# Sign Code Updates

- Reed v. Gilbert
- Regulatory Sign Code Amendments
- Signs on City Property
  - Hand-held signs
  - Temporary signs in right-of-way (ROW)
  - City-placed wayfinding signs



- Clyde Reed, Pastor of Good News Community Church located in Gilbert, AZ.
- Church did not have permanent location so Reed posted signs from Saturday to Sunday, with the time and location of next service.
- Church was cited for exceeding the time limits for displaying temporary directional signs and for failing to include an event date on the signs.



- Gilbert sign code prohibited outdoor signs without a permit, but exempted 23 categories of signs.
  - Ideological signs: up to 20 square feet, could stay in place indefinitely and were unlimited in number.
  - Political signs: up to 32 square feet, only allowed to be displayed during election season.
  - Temporary directional signs for events, such as church services: limited to 6 square feet, could only be displayed 12 hours before and 1 hour after an event, and limited to 4 per property.



"Content-based laws — those that target speech based on its communicative content — are presumptively unconstitutional and may be justified only if the government proves that they are narrowly tailored to serve compelling state interests."



- This decision will not prevent governments from enacting effective sign laws.
  - Ample content-neutral options available to resolve problems with safety and aesthetics, including regulating size, building materials, lighting, moving parts, and portability.
  - May be able to forbid postings on public property, so long as it does so in an evenhanded, content-neutral manner.



# Reed v. Gilbert – Justice Alito's Guidance

"This does not mean...that municipalities are powerless to enact and enforce reasonable sign regulations... Here are some rules that would not be content-based."

- Rules regulating the size of signs and locations in which signs may be placed (free-standing vs. attached)
- Rules distinguishing between lighted and unlighted signs
- Rules distinguishing between signs with fixed messages and electronic signs with messages that change
- Rules distinguishing between placement of signs on private and public property
- Rules distinguishing between the placement of signs on commercial and residential property
- Rules distinguishing between on-premises and off-premises signs
- Rules restricting the total number of signs allowed per mile of roadway
- Rules imposing time restrictions on signs advertising a one-time event



### Reed v. Gilbert – Justice Alito's Guidance

- In addition to regulating signs put up by private actors, government entities may also erect their own signs consistent with the principles that allow governmental speech.
- They may put up all manner of signs to promote safety, as well as directional signs and signs pointing out historic sites and scenic spots.



- Mandatory changes to address constitutional concerns with current sign code
- Overarching principles
  - Message Neutrality
    - Cannot favor commercial speech over noncommercial speech
    - Cannot regulate noncommercial speech by message content
  - Message Substitution
    - Any non-commercial message can be substituted for any allowed commercial message or other noncommercial message, provided that the sign structure and mounting device is legal



- Regulating the medium, not the message
- Generally no change to regulations concerning:
  - Number of signs
  - Sign type (e.g., ground, wall, window)
  - Maximum area/square footage
  - Illumination/animation/blinking/flashing restrictions
  - Sign height
  - Permitted locations (e.g., setbacks)



- Updates and modernizes definitions
  - Add previously undefined terms (e.g., banner, flags)
  - Modernization (e.g., feather banners, changeable copy signs, wind dancers and air crows)







- Removes references to "permitted content"
  - Color
  - Letter size and type
  - Limitations on content and message
  - Distinctions based on purpose
    - Real estate/garage sales
    - Construction/contractor signs
    - Political/campaign
    - Ideological














# Signs on City Property

- Traditional Public Forum
  - Streets, sidewalks, parks and exterior of Littleton Center
- Hand Held Signs
  - Personally held or personally attended
  - Time restrictions
    - Sunset to sunset, except when public night meeting
  - Size (e.g., individual: 10 sq. ft.; two or more persons: 50 sq. ft.)
  - Allow safe vehicle and pedestrian passage
- Permitting process for large protests

# **Temporary Signs in ROW**

- Time limits
  - E.g., election season (e.g., 60 days before, 5 days after) (BUT would apply to all signs, not just campaign signs)
- Location within ROW
- Total ban all signs at all times
- Size
- Process to allow retrieval or relocation to allowable location and/or administrative hearing and appeal





# **City Placed Signs**

- Government speech
  - Wayfinding signs
    - Public and quasi-public buildings and facilities
    - Cultural/historical/tourist destinations and points of interest
    - City and neighborhood entries
    - Local businesses
  - Safety (traffic, hazards, etc.)
  - City events
- Must be installed by the City, clearly indicated as city signage
