed by Councilors Zelenka, Yeh, Clark, Evans, and Groves)

VOTE ON MAIN MOTION: FAILED 3:4 (opposed by Councilors Semple, Keating, Zelenka, and Yeh)

Councilor Discussion:

- Councilor Keating – made a point of inquiry to clarify the definition of the prevailing side regarding nominations.
- Councilor Zelenka – asked for clarity on the process if all motions for appointment fail.

MOTION: Councilor Evans, seconded by Councilor Groves, moved to appoint Carol Zorn.

Councilor Discussion:

- Councilor Evans – stated that he was impressed with Carol Zorn’s interview; noted that she watches Council meetings and seemed well-informed.
- Councilor Zelenka – noted that the Council can postpone the decision to appoint an interim Ward 7 Councilor until Wednesday.

VOTE: FAILED 3:4 (opposed by Councilors Semple, Keating, Zelenka, and Yeh)

MOTION: Councilor Clark, seconded by Councilor Groves, moved to appoint Janet Ayers for interim Ward 7 councilor.

VOTE: FAILED 2:5 (opposed by Councilors Semple, Keating, Zelenka, Yeh, and Evans)

MOTION: Councilor Zelenka, seconded by Councilor Keating, moved to appoint Daniel Isaacson for interim Ward 7 councilor.

VOTE: FAILED 3:4 (opposed by Councilors Semple, Clark, Evans, and Groves)

Councilor Discussion:

- Councilor Zelenka – asked if a motion to renew would be needed if we tabled until Wednesday.

MOTION: Councilor Zelenka, seconded by Councilor Keating, moved to postpone to a date certain.

Councilor Discussion:

- Councilor Clark – noted alternatives to tabling the decision.
- Councilor Evans – asked City Attorney what would happen if they left the seat open until the May 2023 election; asked what implications would come from a legal suit; asked if a judge could appoint a Councilor to the vacant Ward 7 seat.
- Councilor Semple – asked the purpose of waiting until Wednesday; asked if there would be more applicants or discussion on Wednesday.
- Mayor Vinis – encouraged Council to find a path forward at this meeting.
- Councilor Zelenka – stated that Council was at an impasse; asked for charter clarity on tiebreakers; suggested postponing to Wednesday.
- Councilor Clark – asked what the vote count was for Carol Zorn.
- Councilor Keating – asked if there was a motion on the table; asked about the wording for a motion to renew.

VOTE: FAILED 3:4 (opposed by Councilors Semple, Keating, Evans, and Groves)

MOTION: Councilor Keating, seconded by Councilor Groves, moved to allow motions to renew to occur at the same meeting in which they were made.

Councilor Discussion:

- Councilor Clark – stated that he would prefer to make a decision tonight; expressed doubt that Councilors would change their mind tonight; noted that he supported Councilor Zelenka’s motion to postpone.
- Councilor Keating – noted that he would like this matter to be decided tonight; spoke in favor of allowing motions to renew to occur at the same meeting in which they were made.
- Councilor Clark – asked to be reminded of the vote for Janet Ayers.

VOTE: PASSED 5:2 (opposed by Councilors Clark and Zelenka)

MOTION: Councilor Keating, seconded by Councilor Zelenka, moved to appoint Lyndsie Leech for interim Ward 7 councilor.

Councilor Discussion:

- Councilor Keating – noted that Lyndsie Leech is a millennial, mom, business-owner, and non-profit director who understands the issues facing Ward 7.
- Councilor Clark – noted that he liked Lyndsie Leech and found her to be articulate; noted Lyndsie Leech held similar opinions as the recalled councilor.

VOTE: FAILED 3:4 (opposed by Councilors Semple, Clark, Evans, and Groves)

MOTION: Councilor Clark, seconded by Councilor Evans, moved to appoint Barbie Walker for interim Ward 7 councilor.

VOTE: FAILED 3:4 (opposed by Councilors Semple, Keating, Zelenka, and Yeh)

MOTION: Councilor Zelenka, seconded by Councilor Keating, moved to postpone to a date certain.

VOTE: PASSED 6:1 (opposed by Councilor Semple)

2. WORK SESSION: Intergovernmental Relations Update

City Manager, Sarah Medary, introduced Intergovernmental Relations Manager, Ethan Nelson who provided a presentation on Intergovernmental Relations updates,

Councilor Discussion:

- Councilor Zelenka – asked if the two new Intergovernmental Relations (IGR) process reports would be limited to three minutes during items of interest; asked about priority order for the projects for which IGR is seeking state funding; noted that the infrastructure bills are second priority; asked if clean air upgrades are lower priority because they have potential for federal funding; asked why there was recommendation to strike the general

statement for number 5 on the 2023 Eugene State Priorities list (Attachment B); indicated a desire to make a motion to strike the move to replace general statement number 5 in the 2023 Eugene State Priorities document, and instead add the three recommendations; agreed with the IGR manager's recommendation to strike the general statement in the state priorities list and instead add the general statement to the 2023 State and Federal Legislative Policy document (Attachment A).

Sarah Medary introduced Interim Executive Director of Library, Recreation Cultural Services, Ben Klipfel and Library Services Director, Will O’Hearn, who presented the Eugene Public Library Year 1 Levy Report.

- Councilor Clark – is a big supporter of the library and its services; voted against the library levy due to budget deficits and cuts to other services; noted his concern that the City has budget shortfalls and cannot cut or reduce the services promised in the library and police levies.
- Councilor Zelenka – asked when the levy was passed and when it is up for renewal; asked what the financial impact was for discontinuing fines; noted that 12,000 kids participated in the summer reading program; asked about the collection size; asked what a Star Library is; asked to confirm that the Eugene Library was in the top one percent of the country for cost effectiveness and utilization; asked what the top three safety issues are at the library; asked if staff feel they have sufficient security inside and out of the building.
- Councilor Groves – stated that the library is important to the community; has concerns regarding budget restraints and services cuts; asked what kind of programs are available for underserved youth; noted that ward 8 does not have a branch library, community center, pool, or dog park.
- Councilor Keating – is proud of the library levy; asked staff what the challenges and wish list is for the Sheldon and Bethel Branch; asked if there is a plan for increased book deposit sites, including Amazon Pool; asked if the P.A.A.W.S. (People and Animals Who Serve) program will be restarted; asked about the Library of Things program; noted appreciation for Wi-Fi hotspots throughout the community.
- Councilor Evans – asked staff if there a way to link bus passes to library cards to increase accessibility; noted that there are federal grant funds available to help fund such a program; noted that there is no branch library in the south and southwest regions.
- Councilor Zelenka – noted both the Inflation Reduction Act and the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act funding could be used for a library card/bus pass program; noted that ward 3 has no pool, branch library, community center, or dog park.
- Mayor Vinis – noted that the recent community survey demonstrated the importance and value that the library and its programs hold in the community.


