PROCLAMATION

- The United Nations approved the Universal Declaration of Human Rights on December WHEREAS: 10, 1948; and
- The United States played a pivotal role in the creation of the Universal Declaration of WHEREAS: Human Rights; and
- The basic human rights addressed in the Universal Declaration include economic, social, WHEREAS: and cultural rights, as well as civil and political rights, all considered to be equally important in fostering human dignity and freedom; and
- WHEREAS: The Universal Declaration calls for all people and governments at all levels to promote and respect the rights that it recognizes, and provides a standard of achievement for governments throughout the world; and

- December 10, 2024, is the 76th anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human WHEREAS: Rights, and this anniversary is being celebrated throughout this nation and in nations across the globe.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Lucy Vinis, Mayor of the City of Eugene, Oregon, do hereby proclaim December 10, 2024, to be

If the proposed amendment is substantive in nature or seeks to clarify the speaker's intent, the councilor should notify the minutes recorder and request verification of the proposed amendment.

Councilors Present: Emily Semple, Matt Keating, Jennifer Yeh, Mike Clark, Greg Evans, Lyndsie Leech, and Randy Groves

Councilors Absent: Alan Zelenka

Mayor Vinis opened the September 30, 2024, special meeting of the Eugene City Council in hybrid in-person and virtual format at 500 E. 4th Avenue, Eugene, OR 97401, North Building.

1. SPECIAL MEETING: Revenue Proposal: Fire Service Fee

City Manager, Sarah Medary introduced Chief Financial Officer, Twylla Miller and Assistant Finance Director, Neil Obringer to discuss the fire stabilization fee.

Councilor Discussion:

- Councilor Semple noted her appreciation for the presentation; stated it feels fair to have everybody pay something; noted while people do not like paying new fees, this is a pragmatic and equitable solution.
- Councilor Groves noted the City budget has structural problems; stated his support for foundational services including fire; noted the fire department has struggled with understaffing for over 40 years; noted he is conflicted about increasing fees paid by the community given rising inflation and cost of living; stated he prefers this revised proposal to the original.
- Councilor Yeh stated the revised proposal is an improvement over the original; noted she likes the customer care model; stated this is a hard decision; stated she supports drafting the ordinance and soliciting feedback from the community.
- Councilor Keating noted while the revised proposal is better than the original, there are still areas for improvement; asked if the proposal has been workshopped with the business community and neighborhood organizations; noted the median family would pay 120 dollars a year; noted the community recently rejected a bond measure for a multi-use facility at Lane County; asked if the fee would include funding for additional services; asked what two million dollars of additional services would include; noted the local number of Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Yet Employed (ALICE) individuals was alarming; asked about priorities of previous councils that may be better executed by the for-profit or non-profit sectors; noted he is not interested in cutting the library budget; asked about the top priorities of recreational and cultural services, given the constrained budget of the fire department.
- Councilor Leech stated her appreciation for the thoughtful presentation; noted she is against reducing services; noted she was a part of the Revenue Advisory Committee, and the fire fee was the most viable option; stated her support for drafting the ordinance.

- Mayor Vinis noted concern the funding gap will widen as the community continues to grow; stated concern that if the tax structure remains unchanged, the financial situation will worsen without action.
- Councilor Keating suggested additional revenue sources including traffic cameras, consumption fees and short-term rental fees; asked how the proposed fire fee would be assessed on an additional dwelling unit (ADU); asked how tenants of apartment buildings would be charged; noted concerns about higher fees being paid by those living in larger dwellings because of their families; noted he does not support the current proposal.
- Councilor Groves asked what foundational services the city needs to provide for safety
 and security; stated the need to be able to prioritize city services; noted the structural
 issue with the state tax system; noted most states besides Oregon have a sales tax in
 addition to property and income taxes; stated support for seeking feedback from the
 community; stated support for working on economic development.
- Councilor Clark noted the limits on property taxes indicated the residents of the state wanted to limit the growth of government; stated support for developing structural growth like increasing the number of local taxpayers; noted interest in hearing feedback from the local business community.
- Mayor Vinis stated if economic development is a key long-term strategy then we should focus on quality of life; stated the quality of life in the community depends on parks, libraries, and roads in addition to emergency services; noted reducing the budget for services may negatively impact the city's economic growth; noted the community safety payroll initiative was viable because it was a broad and shallow tax for a service everyone benefits from; stated there is not time to piece together small funding solutions given the July 1 deadline; encouraged Council to act now and not delay the decision another two years.
- Councilor Yeh asked what further direction staff needs from Council; noted concerns about cutting an additional 10 million from the City budget; noted cutting the budget would impact all departments, including parks and library expansion; stated support for stabilizing the fire department as a foundational service.
- Councilor Clark stated support for focusing on long-term solutions for stabilizing revenue; stated support for incentivizing housing construction.
- Councilor Leech noted the City has not added additional firefighters since the 1980s; asked about the population then versus the population now; stated she would feel more secure as a resident if the City had an additional fire squad given that the population has nearly doubled since the 1980s; noted as a member of the Revenue Advisory Committee she had anticipated a revenue solution comprised of many small pieces but the administration cost is too high to make them effective; stated the importance of handling the structural budget gap as a step towards achieving broader goals around housing and climate.
- Councilor Keating stated fire and emergency services are at the top of a priority based budget; noted he is unsure about the fire fee as a proper pathway for stabilizing the budget; noted he is looking forward to hearing community feedback.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:41 p.m.

Mayor Vinis opened the October 14, 2024, work session of the Eugene City Council in hybrid inperson and virtual format at 500 E. 4th Avenue, Eugene, OR 97401, North Building.

1. WORK SESSION: Mental Health and Substance Abuses Services/Programs in Oregon City Manager, Sarah Medary, introduced Kristie Hammitt, Assistant City Manager, Ethan Nelson, Intergovernmental Relations Manager, and Eve Gray, Director of Health and Human Services with Lane County.

Councilor Discussion:

- Councilor Zelenka stated he had put the work session poll for this topic forward to
 educate Council and the citizens about what is being done at the city, county, and state
 levels around mental health and substance abuse services and to raise awareness about
 those issues; stated homelessness is a symptom of the combined issues of substance
 abuse, mental illness, and lack of affordable housing; stated hope about finding solutions.
- Councilor Groves stated support for increased services for youth; asked how many repeat callers contact Central Lane Communications (CLCC); stated taking the top 20 system users out of the system makes a noticeable difference; noted appreciation for the work with Lane County and PeaceHealth; stated interest in including Judge Gill, presiding judge of the Eugene Municipal Court, in the solutions discussion; stated support for proactively helping at-risk youth.
- Councilor Leech stated behavioral health and workforce development are her top
 priorities; noted appreciation for police and fire's co-responder programs; noted the
 current medical and mental health system is complex and lacks a unified strategy; noted
 two significant problems in the non-profit behavioral health field are staff turnover and
 inability to hire; asked how the Lane County stabilization center will be staffed; spoke in
 favor of workforce development to bridge the gap in needed providers and available
 providers.
- Councilor Keating noted appreciation for local first responders; asked if there is a mechanism to compel an individual to accept services if they represent a danger to themselves or others; asked how the City can partner with the county or non-profits to advocate for appropriate tools to assist those in crisis who may not be able to make decisions on their own; asked about the Park Watch tool; noted the phone numbers 988 and 211 for Suicide and Crisis Lifeline and Essential Community Services respectively; asked if there is a need for a three-digit number for mental health support in the

community; asked how the City of Eugene ranks as an employer for providing mental health services to staff.

- Councilor Yeh noted Oregon ranks 49th in the country for number of adults with any mental illness despite an increase in resources; asked if the statistic includes treated and untreated mental illness.
- Councilor Evans asked about the budget for deflection programs for Lane County; asked about the standards used to determine the success of deflection programs; asked about the difference between deflection and diversion; asked how the qualifications for providers of deflection programs are determined; asked how the \$1.9 million for the Lane County deflection program will be sourced; noted his hope that it will be a successful program, providing an alternative to criminal incarceration.
- Mayor Vinis noted her appreciation for the presentation and the larger context it provided.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:04 p.m.

Mayor Vinis opened the October 14, 2024, meeting of the Eugene City Council in hybrid inperson and virtual format at 500 E. 4th Avenue, Eugene, OR 97401, North Building.

- Councilor Evans shared updates from the Intergovernmental Relations Committee regarding legislative priorities and policies and preparation for the upcoming legislative session.
- Councilor Semple spoke about the importance of sidewalk safety; encouraged the community to use paint to indicate sidewalk tripping hazards.

MOTION: Councilor Groves, seconded by Councilor Zelenka, moved to approve the items on Consent Calendar 1. **VOTE: 7:0 PASSED**

4. Action: Authorize Additional Urban Renewal Agency Funding for Acquisition of Two Downtown Properties from the City of Eugene

Mayor Vinis closed the meeting of the Eugene City Council and convened a meeting of the Eugene Urban Renewal Agency.

Agency Director, Sarah Medary, introduced the topic and provided background information.

MOTION: Councilor Groves, seconded by Councilor Zelenka, moved to offer to purchase the North Butterfly Lot for \$1,060,000 and the 8th

and Pearl Lot for \$1,020,000 from the City of Eugene and direct the Agency Director to include \$210,000 from the Downtown Urban Renewal District and \$170,000 from the Riverfront Urban Renewal District for these purchases in the December 2024 Supplemental Budget and take all necessary actions to acquire the properties. **VOTE: 7:0 PASSED**

Mayor Vinis closed the meeting of the Eugene Urban Renewal Agency and reconvened a meeting of the Eugene City Council.

5. Action: Transfer of Two Downtown Properties to Urban Renewal Agency City Manager, Sarah Medary, introduced the topic and provided background information.

MOTION: Councilor Groves, seconded by Councilor Zelenka, moved to direct the City Manager to facilitate the transfer of the North Butterfly Lot for \$1,060,000 and the 8th and Pearl Lot for \$1,020,000 to the Urban Renewal Agency of the City of Eugene. **VOTE: 7:0 PASSED**

6. PUBLIC COMMENT

- 1. Lin Woodrich spoke against the USD Clean Fuels transloading facility.
- 2. Eva Carlson spoke about the difficulties of being unhoused.
- 3. Nancy Buffum spoke about the importance of sidewalk safety.
- 4. Curtis Blankinship spoke about uses for the space under freeway overpasses.
- 5. Stefan (Ace Dog) Strek spoke in favor of parks and against urban renewal projects.
- 6. David Igl spoke about local historical events.
- 7. Lisa Levsen –spoke about the issue of hunger in the city.
- 8. Linda Kelley spoke in favor of requiring new tax-exempt developments to be fully electric.
- 9. Bill O'Brien spoke against the conflict in Israel and Palestine.
- 10. Ken Jones spoke against natural gas in residential homes.

Council Discussion:

• Councilor Groves – asked if the Oregon Department of Transportation owns the land under most overpasses in the city.

- Councilor Zelenka asked if the City has placed any rocks under overpasses; noted how to find information about the City's response to homelessness on the website.
- Councilor Yeh noted her appreciation for the data shared by Lisa Levsen with Neighbors Feeding Neighbors; noted her availability after the meeting to meet with a concerned community member.
- Councilor Evans noted efforts made to reduce rising crime in his ward; noted the effects on local businesses; spoke about the need for more police and human services.
- Mayor Vinis noted the public benefit criteria are retained with the accelerated Multi-Unit Property Tax Exemption (MUPTE) process; noted the request to make new tax-exempt developments fully electric was a good point.

Mayor Vinis adjourned the meeting at 8:34 p.m.

Mayor Vinis opened the October 21, 2024, Eugene City Council Work Session in a hybrid format.

1. WORK SESSION: Police Auditor Recruitment

City Manager, Sarah Medary, introduced the Central Services Executive Director, Mia Cariaga, and Employee Resource Center Business Alignment Analyst, Kathryn Butler, who provided an overview of the recruitment firms available to assist with outreach efforts for permanently filling the Police Auditor position.

Councilor Discussion:

- Councilor Groves noted interest in filling the police auditor position quickly, given the limited time with the interim police auditor; noted familiarity with Bob Murray and Associates; noted Bob Murray and Associates is professional and has experience with large West Coast recruitments; noted he does not know about Bob Murray and Associates' specific experience in civilian police oversight but acknowledged its national connections.
- Councilor Zelenka noted the proposals from Insight Global and Motus Recruiting and Staffing did not note law enforcement or police oversight experience; noted Bob Murray and Associates included its experience in law enforcement recruitment; asked if the City has used Bob Murray and Associates before and if it was successful; noted support for selecting Bob Murray and Associates as the Recruiter will be the president of the company, Valerie Phillips.
- Councilor Leech noted Insight Global's proposal was overly broad; noted concern with Bob Murray and Associates' mention of print materials for a national recruitment but acknowledged the firm's relevant experience; noted interest in working with a local company; noted the City has worked with Motus Recruiting and Staffing before; noted support for selecting Bob Murray and Associates or Motus Recruiting and Staffing.
- Councilor Semple noted Insight Global's proposal was focused on the firm instead of the client; noted Bob Murray and Associates appeared casual but was the only firm to list its price and the City has successfully worked with it before.
- Councilor Keating noted Bob Murray and Associates is located in California and Motus Recruiting and Staffing is located in Tigard, Oregon; asked for the location of

Insight Global; asked if Council could give preference to an Oregon-born organization; noted preference and desire for further consideration of Motus Recruiting and Staffing as it is Oregon-born.

Councilor Zelenka - noted Bob Murray and Associates specifically addressed the • police auditor role and relevant experience, while Motus Recruiting and Staffing did not; noted Bob Murray and Associates gave clear pricing and recently worked with the City.

> MOTION: Councilor Zelenka, seconded by Councilor Evans, moved to hire Bob Murray and Associates for the Police Auditor Recruiter.

- Councilor Leech noted Insight Global and Motus outlined payment structures based on a percentage of the salary with them asking for 25 percent and 12 percent on the one-year salary of the position respectively; noted Bob Murray and Associates' flat fee of \$17,000 is lower than the other two firms.
- Councilor Groves - noted Bob Murray and Associates previously operated out of Washington State and was the recruiter for the 2015 Seattle Fire Chief; noted support for Bob Murray and Associates due to its professionalism, candidate handling, and reasonable pricing.

VOTE: 7:0 PASSED

2. - Councilor Semple noted the Sustainability Commission successfully identified and • met its goals; noted interest in the commission's planned work for the upcoming year; noted appreciation for how the commission has supported the City's work with the Climate Recovery Ordinance (CRO); noted support for Council to approve the commission's work plan.
- Councilor Zelenka – noted his previous suggestion for the commission and staff to focus on securing federal funds allocated by the Biden Administration for climate change efforts and energy efficiency; asked how the commission is addressing the opportunity for federal funding; asked for a memo outlining the commission's funding successes and plans; asked for an update on his previous suggestion for the commission to obtain local carbon offsets; noted local carbon offsets could be City of Eugene projects that reduce greenhouse gases; asked for the status of the home energy scores initiative project; asked for the status of transportation greenhouse reduction projects; noted transportation accounts for one-third of Eugene's greenhouse gas emissions; noted concern that the selected projects do not target October 21, 2024

reducing emissions; asked for the selection process of the ten topics and three committees listed in the work plan.

- Councilor Groves noted concern with the use of carbon offsets and preference for funds directly addressing community needs and sustainability goals, rather than investing in offset programs that help other areas; noted concern with data centers taking an increasing percentage of renewable energy as they receive priority over communities like Eugene; asked how the City can ensure it has a stable supply of electricity; asked if the topic should be added to the commission's work plan.
- Councilor Keating asked about the possibility of adding a Eugene Water and Electric Board (EWEB) seat to the Clean and Reliable Backup Energy Systems Committee; asked if the commission has an advisory role to the EWEB Commissioners or if there is an opportunity for collaboration; noted support for the three proposed committees and asked for their associated costs; asked if the committees are revenue neutral.
- Councilor Leech noted support for approving the work plan and appreciation for the work plan's alignment with Council; noted appreciation for the commission's community engagement and the compost survey it sent out; noted interest in how the composting program, particularly in relation to the Lane Waste Clean program, may evolve.
- Councilor Yeh noted appreciation for the increased focus of the commission's work plan on Council priorities and community concerns; noted interest in the proposed committees; asked if the commission's outreach and education expands beyond the ten topics outlined in the work plan.
- Mayor Vinis noted appreciation for the commission's work in identifying and addressing relevant issues; noted the value of the commission's role in community education.
- Councilor Keating noted appreciation for the Ward 2 commission members for regularly meeting with and informing him of the commission's work; asked if the commission's charter or bylaws charge the members to engage with their respective councilors quarterly or monthly; noted the value of meeting with the commission members and encouraged Council members to connect with them to stay informed about ongoing efforts; asked for the commission's outreach plans to local high schools, the University of Oregon, and Lane Community College (LCC) regarding sustainability education; noted he took a valuable environmental class at LCC twenty years ago.
- Mayor Vinis noted the opportunity for the commission's collaboration with the Mayor's Youth Advisory Council.

Councilors Present: Emily Semple, Matt Keating, Alan Zelenka, Jennifer Yeh, Mike Clark, Greg Evans, Lyndsie Leech, and Randy Groves

Mayor Vinis opened the October 23, 2024, Eugene City Council Work Session in a virtual format.

1. WORK SESSION: Revenue Proposal: Fire Service Fee

City Manager, Sarah Medary, introduced Chief Financial Officer, Twylla Miller, who provided an overview of the draft ordinance and fee structure for the proposed Fire Service Fee.

Councilor Discussion:

- Mayor Vinis noted the City's website has a helpful facts, answers, and questions (FAQ) section.
- Councilor Groves noted the City is facing a city-wide funding problem, not a fire department problem; noted the fire department has not grown despite the increase in calls and complexity; noted the community survey did not have a question about the fire department on it; noted fire services are foundational; noted support for having a public hearing.
- Councilor Leech noted she learned at the League of Oregon Cities conference that other cities are addressing similar challenges by implementing utility fees; noted adding a new fee is not a simple decision; noted the fire department has adapted to changes and increased efficiency, but additional investment is needed; noted the fee structure has protections for low-income individuals; noted community members have voiced concerns about further budget cuts; noted support for having a public hearing.
- Councilor Clark noted support for expanding the tax base through housing and business development to address the long-term revenue issue; asked for the number of positions added to Fire and Emergency Medical Services (EMS) versus Library, Recreation, and Cultural Services since 1988; noted concern with the general fund allocation between the two departments.
- Councilor Yeh noted the complexity of the problem; noted support for having a public hearing.
- Councilor Zelenka noted the City has worked on controlling costs as thirteen of the previous sixteen budgets were cut budgets; noted the population increased without staff increasing proportionately; noted support for enhancing fire services; noted

the proposed fee is transparent with protections for low-income individuals; noted further cuts would negatively impact essential services and quality of life.

- Councilor Semple noted the City needs increased tax revenue, housing, and jobs; noted the proposed fee enhances the fire department and maintains City operations; noted further cuts would hinder City operations; noted support for the fee structure as it is the least regressive, has protections for low-income individuals, and incentivizes smaller homes; noted support for having a public hearing.
- Councilor Keating noted support for increasing revenue through a soda or Department of Motor Vehicles fee; noted concern with disproportionately burdening middle-income families with the proposed fee; noted fire services are critical services, not a benefit; noted support for having a public hearing but is not yet in support of the fee.
- Mayor Vinis noted an increased tax base would not increase tax revenues proportionally to the cost of serving the increased tax base; noted the library is an essential resource that was critical during the Coronavirus pandemic; noted the fire fee is an upstream solution; noted Council needs to address both emergency services and well-being, which are in the Strategic Plan.
- Councilor Groves noted expanding single-occupancy detached housing leads to a revenue loss; noted the solution is to grow the economy and support business expansion.
- Councilor Clark noted support for attracting new businesses to expand the tax base beyond existing taxpayers.
- Councilor Semple noted support for attracting new businesses to expand the tax base beyond existing taxpayers; noted the need to implement a solution until the tax base increases.
- Councilor Yeh noted cutting \$10 million from the budget would negatively impact residents and businesses.

MOTION: Councilor Keating, seconded by Councilor Groves moved to direct the City Manager to schedule a public hearing on the ordinance establishing a Fire Service Fee as set forth in Attachment A to this AIS.

VOTE: 8:0 PASSED

Councilor Discussion:

• Councilor Clark – noted his vote is in support of the public hearing not the proposed fee.

2. WORK SESSION and POSSIBLE ACTION: An Ordinance Concerning Multi-Use Property Tax Exemption; Amending Sections 2.945, 2.946, and 2.947 of the Eugene Code, 1971 and Providing a Sunset Date.

City Manager, Sarah Medary, introduced Development Programs Manager, Amanda D'Souza, who provided an overview of an ordinance to implement an Accelerated Multi-Unit Property Tax Exemption (MUPTE) program.

Councilor Discussion:

- Councilor Clark noted concern with the feasibility of the potential projects due to the high cost of money; noted local developers are engaged in more economically feasible communities; noted support for approving the proposal; noted interest in focusing on City-controlled areas, such as the North Butterfly Lot or Kesey Square; noted support for considering other tools, including Tax Increment Financing (TIF).
- Councilor Groves noted concern with the limited results of the proposal; asked for a presentation on the Climate Friendly Areas Study before making decisions; noted support for the labor protections; noted interest in accelerating the development of the North Butterfly Lot and other City-controlled areas; noted downtown development is needed to address behavioral and housing issues.
- Councilor Zelenka noted opposition to eliminating the public benefits as the MUPTE should provide tangible benefits to the community; noted interest in creating other development mechanisms; noted support for affordable housing efforts; asked for a status update on the North Butterfly Lot development.
- Councilor Yeh noted support for approving the proposal but noted concern about whether it goes far enough; noted support for a two-year review to assess progress and make adjustments; noted the value of urban open space and interest in refraining from developing Kesey Square; noted support for developing the North Butterfly Lot.
- Councilor Semple acknowledged previous concerns with the MUPTE due to the low initial public trust; noted the MUPTE has resulted in benefits in Eugene; noted support for approving the proposal; noted interest in reviewing the public benefits at a later point; noted the current MUPTE can be used outside of the downtown core; noted support for developing the downtown core with a mix of market-rate and affordable housing; noted support for developing the North Butterfly Lot with retail on the first floor.
- Councilor Leech noted support for moving the proposal forward and maintaining public benefits to align with the City's values and strategic plan; noted public benefits can work to protect the climate, ensure living wages, and create affordable housing; noted support for a future review of the MUPTE policy to evaluate its effectiveness and potential improvements.
- Mayor Vinis noted the accelerated proposal and the larger MUPTE review could happen simultaneously; asked for information on smaller downtown properties that need the Accelerated MUPTE to move forward; noted moving the North Butterfly Lot and 8th and Pearl Lot into the Urban Renewal District created opportunities for downtown housing development.

- Councilor Clark asked for an update on the plans for the North Butterfly Lot; noted support for developing the North Butterfly Lot for housing; asked if it is legal to incorporate TIF with zero-interest loans for developers, with a claw-back provision if profits exceeded expectations; noted interest in having the project done quickly to add to the tax base and bring housing downtown affordably.
- Councilor Groves noted developers are facing significant challenges as most return rates for housing development are at 2 percent with higher interest rates; noted developing downtown is more complicated due to space constraints and demolition costs; asked if there is height limitation in the proposal; asked if a developer would be eligible for a MUPTE application for 120-foot structure.
- Councilor Zelenka noted concern with the perception that developers are wealthy individuals benefiting from the system; noted maintaining public benefits is crucial for ensuring that the community also benefits from development.
- Councilor Groves noted the main public benefit is the City receiving compact housing in the downtown core, which will help reduce vacant buildings and address behavioral issues.

MOTION Councilor Groves, seconded by Councilor Zelenka moved to adopt an Ordinance Concerning Multiple-Unit Housing Property Tax Exemption; Amending sections 2.945, 2.946, and 2.947 of the Eugene Code, 1971; and Providing a Sunset Date.

VOTE: 7:1 PASSED (Opposed by Councilor Zelenka)

Councilor Discussion:

• Councilor Clark – asked to receive a report on the program's utilization before two years to make adjustments.

1. WORK SESSION: Police Auditor Selection Process

Interim Co-Director of the Employee Resource Center, Keri Beraldo, presented information on the Police Auditor recruitment process.

Councilor Discussion:

- Councilor Groves asked if the Employee Resource Center will determine how many candidates will be interviewed; asked who served on the selection panel during the last Police Auditor recruitment; asked for a list of current Civilian Review Board and Police Commission members; asked for an overview of the process used for hiring the preceding Police Auditor.
- Councilor Evans noted the job description states a juris doctorate is preferred; asked about education or experience equivalents to a juris doctorate; asked if a candidate without a degree would be considered.

MOTION: Councilor Keating, seconded by Councilor Groves moved to approve the timeline and plan presented in this work session. **VOTE: 8:0 PASSED**

MOTION: Councilor Keating, seconded by Councilor Groves moved to authorize Council leadership to develop a list of panelists and participants to be submitted to Council in a memo, with an opportunity for Council to schedule a work session to discuss the list, if desired. **VOTE: 8:0 PASSED**

2. WORK SESSION: City Manager Update

City Manager, Sarah Medary, provided an update on the USD Clean Fuels project, a proposed biofuel transfer station in the Trainsong area.

Councilor Discussion:

- Councilor Clark asked which government agency would have primary regulatory authority over the facility; stated the need to learn from the regulatory failure of the J.H. Baxter site by ensuring regular communication with the regulatory authority over the proposed project.
- Councilor Groves noted the facility will have thousands of gallons of highly volatile, low flash point fuel in close proximity to a neighborhood; noted the Federal Railroad

Administration has some jurisdiction over the site, but they are understaffed; asked what authority the City has over Bethel Drive; asked when the project will submit a site plan so their safety features can be evaluated; stated he shares the same concerns as local advocates and residents.

- Councilor Zelenka asked for an explanation of the included charts; asked where the tanks would be located; asked about the possibility for the site to be moved north, further from the neighborhood; asked if it is a fuel or railroad facility; stated the difficulty in regulating railroads; noted it is probably a cross-jurisdictional regulatory scheme; stated City overlays and zones do not apply because it is railroad property; asked if the project would trigger the annexation of the property, given that it is located within the Urban Growth Boundary.
- Councilor Yeh noted staff has a neutral role in zoning and permitting decisions; stated the proposed project is inappropriately close a neighborhood; asked about the City's options to reduce the effects of the proposed project on local residents.
- Councilor Evans noted his attendance at a recent community meeting about the proposed transfer station; spoke about the protection provided to the railroads by the 19th century Railroad Acts; asked if there is an evacuation plan for the neighborhood; stated concerns about the condition of Bethel Drive considering the increased heavy vehicle traffic; asked where the trucks will be travelling; asked what areas and businesses the trucks will be servicing.
- Councilor Keating stated 40 trucks travelling from six p.m. to six a.m. is concerning from
 a livability standpoint; noted Union Pacific does not have a good track record when it
 comes to public safety; asked if Union Pacific has one public safety officer for the state;
 asked if Union Pacific would be responsible for public safety at the property; asked if the
 County Commissioners are responsible for the final approval of the project.
- Councilor Clark asked if petroleum based fuels will be transferred at the site; asked if ORS 190 Agreements apply to this situation; asked if the intergovernmental agreement with the County allows Commissioners to overrule to change process once the City has engaged on a question; stated concern about a conflict between the City and the County because the project property falls under City jurisdiction, but nearby homes are under county jurisdiction.
- Councilor Zelenka noted the only decision the City will make is whether the project follows permitting and code requirements; asked about allowable uses for the property; noted the property is unzoned; asked how the anticipated impacts of a potential disaster affects the City's ability to impose regulations on the property; noted the transferred fuels will be renewable and will therefore reduce greenhouse gas emissions; asked if the fuels are flammable.
- Councilor Evans asked if the company could be required to reinforce or rebuild Bethel Drive; noted the road is unimproved and is unlikely to withstand the increased traffic; asked if there will be an Environmental Impact Study done for the project.
- Councilor Groves asked how Bethel Drive is designated; asked if changing the designation of the street would change the use; asked about the City's ability to regulate streets; asked if Bethel Drive can be redesignated from a minor collector to residential; asked about the location of other industrial sites off Bethel Drive; stated his concern that the project property is closely located to a residential neighborhood.

October 28, 2024

- Councilor Leech stated the project is not a good fit for the neighborhood; noted she has met with the company several times to talk about the historical and cultural context as well as the public safety aspects; noted the company is potentially willing to make some changes to the site plans based on her feedback; noted the company stated they had submitted a traffic study; asked if Council could see the traffic study; asked how the daily traffic for the site was determined; noted the company had stated they were allowed 40 trucks a day under their permit; noted the company had stated accountability for that number would be determined with an annual report; asked if the fuel would be for the local market.
- Councilor Clark asked if the railroad tracks were built before the neighborhood; asked if the City had permitted the initial housing built near the tracks; stated the need to prevent housing being built near potentially dangerous sites in the future.
- Councilor Groves noted the railroad tracks were likely initially one line but have continued to expand over the years; asked if the number of daily trucks is determined by the market or the capacity of the site.
- Mayor Vinis noted her appreciation for the briefing and the efforts to ensure community safety and to possibly shift the project's direction; noted the neighborhood is already located near several industrial sites and it is the City's obligation not to compound the situation.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:40 p.m.

- Councilor Leech noted constituents reach out to her regarding the challenges
 residents face living on City property versus County property, including disparities
 in services, laws, and emergency response; noted interest in considering more
 incentives; noted the neighborhood planning process shifted due to Middle Housing,
 Climate Friendly and Equitable Communities, and the Coronavirus pandemic; noted
 the River Road area has lots with development potential; noted the need to address
 increased demand on street parking and for parking minimums as more housing is
 developed; noted interest in solutions to improve parking issues on County and
 unimproved streets.
- Councilor Groves noted the need for parking solutions on narrow, unimproved streets with deep drainage ditches and no sidewalks; noted concern with increased construction density without sufficient off-street parking; noted interest in addressing parking issues throughout Eugene; noted interest in Councilor Clark's potential motion; noted ESF responds to calls in the River Road and Santa Clara area regardless of city limits.

October 30, 2024

- Councilor Clark noted the call volume for Fire and EMS has largely risen since the 1980s, partly due to the increased population in the River Road and Santa Clara area; noted City decisions impact residents living in the River Road and Santa Clara area despite not voting in the City; noted the value of annexation incentives to make the transition more feasible for residents; noted his potential motion would direct staff to explore options for incentivizing voluntary annexation.
- Councilor Yeh asked for a realistic timeline for staff to return with updates; asked about the possibility of maintaining the 2025 timeline, with the option to address some items earlier if feasible; noted support for discussing timelines and adjustments at the 2025 meeting.
- Councilor Leech noted interest in continuing the conversation in conjunction with housing strategies; noted concern with the River Road area's park district shrinking and its funding being compromised as residents annex out; asked for options for managing the district's funding structure, given the district's strong community support; noted interest in Councilor Clark's potential motion.
- Mayor Vinis noted interest in the tax gap between taxes raised and the cost of services; noted there is pressure to both expand housing and address the financial gap; noted interest in receiving information on the budget implications of additional incentives.
- Councilor Clark noted the need for adequate support and a transition plan if annexation proceeds in the park district; noted a renewal of the state legislation that Senator Edwards helped pass is needed to facilitate annexation for non-contiguous properties.

MOTION: Councilor Clark, seconded by Councilor Groves, moved to direct the City Manager to come back to Council in the late winter of 2025 with a plan for voluntary annexation that would include financial incentives, impact on previously existing districts and the City's responsibility or plan for dealing with that and other needed changes of ordinance or changes of state law to accomplish this.

Councilor Discussion:

- Councilor Clark noted the motion is for a plan of action, not for immediate implementation; made a friendly amendment to remove the time consideration *(friendly accepted).*
- Councilor Leech noted interest in the next step being an information session focused on a financial analysis of current fire and service costs in the area, the financial implications, and a deeper dive into potential incentives; noted opposition for the current motion; noted support for a motion for an information session that includes a financial analysis and more details on potential incentives.
- Councilor Groves noted he seconded the motion to move the discussion forward; noted there would be no significant savings from reducing fire response to the unincorporated area, as staffing and facilities remain the same.

- Councilor Leech noted her interest is in having a better understanding of current spending, not stopping services; noted having more information on the challenge of aligning tax benefits with service costs would be valuable for decision-making.
- Councilor Yeh asked if the planned meeting in early 2025 would include a discussion of the different incentive options; noted the need for clarity on the options and the opportunity for Council to review and provide feedback on incentive options before making a decision.
- Mayor Vinis noted the next step may be a work session with a refined focus and a more open-ended timeline.
- Councilor Clark noted the motion's focus should be specifically on voluntary annexation, separate from the broader housing timeline issue; noted openness to adjust the motion to include a future work session if it included potential incentives, financial implications, and the impact of continuing with disjointed development; noted concern with waiting until the end of 2025, but is open to staff feedback feasible timelines.

MOTION WITHDRAWN: Councilor Clark withdrew his motion. Councilor Groves accepted the withdrawal.

Councilor Discussion:

- Councilor Groves noted the need for action as the issue has occurred for too long and should not be delayed further.
- Councilor Clark noted the issue of voluntary annexation should remain separate from the larger housing discussion.
- Councilor Leech asked if the motion could include more information regarding street parking.
- Councilor Keating asked if there were plans for a 2025 follow-up work session on voluntary annexation; asked if the current motion is for a work session poll with action items focusing on how the City will provide incentives and pathways for voluntary annexation; noted the amended motion does not include language about Salem's role or how the City encourages potential changes to state law; asked if the language needs to be articulated more clearly; noted support for the late 2025 timeline; asked what a reasonable timeline is for receiving the requested information if Council passes the amended motion.

MOTION: Councilor Clark, seconded by Councilor Keating, moved to hold a follow up work session to today's work session to discuss incentives for encouraging voluntary annexations and the financial implications of the incentives and the annexations.

Councilor Discussion:

• Councilor Zelenka – noted support for the motion; noted the topic has been an issue since he joined Council; noted support for incentives to help alleviate some confusion regarding the River Road Santa Clara area.

Councilor Discussion:

• Councilor Leech – noted interest in a motion to bring back information for a deeper dive into ways to address parking issues, including the Hatton Avenue solution and neighborhood officers and partners.

MOTION: Councilor Leech, seconded by Councilor Groves, moved to direct the City Manager to provide the Council with a memorandum that outlines the potential steps for addressing parking issues within the incorporated and unincorporated areas.

Councilor Discussion:

- Councilor Keating asked if the memorandum could include mechanisms to curb predatory towing, which may become a growing problem in Eugene as parking spaces decrease and more homes are built.
- Councilor Leech declined to include mechanisms to curb predatory towing in the memorandum; noted she requested a separate session on vehicular camping and towing; noted desire to focus the memorandum on the River Road and Santa Clara County-City divide.
- Councilor Keating noted interest in working with Councilors Leech and Groves offline to further address predatory towing issues.

VOTE: 7:0 PASSED

Mayor Vinis adjourned the meeting at 1:22 p.m.

Mayor Vinis opened the November 13, 2024, Eugene City Council Work Session in a virtual format.

1. WORK SESSION and POSSIBLE ACTION: Climate-Friendly Areas

City Manager, Sarah Medary, introduced Senior Planner, Leah Rausch, who provided an overview of areas to designate as state-required Climate-Friendly Areas (CFA).

Councilor Discussion:

- Councilor Clark asked if Option 2 is more expensive on a local basis than Option 1; asked if staff anticipate the transportation gap analysis for lower Coburg Road to reflect a large amount of work needed to be done by the City; asked if Option 1 fully complies with the State mandate.
- Councilor Groves noted concern with overextending resources and going beyond the minimum requirements; noted preference for Option 1 and starting with the minimum requirements.
- Councilor Zelenka asked if the initiative comes from a state mandate and is not a City initiative; asked if Council must choose one of the options and cannot "do nothing"; asked if there are other incentives besides Multi-Unit Property Tax Exemptions (MUPTE); noted MUPTE is currently only in the downtown core and Option 1 would expand it to the Coburg Road area; noted Option 2 and Option 3 would require a larger expansion of the MUPTE; noted the costs are the opportunity costs of MUPTE and the transportation system developments that will occur; noted previous public opposition to rezoning in the South Willamette area; noted preference for Option 1 and expanding slowly.
- Councilor Evans noted the Lane Transit District recently received a mobility management grant from the Federal Transit Administration; asked how the grant and mobility management work with how the City moves forward with CFA plans; noted interest in integrating the grant into the CFA framework to enhance transportation access and gain insight into how mobility management interfaces with the fixed route system and supports climate action goals.
- Councilor Leech noted support for creating a more walkable and bikeable City; noted concern with the workload involved and balancing staff capacity and

November 13, 2024

priorities; noted support for Option 1; asked when the next option is to choose designated areas; noted the potential for redevelopment in the Valley River Center; asked how the City can require essential services to create walkable neighborhoods with the program.

- Councilor Yeh noted the importance of access to local services; noted opposition to Option 3; noted support for Option 1 with the option to revisit and expand the program; noted interest in evaluating progress before the eight-year mark.
- Councilor Keating noted support for a cautious approach due to the expenses from the local implementation of previous housing policy reform; cautioned against advancing incentives for non-tier-one transit corridors without Emerald Express lines; asked for how much the City has spent responding to challenges to its housing policy reforms exceeding State minimum standards; noted support for Option 1.
- Mayor Vinis asked if there are disadvantages to not designating more areas or not selecting Option 2 as recommended by the Planning Commission and staff.

MOTION: Councilor Keating, seconded by Councilor Groves, moved to initiate land use code and plan amendments and to direct the City Manager to prepare a package of code and plan amendments designating as Climate-Friendly Areas those areas identified in Option 1, as described in the AIS.

VOTE: 8:0 PASSED

2. WORK SESSION: Eugene Youth Opportunities and Challenges City Manager, Sarah Medary, introduced Library, Recreation, and Cultural Services (LRCS) Director, Joshua Bates, who provided an overview of the critical challenges impacting youth and information on youth outcomes locally and nationally.

Councilor Discussion:

- Councilor Clark asked if 22 percent and 16 percent of the budget is allocated to the Fire Department and LRCS respectively; noted interest in the City focusing on its core functions rather than expanding into areas typically overseen by County and State agencies, such as health and mental health; asked if the City is interacting with the County and School Districts in the best way possible to address the mental health concerns.
- Councilor Leech noted her career has been focused on children's behavioral health in the local area; noted the importance of supporting parents' mental health as a foundation for children's well-being; noted challenges parents currently face raising children in a technology-driven world; noted the need for tools and resources to support families; noted support for preventive measures to reduce long-term costs related to enforcement, crime, and other social issues.
- Councilor Zelenka noted concern with the mental health and substance abuse rates; noted the significant impact of mental health challenges on the community; noted concern with future funding at the federal level; noted interest in how the City

November 13, 2024

can help address the mental health issues; noted concern with only prioritizing services like police and fire; asked where the City can do more.

- Councilor Groves noted the societal responsibility to prepare the next generation and acknowledged the value of youth programs; noted concern with overextending fiscal resources, noting the City's financial constraints and the need for balance; noted the library has grown much more than the fire department; noted interest in how the City can work with the County for mental health work; noted the City's role is to provide sports, recreational facilities, and non-profit partnerships to assist with the mental health issues in youth.
- Councilor Evans noted the deep impact of inadequate mental health services on individuals close to his family; noted the urgency of addressing mental health issues in the community, particularly in collaboration with the county, school districts, and other partners; noted the need for more resources to support those struggling with mental health; noted the need for more comprehensive support in the community.
- Councilor Yeh noted the importance of investing in youth as they are the future leaders and contributors to the community; noted the need to provide the tools and environments for youth to thrive, as this impacts the entire community; asked how the City can provide further support; asked how the City gathers feedback from younger generations.
- Councilor Clark asked how Council can help leverage partnerships with other municipalities and jurisdictions for better outcomes; noted interest in how the City can work more effectively with the County and other partners in addressing mental health issues; noted concern with emails from the Eugene Library Foundation regarding zero general fund dollars being allocated to the library; asked for clarification on the library's budget.
- Councilor Leech noted interest in focusing on preventative work like communityand connection-building to reduce isolation; noted the City has a unique capacity to do City level work as it is tasked with the safety of its people; noted the youth are not safe; mental health is not solely tied to the availability of therapists but also to creating safe, supportive environments for individuals; noted interest in further using community centers and spaces to host programs that foster connection and support, while considering ways to work within the city's budget and seek additional partners.

MOTION: Councilor Keating, seconded by Councilor Clark, moved to extend the meeting by ten minutes.

VOTE: 8:0 PASSED

• Councilor Evans – asked how the City is ensuring increased access to mental health and community services for marginalized youth, particularly youth of color and LGBTQIA+ youth; noted concern with aberrant behaviors in schools and the

challenges these marginalized youth face; asked how existing resources are being enhanced and expanded, despite budget constraints.

- Councilor Keating expressed appreciation for a recent presentation at a Eugene Public Library Foundation event; noted the importance of addressing the high rates of suicide among youth, as it is the second leading cause of death for ages 5 to 18; noted support for policies around firearm safety, including safe storage, background checks, and firearm-free public spaces; noted 25 percent of adults are realizing mental health distress; noted mental health work is important with the current social and political climate; asked if addressing mental health concerns is the City's role alone; noted support for strengthening partnerships with local organizations and non-profits, to address mental health concerns across generations; noted support for society to destigmatize mental health support.
- Mayor Vinis noted the public values the library as shown by the successful renewal of the library levy; noted former Fire Chief Zaludek linked literacy and survival in emergencies like fires; noted a student from the Youth Advisory Council expressed hope that adults were paying attention to the struggles of youth after Bates' presentation; noted a short term funding crisis should not determine the long term solution of investing in the youth.

Mayor Vinis adjourned the meeting at 1:39 p.m.

ISSUE STATEMENT

The City of Eugene Public Works Engineering Division is requesting that the City Council approve the annexation of a portion of Wilkes Drive right-of-way, a portion of River Loop 1 right-of-way, and a portion of River Loop 2 right-of-way into the Eugene City limits.

BACKGROUND

The City of Eugene's Public Works Department is requesting the annexation of portions of Wilkes Drive, River Loop 1, and River Loop 2 rights-of-way. The proposed annexation includes an approximately .14-mile portion of Wilkes Drive between River Road and River Loop 1; a piece of land owned by Lane County, which has been dedicated as public right-of-way but is not developed as a street; a .14-mile portion of River Loop 1 between Wilkes Drive and the Urban Growth Boundary (UGB); and a .25-mile portion of River Loop 2 between Robbie Street and the UGB. These portions of right-of-way are within the City's UGB. A map showing the locations of the street sections proposed for annexation is included as Attachment A to this AIS.

No private property is included in this request. This request comes to Council as part of an ongoing collaboration between the City of Eugene and Lane County for the development of the Santa Clara Community Park and surrounding area. The proposed portions of River Loop 1 and 2 abut the <u>Santa Clara Community Park</u> property to the north and east. Wilkes Drive abuts the park on the south and extends to River Road to the west. Phase 1 of the Santa Clara Community Park development project was completed this year. Following the annexation and jurisdictional transfer of the rights-of-way, the City plans to complete frontage improvements in the rights-of-way of Wilkes Drive, River Loop 1 and River Loop 2 as part of Santa Clara Community Park Phase 2 construction.

Currently, the portions of the Wilkes Drive, River Loop 1, and River Loop 2 rights-of-way proposed for annexation are served by a mix of Lane County and City of Eugene infrastructure. After annexation, a jurisdictional transfer will take place, which means the City will obtain ownership of the infrastructure and assume maintenance and operational responsibility for the infrastructure within the rights-of-way.

In addition to the planned street improvements associated with the Santa Clara Community Park, this annexation provides the benefit of creating clear, consistent jurisdictional boundaries for service provision, which increases the effectiveness and efficiency of these services. As with many rights-of-way in this area, jurisdictional boundaries between the City and Lane County can be unclear and may be difficult to locate on the ground. Additionally, annexation of these sections of right-of-way will result in more properties being contiguous to the city limits and thus eligible for voluntary annexation and possibly additional housing development.

To encourage compact urban growth and sequential development within Eugene's UGB, the Metro Plan provides that ultimately all land within the UGB (including streets) will be annexed into the City and provided with a minimum level of urban services. Approval of annexation requests is based on the criteria at Eugene Code (EC) 9.7825 which require that (1) the land proposed to be annexed is within the City's UGB and is contiguous to the City limits or separated from City limits only by a right-of-way or water body; (2) the proposed annexation is consistent with the applicable policies in the Metro Plan and in any applicable refinement plans and (3) the proposed annexation will result in a boundary in which the minimal level of key urban facilities and services can be provided in an orderly, efficient, and timely manner. Findings demonstrating that the annexation request is consistent with these approval criteria are included as Exhibit C of Attachment B to this AIS.

To provide nearby property owners and residents an opportunity to review and comment on this annexation request, public notice was provided to all owners and occupants of property within 500 feet of the annexation area, and the affected neighborhood association (Santa Clara Community Organization), consistent with Eugene Code requirements. The City did not receive any testimony in response to the public notice.

Referral comments were provided by affected agencies including City of Eugene Public Works and Eugene Water & Electric Board. These referral comments confirm that the property can be provided with the minimum level of key urban services consistent with the approval criteria. Given the findings of compliance, ability to provide key urban services, and absence of public testimony, a public hearing is not recommended in this instance.

A full copy of all materials in the record is also available at the Permit and Information Center located at 99 West 10th Avenue, which is open from 12 p.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. 

The City Council of the City of Eugene finds that:

A. An annexation application was submitted by the City of Eugene on October 16, 2024, in accordance with the provisions of Section 9.7810 of the Eugene Code, 1971, ("EC") for annexation to the City of Eugene of street rights-of-way identified as that portion of the Wilkes Drive right-of-way between River Road and River Loop 1; that portion of the River Loop 1 right-of-way between Wilkes Drive and the Urban Growth Boundary; and that portion of the River Loop 2 right-of-way between the Urban Growth Boundary and Robbie Street (Assessor's Map Nos. 17-04-02-43, 17-04-02-44, 17-04-01-33, and 17-04-01-34; 17-04-01; And 17-04-01-31 and 17-04-01-32)).

B. The rights-of-way proposed to be annexed are depicted on the map attached as Exhibit A to this Resolution. The legal description of the rights-of-way proposed to be annexed are attached to this Resolution as Exhibit B.

C. The City's Planning Director has submitted a written recommendation that the application be approved based on the criteria of EC 9.7825. The Planning Director's Findings and Recommendation are attached to this Resolution as Exhibit C.

D. On November 8, 2024, a notice containing a description of the street rights-of-way to be annexed and the Planning Director's preliminary recommendation was mailed to the applicant, owners and occupants of properties located within 500 feet of the perimeter of the areas to be annexed, and to the Santa Clara Community Organization. The notice advised that the City Council would consider the Planning Director's full recommendation on the proposed annexation on December 9, 2024.

E. After considering the Planning Director's recommendation, the City Council finds that the application should be approved.

NOW, THEREFORE,



Policy 15. Ultimately, land within the UGB shall be annexed to a city and provided with the required minimum level of urban facilities and services. While the time frame for annexation may vary, annexation should occur as land transitions from urbanizable to urban. (page II-C-5)

As discussed in this subsection, and further detailed under subsection (3) below, the proposed annexation is consistent with <u>Metro Plan</u> growth management policies. The proposed annexation of these sections of Wilkes Drive, River Loop 1, and River Loop 2 will increase the effectiveness and efficiency of services provided by the City and the allocation of municipal resources.

The <u>River Road - Santa Clara Urban Facilities Plan</u> is an adopted refinement plan for the subject street annexation. Regarding applicable policies within the refinement plan, a portion of the street annexation is within the River Road/Wilkes subarea; however, none of those subarea policies are applicable to the request.

The <u>River Road - Santa Clara Neighborhood Plan</u> (RR/SC NP) is the other, more recently adopted refinement plan applicable to the subject property. None of the Neighborhood Plan Policies in the "Vision Statement – Land Use" section of the RR/SC NP serve as mandatory approval criteria, but the following policies are relevant to the annexation request:

- Policy 5.5 Public Right-of-Way Management: City and County will continue to cooperatively work towards addressing jurisdictional issues in the right of way, including parking, maintenance, street improvements, and annexation issues.
- Policy 17.4 Annexation: Annexation of the River Road and Santa Clara areas will occur only through strict application of state laws and local policies (e.g., ability to extend key urban facilities and services in a timely manner). In each case, Eugene will make every reasonable attempt to provide for annexation only on a voluntary basis and according to prior individual property annexation agreements.

The requested annexation supports Policy 5.5 by annexing right-of-way and transferring the jurisdictional responsibility to the City of Eugene; thus, making annexation more available to adjacent properties and providing clarity on the jurisdictional responsibility for maintenance and future improvements.

In alignment with Policy 17.4, this annexation request is both served by key urban facilities (see below) and is a voluntary annexation. Additionally, this annexation will provide contiguity to other unannexed properties that are currently unable to annex and may choose to annex in the future.

Therefore, based on the findings above, the proposal is consistent with the applicable policies of the <u>Metro Plan</u> and the applicable refinement plans.

Background: As a means of furthering an eventual jurisdictional transfer to the City of Eugene, as well as to support planned infrastructure projects in the proposed annexation area, City of Eugene Public Works is proposing that the section of Wilkes Drive between River Road and River Loop 1 be annexed into the City of Eugene. This section of Wilkes Drive also includes seven different taxlots (*17-04-02-43-00400, 00404, 00405, 00408, 00409, 00412 & 00413*) all owned by Lane County. Per Document No. 2024-027409 these seven taxlots were dedicated as public right-of-way.

The City of Eugene and Lane County executed a memo dated November 29, 2023 (attached) stating that the City of Eugene received FHWA funding to plan and design urban upgrades to improve a section of Wilkes Road up to City standards. As explained in the memo, the streets proposed for annexation are not developed to City standard, in that they are lacking sidewalks, curb and gutter, and other frontage improvements. The City has agreed to construct the street frontage improvements on River Loop 1 and River Loop 2 as part of Phase 2 of the Santa Clara Community Park development. Santa Clara Community Park Phase 1 construction was completed in 2024. The City plans to complete frontage improvements in the right of way of Wilkes Drive, River Loop 1 and River Loop 2 as part of Santa Clara Community Park Phase 2 construction. While it has been past practice to strive for the City to annex (and jurisdictionally transfer) a street that is constructed to City standards, the annexation of these streets surrounding Santa Clara Community Park has been a collaborative process between Lane County and the City of Eugene. In order to meet the agreements made between the City and County, it is in the best interest of the City to acquire these streets and make improvements to the roads as part of the Santa Clara Community Park Park project.

The proposed road annexations benefit an underserved and rapidly urbanizing area of town that was recently brought into the UGB. For years City and County governments collaborated to meet high priority service level goals for Parks, Land Use, Transportation and Trails in the Santa Clara and River Road community. Thousands of engaged neighbors took part in large scale planning efforts in this area and hundreds more participated in the Community Park Master Planning. The road and park annexations work together to create the desired connections of historically isolated neighborhoods to the City's core.

Combined, Santa Clara Community Park and Madison Middle School represent 56 acres of contiguous public lands accessed through the proposed road annexations. A future transportation funded bike lane from south Eugene extends the riverbank trail system to proposed annexations of Wilkes Drive and River Loop 1. From there, the community park's multi-use path, bridge and trails complete the pedestrian and bike trail connection to River Loop 2.

These park trails and paths were funded by The Oregon State Parks Local Government Grant with support from the Eugene Parks Foundation, the Santa Clara Community Organization, and Huerto de la Familia. The Eugene School District 4J fully supported the park's expanded path and trail system as it greatly improves safe routes to school for many of its students and the Santa Clara Community. This proposed road annexation makes our city's systems and infrastructure connected, resilient and secure and provides equitable access to all.

EC9.7825 Annexation- Approval Criteria

(1) The land proposed to be annexed is within the City's Urban Growth Boundary and is:

(a) Contiguous to the city limits; or

(b) Separated from the City only by a public right of way or a stream, bay, lake or other body of water.

From the included site plan, it is clear that this section of Wilkes Drive is within the UGB and contiguous with land in the city limits, thus complying with EC9.8725(1). Within the proposed annexation area, there are multiple annexed properties that have frontage on Wilkes Drive. These properties are a part of tax maps 17-04-02-43, 17-04-02-44, 17-04-01-33, and 17-04-01-34.

EC9.7825(2) The proposed annexation is consistent with applicable policies in the Metro Plan and in any applicable refinement plans.

The Metro Plan contains the policies that are related to this annexation request. The River Road Santa Clara Urban Facilities Plan is the refinement plan applicable to the subject property.

The annexation of this section of Wilkes Drive is consistent with these policies as the proposed annexation will provide clear boundaries between municipalities and will further enhance the existing system of arterial and collector streets.

As previously discussed in this subsection, and further detailed under subsection (3) below, the proposed annexation is consistent with Metro Plan growth management policies and can be served by the minimum level of key urban services.

No additional properties are being served by wastewater due to this annexation being Right-of-Way <u>only</u>.

Location and size of existing wastewater line: This section of Lane County Right-of-Way has a series of existing 8" and 12" PVC wastewater lines constructed in either 1985 or 1995. However, these sections of WW pipe are already owned and maintained by the City of Eugene.

Zero properties will be served by an extension of an existing gravity wastewater line.

Where will a wastewater line be extended from? When will it be extended? By whom?

No properties requiring wastewater service are include in this application. This section of Lane County Right of Way does have a series of existing 8" and 12" PVC wastewater lines. This section of wastewater pipe is already owned and maintained by the City of Eugene.

Stormwater- Currently, this section of Wilkes Drive is served by both Lane County and City of Eugene Stormwater infrastructure. The stormwater infrastructure is located sporadically through out Wilkes Drive, this infrastructure includes 30" stormwater mainlines, manholes, curb inlets, culverts and open channels (see included maps for detail). After the annexation of this section of Wilkes Drive a Jurisdictional Transfer will take place shortly after. The Jurisdictional Transfer will have the City of Eugene assume maintenance and operational responsibility for all of the stormwater infrastructure present.

Is the site currently served by an approved stormwater system?

Yes, Lane County currently owns a portion of the stormwater facilities but after the jurisdictional transfer which will occur shortly after the annexation, the City of Eugene will take ownership and maintenance responsibilities of those facilities.

The City of Eugene also owns and will continue to own and maintain a smaller portion of public storm system within the Right-of-Way after the annexation.

If, yes location? The existing stormwater system is located within the right-of-way.

Solid Waste- Solid waste collection service is provided by private firms. Regional disposal sites and the Short Mountain landfill are operated by Lane County.

Natural Gas- Northwest Natural Gas can extend service to any future development in this area.

Communications- A variety of other telecommunications providers offer communication services throughout the Eugene/Springfield area.

Conclusion

Marina Wrensch and Doug Singer forwarded a copy of your email from November 6, 2023, outlining Lane County requirements and requests for improvements along the Santa Clara Community Park frontages on Wilkes Drive, River Loop 1 and River Loop 2.

As you are aware the City and County are having ongoing discussions regarding the long-term ownership of many current county roads within the Eugene UGB and plans to annex and jurisdictionally transfer (A&JT) several roads in 2024 and into the future. The City agrees to apply to City Council to annex and jurisdictionally transfer Wilkes Drive from River Road to River Loop 1, River Loop 1 from the east end of Wilkes Drive east and around the corner to the current north UGB, and River Loop 2 from Robbie Street east to the current UGB. I have directed City staff to start the annexation process with the goal of full A&JT for these road segments in 2024.

We are also aware of the STBG Y230 grant funding the County has secured for the Planning and Engineering phase to design urban upgrades to Wilkes Drive. Along with A&JT, the City will propose taking this project over in anticipation of funding urban upgrades to Wilkes Drive to meet City street standards in the 2027-2030 TIP cycle with Lane County support.

Background: As a means of furthering an eventual jurisdictional transfer to the City of Eugene, as well as to support planned infrastructure projects in the proposed annexation area, City of Eugene Public Works is proposing that the section of River Loop 1 between Wilkes Drive and the Urban Growth Boundary (UGB).

The City of Eugene and Lane County executed a memo dated November 29, 2023 (attached) stating that the City and Lane County agreed to improve River Loop 1 and River Loop 2 to City standards as part of the Santa Clara Community Park improvements. As explained in the memo, the streets proposed for annexation are not developed to City standard, in that they are lacking sidewalks, curb and gutter, and other frontage improvements. The City has agreed to construct the street frontage improvements on River Loop 1 and River Loop 2 as part of Phase 2 of the Santa Clara Community Park development. Santa Clara Community Park Phase 1 construction was completed in 2024. The City plans to complete frontage improvements in the right of way of Wilkes Drive, River Loop 1 and River Loop 2 as part of Santa Clara Community Park Phase 2 construction. While it has been past practice to strive for the City to annex (and jurisdictionally transfer) a street that is constructed to City standards, the annexation of these streets surrounding Santa Clara Community Park has been a collaborative process between Lane County and the City of Eugene. In order to meet the agreements made between the City and County, it is in the best interest of the City to acquire these streets and make improvements to the roads as part of the Santa Clara Community Park project.

The proposed road annexations benefit an underserved and rapidly urbanizing area of town that was recently brought into the UGB. For years City and County governments collaborated to meet high priority service level goals for Parks, Land Use, Transportation and Trails in the Santa Clara and River

Road community. Thousands of engaged neighbors took part in large scale planning efforts in this area and hundreds more participated in the Community Park Master Planning. The road and park annexations work together to create the desired connections of historically isolated neighborhoods to the City's core.

Combined, Santa Clara Community Park and Madison Middle School represent 56 acres of contiguous public lands accessed through the proposed road annexations. A future transportation funded bike lane from south Eugene extends the riverbank trail system to proposed annexations of Wilkes Drive and River Loop 1. From there, the community park's multi-use path, bridge and trails complete the pedestrian and bike trail connection to River Loop 2.

These park trails and paths were funded by The Oregon State Parks Local Government Grant with support from the Eugene Parks Foundation, the Santa Clara Community Organization, and Huerto de la Familia. The Eugene School District 4J fully supported the park's expanded path and trail system as it greatly improves safe routes to school for many of its students and the Santa Clara Community. This proposed road annexation makes our city's systems and infrastructure connected, resilient and secure and provides equitable access to all.

EC9.7825 Annexation- Approval Criteria

(1) The land proposed to be annexed is within the City's Urban Growth Boundary and is:

(a) Contiguous to the city limits; or

(b) Separated from the City only by a public right of way or a stream, bay, lake or other body of water.

From the included site plan, it is clear that this section of River Loop 1 is within the UGB and contiguous with land in the city limits, thus complying with EC9.8725(1). Within the proposed annexation area, there is only one annexed property that has frontage on River Loop 1. This property is a part of tax map 17-04-01.

EC9.7825(2) The proposed annexation is consistent with applicable policies in the Metro Plan and in any applicable refinement plans.

The Metro Plan contains the policies that are related to this annexation request. The River Road Santa Clara Urban Facilities Plan is the refinement plan applicable to the subject property.

The annexation of this section of River Loop 1 is consistent with these policies as the proposed annexation will provide clear boundaries between municipalities and will further enhance the existing system of arterial and collector streets.

As previously discussed in this subsection, and further detailed under subsection (3) below, the proposed annexation is consistent with Metro Plan growth management policies and can be served by the minimum level of key urban services.

EC9.7825(3) The proposed annexation will result in a boundary in which the minimum level of key urban facilities and services, as defined in the Metro Plan, can be provided in an orderly efficient, and timely manner.

Emergency medical transport (i.e., ambulance) services- *This area is currently served by City of Eugene Fire & EMS Department. After annexation, this section of Right-of-Way will still be under Eugene/Springfield Fire and EMS jurisdiction.*

Planning and Development Services- *Planning and building permit services are provided to the area outside the city limits but within urban growth boundary by the City of Eugene. This service will continue after annexation.*

Electric Service- *EWEB* has existing electric overhead and underground service running through this segment of River Loop 2 that is proposed to be annexed.

Water Service- *EWEB* has an existing water main running through this segment of River Loop 2 that is proposed to be annexed.

Solid Waste- Solid waste collection service is provided by private firms. Regional disposal sites and the Short Mountain landfill are operated by Lane County.

Natural Gas- Northwest Natural Gas can extend service to any future development in this area.

Communications- A variety of other telecommunications providers offer communication services throughout the Eugene/Springfield area.

Conclusion

Based on the above findings, the proposed annexation complies with applicable approval criteria. From a consistency of service and perspective and to allow for a jurisdictional transfer, the annexation of this section of River Loop 2 is the next logical step. The intent of the proposed annexation is that of completeness and consistency of services.

Sasha,

Marina Wrensch and Doug Singer forwarded a copy of your email from November 6, 2023, outlining Lane County requirements and requests for improvements along the Santa Clara Community Park frontages on Wilkes Drive, River Loop 1 and River Loop 2.

As you are aware the City and County are having ongoing discussions regarding the long-term ownership of many current county roads within the Eugene UGB and plans to annex and jurisdictionally transfer (A&JT) several roads in 2024 and into the future. Portions of Wilkes Drive, River Loop 1 and River Loop 2 have been part of those discussions.

The City agrees to apply to City Council to annex and jurisdictionally transfer Wilkes Drive from River Road to River Loop 1, River Loop 1 from the east end of Wilkes Drive east and around the corner to the current north UGB, and River Loop 2 from Robbie Street east to the current UGB. I have directed City staff to start the annexation process with the goal of full A&JT for these road segments in 2024.

City staff have reviewed the TIA for Santa Clara Community Park Phase 1. The City agrees to work with County staff to determine the scope and design of safety improvements for River Loop 2 recommended from the TIA and add the improvements to the phase 1 construction of the park.

The City plans to complete frontage improvements in the right of way of Wilkes Drive, River Loop 1 and River Loop 2 as part of Santa Clara Community Park Phase 2 construction. I have directed City Project Team staff to design frontage improvements to Santa Clara Community Park that will meet the (draft) *Design Standards and Guidelines for Eugene Streets, Sidewalks, Bikeways and Access Ways.*

We are also aware of the STBG Y230 grant funding the County has secured for the Planning and Engineering phase to design urban upgrades to Wilkes Drive. Along with A&JT, the City will propose taking this project over in anticipation of funding urban upgrades to Wilkes Drive to meet City street standards in the 2027-2030 TIP cycle with Lane County support.

ISSUE STATEMENT

Council approval of the third Supplemental Budget for 2023-2025 biennium is requested after a public hearing.

BACKGROUND

Oregon Local Budget Law (ORS 294.471) allows for supplemental budgets in the event of "an occurrence or condition that is not ascertained when preparing the original budget or a previous supplemental budget for the current year or current budget period and that requires a change in financial planning." ORS 294.471 also allows for a supplemental budget if there are, "funds that are made available by another unit of federal, state or local government and the availability of which could not reasonably be foreseen when preparing the original budget or a previous supplemental budget for the current year or current budget period." This Supplemental Budget does not authorize any increase in the property tax levy and has been published in compliance with the Oregon Local Budget Law.

The 2023-2025 biennium represents the first biennial budget cycle for the City of Eugene. While the City is now on a two-year budget cycle, the City is maintaining an annual financial audit cycle and will continue to produce the Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR) each year. In the second year of the biennium, the December supplemental budget will not reconcile audit adjustments or allocate Marginal Beginning Working Capital (MBWC) and is much smaller than the typical December supplemental budget associated with an annual budget cycle.

This third supplemental budget of the 2023-2025 biennium recognizes new revenue, authorizes other unanticipated changes in legal appropriations, implements General Fund budget gap strategies, and includes one-time funding for strategic initiatives. A summary of items included in this supplemental budget is presented below.

Appropriations are organized by the <u>City of Eugene Strategic Plan</u> Key Focus Areas. The strategic plan provides overall direction and organizational focus for the 2023-2026 period and was approved by Council on July 26, 2023. The plan is designed to position the

organization to focus on issues identified by the community and organization as top priorities, and provides guidance for our programs and services, while also recognizing resource constraints. Key Focus Areas include Urgent Community Needs, Culture of Belonging, Communication and Outreach, and Organizational Wellbeing.

General Fund items included in this supplemental budget consist of revenue-backed additions, General Fund budget gap strategies, one-time funding requests, and administrative adjustments. A summary of these items is included in Attachment A.

Supplemental budget changes impact the General Fund Reserve for Revenue Shortfall (RRSF). The General Fund RRSF acts as the City's "savings account" and provides stability and flexibility in uncertain economic times. The supplemental budget action will increase the RRSF by \$237,500. Details on changes impacting the RRSF can be found in Attachment A.

Changes to Non General Funds are also included in this supplemental budget. The largest component of the Non General Fund supplemental budget items are for grants and new revenue, which fund new and existing projects. One-time and reappropriation requests are also included for items that were not anticipated at the time of budget adoption. This supplemental budget also includes items that support General Fund budget gap strategies,

and some administrative adjustments. See Attachment B for detail on Non General Fund requests.

RELATED CITY POLICIES

The <u>City of Eugene Strategic Plan</u> outlines direction and organizational priorities for the 2023-2026 period. This item is related to the key focus area of Organizational Wellbeing.

PREVIOUS COUNCIL DIRECTION

The supplemental budget includes some budget changes as a result of previous Council direction and discussion. Some of the recent Council meetings that have resulted in supplemental budget appropriations include, but are not limited to:

June 26, 2023 Meeting

City Council held a public hearing and took action to adopt the 2023-2025 Biennial Budget for the City of Eugene as recommended by the Budget Committee, that includes motions made by the Budget Committee and City Council, and the Capital Carryover and Reserve for Encumbrance.

Councilor Groves, seconded by Councilor Keating, moved to approve Resolution Electing to Receive State Revenue Sharing Funds Pursuant to Section 221.770 of Oregon Revised Statutes. *Passed 8:0*

Councilor Groves, seconded by Councilor Keating, moved to approve a Resolution Adopting the Budget, with the Addition of the City Manager's Proposal to Add \$160,000 to the Community Safety Payroll Tax Fund for Prevention and Youth Related Programming and Materials, and Making Appropriations for the City of Eugene for the Biennium Beginning July 1, 2023 and Ending June 30, 2025. *Passed 8:0*

Councilor Clark, seconded by Councilor Yeh, moved to amend the 2023-2025 Budget to move \$50,000 from the Road Fund to the Transportation Capital Project Fund to provide funding for a traffic calming project on Holly Avenue between Gilham and Norkenzie roads. *Passed 8:0*

December 11, 2023 Meeting

City Council held a public hearing and took action on the 2023-2025 Biennium December Supplemental Budget:

Councilor Groves, seconded by Councilor Keating, moved to adopt a resolution adopting a supplemental budget; making appropriations for the City of Eugene for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023 and ending June 30, 2025. *Passed 7:0*

May 13, 2024 Work Session

Council directed the City Manager to schedule a public hearing for an ordinance concerning charges for stormwater and parks service and amending Section 6.406 of the Eugene Code, 1971 with the following motion:

Councilor Keating, seconded by Councilor Groves, moved to direct the City Manager to schedule a public hearing on an ordinance amending the definition of "stormwater service" to add the operation and maintenance of city-owned parks and open space as set out in Attachment A to this AIS. *Passed 7:1 (Opposed by Councilor Clark)*

June 17, 2024 Meeting

Council held a public hearing for an ordinance concerning charges for stormwater and parks service and amending Section 6.406 of the Eugene Code, 1971. One person testified on behalf of the Eugene Chamber of Commerce Local Government Affairs Council which did not take a formal position on the ordinance.

June 24, 2024 Meeting

The City Council approved the second supplemental budget for the 2023-2025 biennium. Actions included General Fund Budget Gap Strategies and other one-time items:

Councilor Grovers, seconded by Councilor Zelenka, moved to adopt a resolution adopting a Supplemental Budget; making appropriations for the City of Eugene for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023 and ending June 30, 2025. *Passed 7:0*

Also during this meeting the City Council took action to expand the definition of "stormwater service" to add the operation and maintenance of city-owned parks and open spaces.

Councilor Groves, seconded by Councilor Zelenka, moved to adopt an Ordinance amending Section 6.406 of the Eugene Code, 1971 as set forth in Attachment A in the AIS.

Passed 5:2 (Opposed: Councilors Semple and Clark)

October 14, 2024 Meeting

The City Council, acting as the Urban Renewal Agency (URA) Board, approved the purchase of the North Butterfly Lot and the 8th and Pearl Lot and transfer ownership from the City to the URA:

Councilor Groves, seconded by Councilor Zelenka, moved to offer to purchase the North Butterfly Lot for \$1,060,000 and the 8th and Pearl Lot for \$1,020,000 from the City of Eugene and direct the Agency Director to include \$210,000 from the

Downtown Urban Renewal District and \$170,000 from the Riverfront Urban Renewal District for these purchases in the December 2024 Supplemental Budget and take all necessary actions to acquire the properties. *Passed 7:0*

COUNCIL OPTIONS

Particular requests requiring more information or discussion may be removed from the supplemental budget and delayed for action to a future supplemental budget. In certain cases, there may be a financial or legal impact to delaying budget approval. These impacts may include Oregon Local Budget Law violations due to exceeding the legal appropriation levels. Council may also adopt amended appropriation amounts or funding sources for specific requests in the supplemental budget.

CITY MANAGER'S RECOMMENDATION

The City Manager recommends approval of the resolution in Attachment D adopting the 2023-2025 Biennium Third Supplemental Budget.

This supplemental budget includes General Fund grants and revenue-backed requests, budget gap strategies, one-time requests and administrative adjustments. Total funding for these items is \$2.5 million. Included below are summaries of these supplemental budget requests organized by type and by the <u>City of Eugene Strategic Plan</u> Key Focus Areas.

Urgent Community Needs

Body Worn Camera, In-Car Video & Digital Storage Grant: Recognizes \$963,000 in grant funding from the Department of Justice to provide equipment for EPD Body Worn Cameras, In-Car Video and Digital Storage. This purchase expands EPD's Body Worn Camera and In-Car video programs. It ensures all impacted staff and their related vehicles are outfitted with body worn cameras and in-car video systems and ensures adequate space for digital evidence and media storage.

Oregon Retail Theft Grant: Recognizes \$391,000 in grant funding from the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission to provide equipment, software and overtime funding for the Police department to combat organized retail theft.

Track Trials Reimbursable Overtime: Recognizes one-time revenue from Track Town Events, LLC. and establishes budget authority for overtime incurred related to the Olympic Trials in June 2024.

Lane County All-In Shelter Grant: Recognizes \$245,000 in grant funding from Lane County for additional spending authority for the All-In Shelter Grant. Previous supplemental budgets added \$5.9 million in funding (\$3 million in December 2023 and \$2.9 million in June 2024) to support the City's Safe Sleep sites through FY25, including upgrading and adding new beds and continuing operations as part of a State of Oregon emergency funding initiative.

Urban Growth Strategies Equity Atlas Amendment: Adds \$30,000 to an existing State Department of Land Conservation and Development grant to support the Urban Growth Strategies project. Funds will expand the equity and outreach portion to include the creation of an Equity Atlas, a graphic tool that explains demographic patterns.

Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) Grants:

DUII Enforcement Grant: \$30,000 from ODOT to provide funding for overtime DUII enforcement.

Speed Enforcement Grant: \$20,000 from ODOT to provide funding for overtime relating to speed enforcement.

Distracted Driving Enforcement Grant: \$15,000 from ODOT to provide funding for overtime relating to distracted driving enforcement.

Safety Belt Traffic Grant: \$10,000 from ODOT to provide funding for overtime relating to safety belt enforcement.

The supplemental budget includes \$380,000 from General Fund Budget Gap Strategies that will increase the Reserve for Revenue Shortfall.

Organizational Wellbeing

URA Land Acquisition Revenue Adjustment: The June 2024 Supplemental Budget included a General Fund Budget Gap Strategy to sell two parcels of City property to the Urban Renewal Agency. The Supplemental Budget included an estimate of \$850,000 per parcel being sold. The appraisal for the properties is complete, and the City will receive an additional \$210,000 from the Downtown District for the sale of the North Butterfly Lot and \$170,000 from the Riverfront District for the sale of the 8th and Pearl Lot. This amount reflects an increase in revenue for the General Fund that will be added to the Reserve for Revenue Shortfall.

Transfer Parks Eligible Expenditures: Per City Council action, \$1,100,000 and 8.20 FTE of Parks and Open Space expenses in the Public Works department are shifting from the General Fund to the Stormwater Fund. Changes to FTE are intended to be ongoing, and will be included in the 2025-2027 operating budget.

Remove FY25 New Revenue Placeholder: The 2023-2025 Adopted Budget included a General Fund placeholder revenue strategy of \$8,270,000. General Fund Budget Gap Strategies reduced this placeholder by \$6,738,000 on the previous Supplemental Budget. This Supplemental Budget further reduces this placeholder by \$1,100,000 due to the transfer of Parks Eligible Expenditures shifting from the General Fund to the Stormwater Fund.

Opioid Funding Reconciliation: Reduces \$28,00 from the Planning and Development budget to reconcile the City's contribution to the Lane County Human Services Commission (HSC) with funds from opioid settlement revenue. The HSC transfer has been fully funded, and the remaining \$28,000 originally budgeted, but not needed will return to the opioid reserves.

Urgent Community Needs

Asphalt Apron Rehabilitation: Recognizes grant funding of \$10,650,000 in the Municipal Airport Fund (510) from the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) to support rehabilitating the asphalt apron at Concourse A of the Eugene Airport. The terminal ramp area is constructed of asphalt pavement that is in fair and poor condition, and has reached the end of its usable life. The project will focus on rehabilitating the existing asphalt apron with possible isolated areas of reconstruction.

Ferry St. Bridge Rehabilitation: Recognizes grant funding of \$1,867,000 in the Transportation Capital Projects Fund (340) from the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) to strengthen the Ferry St. Bridge over sections of the Southern Pacific Railroad, 4th, 6th, and 7th avenues.

Bike Share Operations and Expansion: Recognizes grant funding of \$669,000 in the Road Fund (131) from the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) for activities related to Bike Share Operations & Expansion. This grant will expand access to the bike share system by adding bikes in the network, expanding the network area, increasing access to low-income community members, improving outreach and marketing, and providing additional transportation options.

Alternative Response Unit: Provides \$642,000 in funding to the Ambulance Transport Fund (592) from the State to add an Alternative Response Unit to divert low acuity cases to urgent care after the University District Emergency Room closing. The Alternative Response Unit will be staffed with paramedics and nurse practitioner and will transport patients to Urgent Care Facility instead of the Emergency Room.

Airport Runway Wetland Mitigation: Recognizes grant funding of \$505,000 in the Municipal Airport Fund (510) from the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) to support wetland mitigation at Airport Runway 34R. The projected cost of this existing project exceeded initial estimates due to elevated construction costs, prompting the allocation of additional funds. Mitigation of wetlands at the approach end of this runway will improve safety for aircraft operations.

Sustainable Management and Net Zero Energy: Recognizes grant funding of \$400,000 in the Municipal Airport Fund (510) from the FAA to develop a Sustainable Management and Net Zero Energy Plan. This plan will help the Airport meet the FAA's Airports Climate Challenge and Aviation Climate Action Plan objectives and the aviation industry's goal of net zero emissions by 2050.

8th Avenue Streetscape and Bikeway: Recognizes grant funding of \$285,000 in the Transportation Capital Projects Fund (340) from the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT). The projected cost of this existing project exceeded initial estimates, prompting the allocation of additional funds.

Vision Zero Intersection Study: Recognizes grant funding of \$223,000into the Road Fund (131) from the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) for consultant work on the Vision Zero Intersection Study. The study will inform future safety projects and includes the analysis of safety conditions and identification of design improvements at high crash intersections within the City of Eugene.

Large Employer Trip Reduction: Recognizes grant funding of \$162,000 in the Road Fund (131) from the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) for activities related to Large Employer Trip Reduction work. The project will expand the existing Transportation Options Program, which provides public education and outreach to encourage people to use alternative modes of transportation to reduce the volume of traffic on the roadway system.

Eugene Quick Build: Recognizes grant funding of \$123,000 in the Transportation Capital Projects Fund (340) from the Lane Council of Governments (LCOG) for the installation of temporary traffic installations to research street treatment impact on speed reduction and overall traffic safety improvements.

Community Energy Resilience: Recognizes grant funding of \$100,000 in the Municipal Airport Fund (510) from the Oregon Department of Energy (ODOE) to begin a project to provide clean backup power to critical facilities and loads at the Eugene Airport. The project progresses the City towards our Climate Action Plan 2.0 goals by encouraging decarbonization and providing an alternative to major contributors of greenhouse gas emissions.

Electric Vehicle Chargers and Solar Installation: Recognizes grant funding of \$100,000 in the Municipal Airport Fund (510) from the Oregon Department of Energy (ODOE) to begin a project to add electronic vehicle chargers for 16 parking spaces. The addition of electric vehicle chargers and associated renewable solar energy will help to advance Eugene Airport in its sustainability goals and overall City Climate Action Plan.

Health Preparedness Emergency Exercise: Recognizes grant funding of \$60,000 in the Ambulance Transport Fund (592) from the Oregon Health Authority to provide an emergency disaster training event for Eugene Springfield Fire.

South Willamette Landscape Project: Recognizes grant funding of \$26,000 in the Stormwater Utility Fund (539) from the Oregon Department of Forestry (ODF) for the South Willamette Landscape Resiliency Project. The South Willamette Landscape Resiliency project will treat 150 acres of hazardous fuels, with a focus on oak restoration for private lands.

Trainsong Park Pollution Remediation: Recognizes grant funding of \$26,000 in the General Capital Projects Fund (310) from the Environmental Protection Agency to fund Trainsong Park pollution remediation. Remediation work at the park is necessary to remove the toxin-laden soil.

One-Time Requests

Urgent Community Needs

Regional Wastewater Utility Fund Alignment: Increases the Wastewater Utility Fund (530) by \$2,112,000 to align the Metropolitan Wastewater Management Commission (MWMC) FY25 annual budget with the City of Eugene 2023-2025 biennial budget. Due to timing differences between the two entities, supplemental budgets are necessary to bring the two different budget periods into alignment.

Stormwater/Wastewater Application Software: Increases the Stormwater Utility Fund (539) budget by \$605,000 and the Wastewater Utility Fund (530) budget by \$425,000 for contract development support for the City's Stormwater/Wastewater Application and ongoing cloud services costs.

Capital Bond Premium Adjustment: Increases the General Capital Projects Fund (310) by \$899,000 to recognize the Bond Premium achieved in the last bond sale. As a result of the bidding environment at the time of sale, the City received additional bond proceeds above the par amount, derived from the difference between the stated interest rates on the bonds and the yields at time of sale. The additional funds will be allocated to the following capital projects:

Santa Clara Community Park: Increases the System Development Capital Projects Fund (330) by \$465,000 to increase funding for the Santa Clara Community Park. Additional funding of \$365,000 is needed due to a shortfall in partner agency fundraising efforts and

an additional \$100,000 is needed due to the costs of this existing project exceeding initial estimates.

Amazon Mitigation Bank: Increases the Stormwater Utility Fund (539) by \$294,000 to increase Amazon Mitigation bank work due to work exceeding original estimates.

City Hall Security Improvements: Increases the General Capital Projects (310) by \$153,000 to fund the purchase of City Council Chambers security screening equipment. Funds are transferred from the Risk and Benefits Fund (620).

Delta Ponds Loop Trail Extension: Increases the System Development Capital Projects Fund (330) by \$150,000 for Delta Ponds Loop Trail Extension due to required re-engineering of the design of the boardwalk.

W. Irwin Pump Station Public Art Contribution: Increases the Wastewater Utility Fund (530) by \$67,000 to contribute 1% of the West Irwin Pump Station project budget to the Public Art Subfund (319) per the requirements of Ordinance 18849.

Street and Vacation Revenue: Increases the Transportation Capital Projects Fund (340) by \$45,000 from revenue from Street Vacation Ordinance 20709. This ordinance transfers ownership from the right-of-way located at Premier Street and a portion of First Avenue West from the City to private ownership. This vacation grants the City a public utility easement on the property. The City receives compensation in exchange for approval of a street vacation.

Sheldon Pool Blankets: Reappropriates \$15,000 from FY23 for the purchase of pool blankets at Sheldon Pool. This item was inadvertently omitted during the reappropriations process of a previous supplemental budget.

Alton Baker Park Land Swap Revenue: Increases the Library, Parks, and Recreation Special Revenue Fund (180) by \$2,002,000 for payments in-lieu of construction from the University of Oregon for development of Cuthbert Park, East Parking Lot, and Kayak/Canoe Launch projects as part of the Alton Baker Park land swap agreement.

River Road Jurisdictional Transfer Revenue: Increases the Transportation Capital Projects Fund (340) by \$940,000 for revenue associated with the jurisdictional transfer of River Road and Irvington Drive from Lane County to the City to pay for needed capital upgrades for sidewalk access ramps.

Capital Project Reimbursable Expenses: Increases the Transportation Capital Projects Fund (340) by \$504,000 to the Transportation Capital Projects Fund (340) and \$44,000 to the Stormwater Utility Fund (539) to recognize revenue from EWEB for reimbursement to the City for eligible project expenses.

City Hall Parking Revenue: Increases the Parking Fund (520) by \$45,000 to recognize new revenue generated from City Hall staff parking permits and special events. Funds are split between the General Fund and the Parking Fund, and \$22,500 will be transferred to the General Fund.

URA Land Acquisition Revenue Adjustment: Increases the General Capital Projects Fund (310) by \$480,000 to recognize revenue from the sale of City property to the Urban Renewal Agency (URA). The previous supplemental budget included a General Fund Budget Gap strategy to sell City property to the URA. The supplemental budget included an estimate of \$850,000 per parcel being sold. The appraisal for the properties is complete, and the City will receive an additional \$210,000 from the Downtown District and \$170,000 from the Riverfront District. This amount will be received by the General Capital projects fund and transferred to the General Fund.

The supplemental budget reduces appropriations by \$0.3 million and 5.0 FTE for Non General Fund administrative adjustments. These adjustments are for corrections related to prior budget actions:

Urgent Community Needs

CDBG Loans to Operating: Shifts \$195,000 from CDBG loans to operational programming in the Community Development Fund (170). Through the adoption of the FY25 Action Plan and changes to program focus, allocations previously made available for loans are being reallocated for operational programming.

Culture of Belonging

Public Art Funding for Riverfront Parks: Increases the General Capital Projects Fund (310) by \$150,000to transfer Public Art funds for the Riverfront Park from the System Development Capital Projects Fund to the General Capital Projects fund.

Organizational Wellbeing

Community Safety FTE Statistic Adjustment: Removes 5.0 FTE from the Community Safety Payroll Tax (CSPT) Fund (136). The 2023-2025 Budget Committee action that reinstated the Fire Engine reduced 7.0 FTE from the General Fund and added 7.0 FTE to the CSPT. However, both existing funds and FTE were being redirected from the CRU to support the Engine, including 5.0 FTE that were already in the CSPT. This adjustment trues up the FTE statistics that should be in the budget to align with the intent of the Budget Committee motion. Changes to FTE are intended to be ongoing and will be included in the 2025-2027 budget.

a) **One-time Funding Request**: Add \$668,673 in Intergovernmental revenue and increase the Public Works department operating budget by the same amount for an Oregon Departmet of Transportation (ODOT) grant for Bike Share Operations and Expansion. This grant will expand access to the bike share system by adding bikes in the network, expanding the network area, increasing access to low-income community members, improving outreach and marketing, and providing additional transportation options.

ISSUE STATEMENT

Urban Renewal Agency (Agency) Board approval of the third Supplemental Budget for the 2023-2025 biennium is requested after a public hearing.

BACKGROUND

Oregon Local Budget Law (ORS 294.471) allows for supplemental budgets in the event of "an occurrence or condition that is not ascertained when preparing the original budget or a previous supplemental budget for the current year or current budget period and that requires a change in financial planning." ORS 294.471 also allows for a supplemental budget if there are "funds that are made available by another unit of federal, state or local government and the availability of which could not reasonably be foreseen when preparing the original budget or a previous supplemental budget for the current year or current budget period." This supplemental budget has been published in compliance with the Oregon Local Budget Law.

This third supplemental budget of the 2023-2025 biennium recognizes the budget actions necessary to implement Council and Agency Board direction. A summary of items included in this supplemental budget is presented below.

Land Acquisition Adjustments: The previous Supplemental Budget included a General Fund Budget Gap Strategy to sell two parcels of City property to the Urban Renewal Agency (URA). The Supplemental Budget included an estimate of \$850,000 per parcel being sold.

The appraisal for the properties is complete, and the Downtown District requires an additional \$260,000 to purchase the North Butterfly Lot and the Riverfront District requires an additional \$220,000 to purchase the 8th and Pearl Lot. The increased budget will include up to \$50,000 per District to cover closing costs and \$380,000 for the increased purchase price. The URA will transfer \$380,000 to the City, which will be recognized as revenue in the General Fund Main Subfund (011).

RELATED CITY POLICIES

The <u>City of Eugene Strategic Plan</u> outlines direction and organizational priorities for the 2023-2026 period. This item is related to the key focus area of Organizational Wellbeing.

PREVIOUS COUNCIL AND AGENCY DIRECTION

June 26, 2023 Meeting

The City Council acting as the Urban Renewal Agency Board, held a public hearing and took action to adopt the 2023-2025 Biennial Budget for the Urban Renewal Agency, as recommended by the Budget Committee.

Councilor Groves, seconded by Councilor Keating, moved to approve a Resolution of the Urban Renewal Agency of the City of Eugene Declaring the Amount of Tax to be Certified for the Fiscal Year Beginning July 1, 2023 and Ending June 30, 2024. *Passed 8:0*

Councilor Groves, seconded by Councilor Keating, moved to approve a Resolution of the Urban Renewal Agency of the City of Eugene Adopting the Budget and Making Appropriations for the Biennium Beginning July 1, 2023 and Ending June 30, 2025. *Passed 8:0*

June 24, 2024 Meeting

The City Council approved the second supplemental budget for the 2023-2025 biennium. The supplemental budget included a General Fund Gap Strategy to sell two City-owned parcels to the Urban Renewal Agency for development.

Councilor Groves, seconded by Councilor Zelenka, moved to approve a resolution, adopting a supplemental budget; making appropriations for the Urban Renewal Agency of the City of Eugene for the biennium beginning July 1, 2023 and ending June 30, 2025. *Passed 7:0*

October 14, 2024 Meeting

The City Council, acting as the Urban Renewal Agency (URA) Board, approved the purchase of the North Butterfly Lot and the 8th and Pearl Lot and transfer ownership from the City to the URA:

Councilor Groves, seconded by Councilor Zelenka, moved to offer to purchase the North Butterfly Lot for \$1,060,000 and the 8th and Pearl Lot for \$1,020,000 from the City of Eugene and direct the Agency Director to include \$210,000 from the Downtown Urban Renewal District and \$170,000 from the Riverfront Urban Renewal District for these purchases in the December 2024 Supplemental Budget and take all necessary actions to acquire the properties. *Passed 7:0*

AGENCY BOARD OPTIONS

Particular requests requiring more information or discussion may be removed from the supplemental budget and delayed for action in a future supplemental budget. In certain cases, there may be a financial or legal impact to delaying budget approval. These impacts may include Oregon Local Budget Law violations due to exceeding the legal appropriation levels. The Agency Board may also adopt amended appropriation amounts or funding sources for specific requests in the supplemental budget.

AGENCY DIRECTOR'S RECOMMENDATION

Approve the resolution in Attachment B adopting the 2023-2025 Biennium Third Supplemental Budget.

ISSUE STATEMENT

This is an action item to consider appointing two members to the Toxics Board for the two vacant advocacy representative seats. One seat was vacated by Olena Hornberger in October 2023 and the other was not filled after Ryan Josef-Maier's term ended in June 2024.

BACKGROUND

Eugene Charter Article VI Section 6.1, specifies that all vacancies on the Toxics Board shall be filled so as to maintain the balance set forth in Section 6.1(A), within two months of the creation of a vacancy. The two vacant advocacy representative seats shall be filled by two individuals who are not employed by or are not agents of "persons" required to report under this Section, and who have a demonstrable record of advocating for the public's right-to-know.

The two open advocacy representative positions have term ending dates of June 30, 2025 and June 30, 2027.

The City accepted applications from the community for the vacancies between August 23, 2024 and October 6, 2024. Four applications were received during the application timeframe and three met the residency requirements. The application materials from the three eligible applicants are included as Attachment A to this AIS.

A memo outlining the Toxics Board Interim Appointment Process was submitted to Mayor and Council on November 7, 2024 and is included as Attachment B to this AIS.

RELATED CITY POLICIES

The <u>City of Eugene Strategic Plan</u> outlines direction and organizational priorities for the 2023-2026 period. The strategic plan identifies four key focus areas: Urgent Community Needs, Culture of Belonging, Communication and Outreach, and Organizational Wellbeing.

This recruitment process aligns with the **Culture of Belonging** focus area strategic goal: Strengthen relationships with the whole community, with emphasis on the inclusion of the most marginalized groups. High Impact Action: Increase engagement efforts with people from the most marginalized groups to increase participation from these groups on boards, commissions, panels, and other City-sponsored entities.

COUNCIL OPTIONS

- 1. Appoint two of the three applicants to fill the two open advocacy representative roles
- 2. Direct the City Manager to schedule three-minute statements for the three applicants
- 3. Take no action

Subject: Toxics Board Interim Appointment Process

This memo is to inform you of a time sensitive need to fill vacancies on the Toxics Board. Currently, the Toxics Board has less than a quorum of members, resulting in an inability for the advisory group to meet and conduct business.

Vacant positions on the board are currently as follows:

• 2 Advocacy Representatives:

- Term ends 6/30/2027
- Term ends 6/30/2025
- 1 Industry Representative (Term ends 6/30/2027)
- **1 Neutral Position** (Term ends 6/30/2026) *representative is nominated by a two-thirds majority of the six appointed members.*

<u>Recruitment</u>

Typically, Toxics Board appointments are filled during the annual recruitment cycle. Annual recruitment for 2025 is set to begin in January 2025, with final appointments tentatively scheduled in June 2025 (for a July 1 start date). In the normal recruitment cycle, Council would be given binders with application information and the option to select candidates to hear three-minute statements. After the interviews, Council would then have the opportunity to nominate the candidates they would like to fill the seats. Candidates that receive 5 or more nominations automatically have their names added to the motion for Council deliberation and action.

Due to the lack of quorum and the number of charter provisions outlining work to be completed before the standard July 1, 2025 appointment date, **staff recommends moving forward with interim appointments to fill at least two of the four available seats**. This would bring the total count of Toxics Board members up to five and allow for a quorum of the advisory group to meet and make decisions.

Interim Candidates

To support an interim appointment process, applications for the Toxics Board were accepted between August 23, 2024 and October 6, 2024. Three applications were received during that time period. None of the three applicants qualify for the industry representative position. The neutral position cannot be filled until the other positions are filled.

To move forward with interim appointments, the recommendation is to place this item on council's meeting agenda for possible action on November 25, 2024, or December 9, 2024. Council would have the following options:

- Select two of the three applicants to fill the two open advocacy representative roles (applications will be included in the packet) OR
- Direct the city manager to schedule three-minute statements for the three applicants OR
- Do nothing; wait for annual recruitment

Charter Provisions

The Toxics Board appointment guidelines are outlined in the City's Charter:

Article VI, Section 6.1 – Appointment of the Toxics Board

- A. The City Council shall appoint a Toxics Board of seven people to enforce and implement this Section.
 - 1. Three members shall be appointed who are employed by or are agents of "persons" required to report under this Section.
 - 2. Three members shall be appointed who are not employed by or are not agents of "persons" required to report under this Section, and who have a demonstrable record of advocating for the public's right-to-know.
 - 3. One member shall be nominated by a two-thirds majority of the six appointed members.
- B. Any vacancies in the membership of the Toxics Board shall be filled, so as to maintain the balance set forth in Section 6.1(A), within two months of the creation of a vacancy.

Responsibilities of the Toxics Board are also outlined in the City's Charter:

Article VI, Section 6.2 – Responsibilities of the Toxics Board

- A. The Toxics Board shall, within three months of appointment of the sixth member, supply forms for materials balance reports and audits of precautions taken during use and alternatives to use of chemicals for which the trade secrecy reporting exemption has been invoked.
- B. The Toxics Board shall annually:
 - 1. recommend the fee structure necessary to implement this Section;
 - establish the qualifications necessary for a person to independently audit precautions used with trade secret chemicals, and independently audit the existence of technological alternatives that likely would be more protective of the environment, as required in Section 5.2(A)(4); and
 - 3. file a public report on the effectiveness of implementation of this Section, and any recommendations for improved implementation of this Section.
- *C.* By May 1 of each year, the Toxics Board shall report to the Fire Marshal the names of any hazardous users in non-compliance with the requirement to file materials balance reports.
- D. The Toxics Board shall cause to be published a notice listing the names of non-complying entities in a daily newspaper with general circulation in the city of Eugene by June 1 of each year.
- *E.* The office of the City Fire Marshal shall investigate all credible evidence that hazardous materials balance reports or trade secret chemical reports are not being filed in compliance with this Section.
- F. The office of the City Fire Marshal shall audit the accuracy of the reporting processes of each hazardous substance user in an order such that all hazardous substance users are audited in a random order at least once every three years. Companies to be audited shall be given an advance audit notification of no more than one month.
- G. The Toxics Board shall certify the qualifications of independent auditors who will audit the precautions used by hazardous substance users with trade secret chemicals and the technological options available for more protective alternatives. Documentation for certification of the qualifications of each auditor shall be public information.
- H. For the purposes of complying with Section 5.2(A)(4), hazardous substance users may hire only independent auditors certified by the Toxics Board pursuant to Section 6.2(G).

ARTICLE VI - ADMINISTRATION OF HAZARDOUS SUBSTANCE REPORTING

Section 6.1 Appointment of the Toxics Board

- A. The City Council shall appoint a Toxics Board of seven people to enforce and implement this Section.
 - 1. Three members shall be appointed who are employed by or are agents of "persons" required to report under this Section.
 - 2. Three members shall be appointed who are not employed by or are not agents of "persons" required to report under this Section, and who have a demonstrable record of advocating for the public's right-to-know.
 - 3. One member shall be nominated by a two-thirds majority of the six appointed members.
- B. Any vacancies in the membership of the Toxics Board shall be filled, so as to maintain the balance set forth in Section 6.1(A), within two months of the creation of a vacancy.
- C. Term of Office:
 - The term of office shall be three years, except that two members, one from Section 6.1(A)(1) and one from Section 6.1(A)(2), of the first Toxics Board shall be appointed to serve a first term of one year; three members, one each from Section 6.1(A)(1), 6.1(A)(2) and 6.1(A)(3) shall be appointed to serve a first term of two years; and two members, one from Section 6.1(A)(1) and 6.1(A)(2), shall be appointed to serve a first term of three years. No member shall serve more than two consecutive terms.
 - 2. Beginning in 2003, the terms of members of the Toxics Board shall conform to those of the standing committees to the City Council as defined by and set in the City Code.

ISSUE STATEMENT

This item allows members of the public the opportunity to express opinions and provide information to the council. BACKGROUND

Per City Council's operating agreement, speakers at the public comment period will be limited to two and a half minutes and the total time will be limited to 90 minutes total. Speakers will be randomized, and no persons will be allowed to submit a "Request to Speak" form more than 30 minutes prior to the start of the meeting. Persons wishing to speak must sign up to do so not later than 5 minutes after the meeting has been opened by the Mayor or presiding officer.

At the end of the public comment period each member of the Council has the opportunity to respond to comments made. The time allocated to each member of the Council for such responses shall be up to three minutes.
