LITTLETON, AWAKE!

Littleton consistently ranks very high on lists of the best places to live. There's positive energy, nice open space, good schools, a vibrant business community and a City staff that takes pride in providing both quality services and value for the taxpayer's dollar. So on June 14th, Mayor Bruce Beckman and Council members Doug Clark, Peggy Cole and Jerry Valdes voted to terminate the City Manager, Michael Penny.

Penny was recognized as one of the best City Managers in Colorado and had a demonstrated track record of achievement in Littleton.

Support for Michael Penny's leadership was expressed by community leaders, state and local government officials who worked with him and members of the Littleton Police Department and Littleton Fire Rescue labor unions. But Penny's extensive list of achievements and commitment to open and transparent communication essentially counted for nothing.

Rather, his dismissal was based on the flimsiest of pretenses. In truth, it was an act of sabotage by Council members who have effectively pledged allegiance to a small group with a long history of stridently obstructing virtually all City activities aimed at reasonably preserving Littleton's charm while proactively planning for the future. It appears nothing short of making a minimalist libertarian view of government our reality which will play havoc with our property values.

Revenues for City services are predominantly derived from sales taxes that the citizens of Littleton simply cannot fully fund. By denouncing virtually all development out of hand, even where projects fit well within the character of the community, the group of anti's imperil the future prosperity of the City they claim to love. They hypocritically advance a philosophy that might be characterized as "my property rights are inviolable while yours are questionable".

Mayor Bruce Beckman choreographed four votes out of the public's view, then conspired to hold the ballot on a night when Council member and former Mayor Phil Cernanec was known not to be present, he wholly gave himself over to the tendency of politicians to focus on the ends vs. the means. His complete disinterest in working with the City manager to resolve perceived issues is a clear abdication of leadership. As a former Littleton police officer, he should have known better.

Further, Beckman recently allowed a motion by Council member Clark intending to revoke a lawful building permit that could have resulted in a legal settlement costing the taxpayers over \$30 million. Such an outcome would have dramatically curtailed the City's ability to provide police and fire services, street repairs, library and museum operations and more. Ultimately cooler heads prevailed but the mere consideration of such an outrageous and reckless proposal seriously calls into question Beckman's judgement.

Mayor Beckman, council members Cole, Clark and Valdes dishonored themselves and a great city. Littleton's long tradition of working together to create a better future is who we are and always aspire to be. Such gross irresponsibility should not pass without public rebuke.

We hereby declare a message of <u>NO CONFIDENCE</u> in Mayor Beckman and Council members Clark, Cole and Valdes.

Reading of the names.

We would ask that there be a reconsideration of the vote to fire the city manager and that at the very least he be reinstated and placed on a performance plan agreeable to all of council. The lack of openness and communication is disturbing. You have destroyed the trust that many of us had placed in you. We will not forget this when it's time to re-elect any of you. Thank you to Mayor Pro Tem Brinkman and council member Hopping for trying to restore some order to the chaos of June 14th. The absence of Mr. Cernanec was felt and it's widely known that had he been there that night the vote to place Mr Penny on a work plan may have ended very differently.

Littleton is Awake. We are watching. We are paying attention. We have a voice. We are engaged. We will not let our community suffer due to the extreme views of a few. We expect our leaders to lead and not follow. This is a campaign for our future.

Twelve days ago we put this issue on Facebook. Today there are over 1,000 followers on the page and we just read over 300 names of people who have signed the letter of No Confidence. We aren't going away. We are getting stronger everyday. We are AWAKE.

POLICY QUESTION:

Does city council support abolishing the Littleton Invests for Tomorrow (LIFT) Urban Renewal Authority and repealing the city's urban renewal plans?

BACKGROUND:

At its March 15, 2016 meeting, city council voted to "direct the city manager to provide to council at the next scheduled regular council meeting on April 5, 2016 an ordinance or ordinances and resolutions for council's consideration and vote to dismantle Littleton's urban renewal and the LIFT Board including the handling of the outstanding loan to LIFT, and addressing any tax collection concerns, if any, and consider the status of any pending litigation concerning urban renewal."

STAFF ANALYSIS:

The Colorado Urban Renewal Law provides the following process for abolishing an urban renewal authority:

The governing body of a municipality may by ordinance provide for the abolishment of an urban renewal authority, provided adequate arrangements have been made for payment of any outstanding indebtedness and other obligations of the authority. Any such abolishment shall be effective upon a date set forth in the ordinance, which date shall not be less than six months from the effective date of the ordinance. C.R.S. § 31-25-115(2).

LIFT's only "outstanding indebtedness and other obligations" is the existing loan agreement with the city. The principal amount of the loan is \$150,000 and as of 12/31/15 the outstanding balance is \$150,623. The proposed ordinance provides for the outstanding loan to be forgiven by the city. Options for repayment under the loan agreement include use of city property tax increment or city sales tax increment. Staff does not recommend either of those options and recommends council forgive the loan. An intergovernmental agreement will be prepared to provide for the return of all monies in the special fund to the taxing entities. This would be effective at the same time as abolishment of the authority and repeal of the plans.

The city has four urban renewal plans, two of which were adopted in November 2014 (Columbine Square and Santa Fe) and two that were adopted in December 2014 (North Broadway and Littleton Boulevard). The proposed ordinance provides for the repeal of all plans effective at the same time LIFT is abolished. Repeal of the plans does not trigger a requirement for ratification by the voters under section 64.5 of the city charter.

Urban renewal is a financing tool available to municipal governments to encourage development and redevelopment in areas where the council believes assistance is necessary. Council entered this process in good faith and worked with the city's taxing partners. Agreements were approved with Urban Drainage and Flood Control District, South Suburban Parks and Recreation, and Littleton Public Schools to return all increment until such time that a development or activity commenced. Council also approved a resolution requiring support of all taxing partners, including Arapahoe County, before any development or activity would move forward. Even with this inclusive approach, the tool was not well received within the community. Therefore, staff is supportive of council abolishing LIFT and repealing the urban renewal plans.

FISCAL IMPACTS:

In addition to forgiving the loan, there may be additional minimal legal fees.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff supports abolishing the LIFT Board, repealing the city's urban renewal plans, and forgiving the outstanding loan to LIFT, and recommends approval of the ordinance on first reading.

PROPOSED MOTION:

I move to approve the ordinance on first reading abolishing the Littleton Invests for Tomorrow Urban Renewal Authority pursuant to C.R.S. § 31-25-115(2) and repealing the city's urban renewal plans and to schedule a public hearing on July 19, 2016 at 6:30 p.m. in the council chamber.

CITY OF LITTLETON, COLORADO ORDINANCE NO. 03 Series 2016

INTRODUCED BY COUNCILMEMBERS:

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF LITTLETON, COLORADO, ABOLISHING THE LITTLETON INVESTS FOR TOMORROW URBAN RENEWAL AUTHORITY PURSUANT TO C.R.S. § 31-25-115(2) AND REPEALING THE CITY'S URBAN RENEWAL PLANS

WHEREAS, the Littleton Invests For Tomorrow Urban Renewal Authority is a body corporate and was duly organized, established and authorized by the City of Littleton to transact business and exercise its powers as an urban renewal authority, under and pursuant to the Colorado Urban Renewal Law, Part 1 of Article 25 of Title 31, C.R.S. (the "Urban Renewal Law");

WHEREAS, on November 4, 2014, upon the recommendation of the Littleton Invests For Tomorrow Urban Renewal Authority, and following review of the City of Littleton Planning Board for conformance with the general plan for the development of the City of Littleton, and after public hearings, the City Council for the City of Littleton determined that blight, as defined by C.R.S. § 31-25-103(2), exists in the Columbine Square Urban Renewal Plan Area and the Santa Fe Urban Renewal Plan Area and that such areas are appropriate for an urban renewal project pursuant to the Urban Renewal Law;

WHEREAS, on December 2, 2014, upon the recommendations of the Littleton Invests For Tomorrow Urban Renewal Authority, and following review of the City of Littleton Planning Board for conformance with the general plan for the development of the City of Littleton, and after public hearings, the City Council for the City of Littleton determined that blight, as defined by C.R.S. § 31-25-103(2), exists in the North Broadway Urban Renewal Plan Area and the Littleton Boulevard Urban Renewal Plan Area and that such areas are appropriate for an urban renewal project pursuant to the Urban Renewal Law;

WHEREAS, the Littleton Invests For Tomorrow Urban Renewal Authority has been in the process of identifying the specific undertakings and activities that it desires to implement as part of the project to accomplish the purposes of the Urban Renewal Law in each of the urban renewal areas, but has not yet undertaken to implement specific development proposals in the urban renewal areas;

WHEREAS, notwithstanding the determinations made by the City Council that the urban renewal areas are appropriate for urban renewal projects, the establishment of such areas as blighted under the Urban Renewal Law and the implementation of the activities and undertakings as contemplated under the Urban Renewal Law, including the tax increment financing authorized to facilitate and accomplish such activities and undertakings, such determinations have become increasingly divisive and political for the City and its citizens;

WHEREAS, as of the date of this Ordinance, the only financial obligation of the Littleton Invests For Tomorrow Urban Renewal Authority is the principal amount of \$150,000, together with any interest, owed to the City pursuant to a Cooperation and Loan Agreement dated December 16, 2014 (the "Loan Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, C.R.S. § 31-25-115(2) of the Urban Renewal Law provides that the

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Littleton desires to abolish the Littleton Invests For Tomorrow Urban Renewal Authority and repeal the urban renewal plans for each of the urban renewal areas approved by the City Council, pursuant to and in conformance with the requirements of the Urban Renewal Law.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LITTLETON, COLORADO, THAT:

- **Section 1:** The Littleton Invests For Tomorrow Urban Renewal Authority is hereby abolished in its entirety, pursuant to C.R.S. § 31-25-115(2) of the Urban Renewal Law, effective as of the date set forth in Section 7 below.
- **Section 2**: The City Council of the City of Littleton hereby finds and determines that adequate arrangements have been made for payment of any outstanding indebtedness and other obligations of the Littleton Invests For Tomorrow Urban Renewal Authority as follows:
 - (a) The City of Littleton does hereby waive, cancel and forgive payment of any and all amounts due under the Loan Agreement;
 - (b) The Littleton Invests For Tomorrow Urban Renewal Authority has no other outstanding indebtedness or other obligations.
- **Section 3:** As of the abolishment of the Littleton Invests For Tomorrow Urban Renewal Authority, the urban renewal plan known as the "Columbine Square Urban Renewal Plan" approved by City Council Resolution No. 136, Series 2014, as amended, is hereby and shall be repealed in its entirety and shall no longer be of force or effect.
- **Section 4**: As of the abolishment of the Littleton Invests For Tomorrow Urban Renewal Authority, the urban renewal plan known as the "Santa Fe Urban Renewal Plan" approved by City Council Resolution No. 137, Series 2014, as amended, is hereby and shall be repealed in its entirety and shall no longer be of force or effect.
- **Section 5:** As of the abolishment of the Littleton Invests For Tomorrow Urban Renewal Authority, the urban renewal plan known as the "North Broadway Urban Renewal Plan" approved by City Council Resolution No. 142, Series 2014, is hereby and shall be repealed in its entirety and shall no longer be of force or effect.

1 **Section 6:** As of the abolishment of the Littleton Invests For Tomorrow Urban 2 Renewal Authority, the urban renewal plan known as the "Littleton Boulevard Urban Renewal 3 Plan" approved by City Council Resolution No. 143, Series 2014, is hereby and shall be repealed 4 in its entirety and shall no longer be of force or effect. 5 6 The abolishment of the Littleton Invests For Tomorrow Urban Renewal **Section 7:** 7 Authority, and the repeal of the urban renewal plans hereunder, shall be effective as of the date 8 that is six (6) months after the effective date of this ordinance. 9 10 Severability. If any part, section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of **Section 8:** this ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the validity of 11 12 the remaining sections of this ordinance. POLICY QUESTION:

Does city council support adoption of an Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) with Arapahoe County to receive grant funds for Runyon Elementary School playground renovations?

BACKGROUND:

City council approved the submission of a grant application, at the request of Littleton Public Schools, to Arapahoe County to fund the renovation of the playground at Runyon Elementary. Staff was notified on May 24, 2016 that the project was awarded \$282, 029 in funding from Arapahoe County Open Space.

STAFF ANALYSIS:

This is the standard IGA required by the county to accept grant funds from the Open Space program.

FISCAL IMPACTS:

In the 2016 budget, the city council approved \$50,000 in open space matching funds for the project. The city staff will act as the administrative agent for the grant.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends approval of the resolution.

PROPOSED MOTION:

I move to approve the resolution adopting an IGA with Arapahoe County to receive grant funds for Runyon Elementary School playground renovations.

INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT REGARDING 2016 GRANT OF ARAPAHOE COUNTY OPEN SPACE PROGRAM FUNDS PROJECT NAME: RUNYON ELEMENTARY SCHOOL PLAYGROUND RENOVATION

This Intergovernmental Agreement ("Agreement"), is made and entered into by and between **THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF THE COUNTY OF ARAPAHOE, STATE OF COLORADO**, (the "County") and the **CITY OF LITTLETON**, a municipality and political subdivision of the State of Colorado (the "Grantee") (collectively, "Parties" and individually a "Party").

WHEREAS, on November 4, 2003, and on November 1, 2011, the voters of Arapahoe County approved a county-wide sales and use tax to be deposited in the Arapahoe County Open Space Fund and used for specified open space purposes as set forth in County Resolution No. 030381, as amended by Resolution No. 110637 (Open Space Resolution); and

WHEREAS, the Open Space Resolution authorizes the County to award discretionary grants from its Open Space Fund to municipalities and special districts, as more fully set forth therein; and

WHEREAS, on May 25, 2016 the County approved the Grantee's Grant Proposal for the Runyon Elementary School Playground Renovation ("Grant Project"), which is attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein as Exhibit A, subject to the execution of an intergovernmental agreement and subject to the terms and conditions contained herein; and

WHEREAS, this intergovernmental agreement is authorized by Article XIV, Section 18 of the Colorado Constitution and Colo. Rev. Stat. § 29-1-203.

NOW, THEREFORE, the County and the Grantee agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Amount of Grant.</u> The County hereby awards Grantee an amount not to exceed \$282,029 ("Grant Funds") for the Grant Project from the Arapahoe County Open Space Fund.
- 2. <u>Use of Grant Funds</u>. The Grantee agrees that it shall only use the Grant Funds for the Grant Project, as described in Exhibit A.
- 3. <u>Disbursement of Grant Funds.</u> Subsequent to execution of this Agreement, the Grant Funds shall be paid via ACH transfer on a reimbursement basis upon receipt of the approved status report and documentation of expenditures as outlined in Paragraph 10 below and no more often than bi-annually. No more than 75% of the grant funds will be reimbursed prior to the Final Report approval. The final 25% of grant funds will be reimbursed following the project inspection and review and approval of the Final Report and project deliverables.
- 4. <u>Time for Use of Grant Funds</u>. The Grantee agrees that the Grant Project must begin within 60 days of the award notification. The Grantee agrees that the Grant

Project will be completed and the Grant Funds will be expended by no later than two years from the date of this fully executed Agreement, unless a longer period of time is otherwise agreed to by the County in writing. The Grantee understands and agrees that if the Grant Project cannot be completed by the end of the agreed upon time period the County may require that the Grant Funds be refunded to the County Open Space Grant Fund, be re-distributed to another agency and/or be used for another viable and timely grant project.

- 5. <u>Interest on Grant Funds</u>. The Grantee further agrees that, after receipt of the Grant Funds, the Grantee will use any interest earned on the Grant Funds only for the Grant Project as set forth in Exhibit A.
- 6. Administration of Grant Project. The Grantee shall be responsible for the direct supervision and administration of the Grant Project. The County shall not be liable or responsible for any cost overruns on the Grant Project, nor shall the County have any duty or obligation to provide any additional funding for the Grant Project if the Grant Project cannot be completed with the awarded Grant Funds. Grantee also agrees to comply with all local, state and federal requirements while completing the Project unless specifically waived.
- 7. <u>Grant Project Site Visits</u>. Upon 24 hours written notice to the Grantee, the Grantee agrees to allow the County to make site visits before, during, at the completion of and/or after the Grant Project.
- 8. Acknowledgement of County by Grantee. The Grantee agrees to acknowledge the County as a contributor to the Grant Project in all publications, news releases and other publicity issued by the Grantee related to the Grant Project and agrees to allow the County to do the same. If any events are planned in regards to the Grant Project, the County shall be acknowledged as a contributor in the invitation to such events. Grantee shall cooperate with the County in preparing public information pieces, providing photos of the Grant Project from time to time, and providing access to the Grant Project for publicity purposes. Event information, event materials and press release information related to the Grant Project must be sent to the County Grants Program Administrator for review and filing.
- 9. Required Sign at Project Site. The County agrees to purchase a standard sign for each grant project. Grantee agrees to pay the sign cost to the County for each grant project. Grantee agrees to erect and permanently maintain at least one sign in a publicly visible area in recognition of the Grant from the Arapahoe County Open Space Program. If the Grantee wishes to use their own sign and design, the Grantee must submit the sign location, design, and wording to the County Grants Program Administrator for approval prior to manufacture and/or installation of such sign. Such sign shall be erected prior to the completion of the Grant Project or its public opening, whichever is earlier.
- 10. <u>Report Requirements</u>. On or before **January 31st and July 31st annually**, the Grantee agrees to provide the County with Grant Project Progress Reports that conform to the format provided by the County. Each Grant Project Progress

Report shall include supporting financial documentation as requested in the form provided. Upon completion of the Grant Project, the Grantee also agrees to submit to the County a Final Report that conforms to the format provided by the County; a final spreadsheet comparing the original budget to actual expenses that certifies Grant Funds used in compliance with the Open Space Resolution; and GIS data with location and boundaries of the Grant Project. The Final Report shall also include supporting financial documentation as requested in the County report form and high resolution photographs of the progress and finished results of the Grant Project. The Grantee further agrees to provide the County with digital copies of said photographs, delivered as separate high resolution jpeg images. The Final Report shall be submitted within three (3) months of Grant Project completion unless a longer period of time has been agreed to by the County in writing. The County shall be allowed to use information and images from these reports in publications, public information updates, and on the County's web site.

- 11. <u>Failure to Submit Required Reports</u>. Upon written notice from the County's Open Space Grants Program Administrator, informing the Grantee that it has failed to submit any required status report and/or final report, the Grantee shall submit such reports to the County through the County's Open Space Grants Program Administrator within thirty (30) days, and, if it fails to do so, the Grantee shall be deemed to be in violation this Agreement *pursuant to Paragraph 15, below*.
- 12. Record Keeping Requirements. The Grantee shall maintain a complete set of books and records documenting its use of the Grant Funds and its supervision and administration of the Grant Project. The County or any of its duly authorized representatives shall have reasonable access to any books, documents, papers, and records of the Grantee which are pertinent to the Grant Project for the purpose of making an audit, examination, or excerpts. The Grantee shall keep all books, documents, papers, and records, which are pertinent to the Grant Project, for a minimum of three years from the project completion date.
- 13. Changes to Grant Project. The Grantee agrees and understands that its Grant Project, once it has been approved by the County, may not be changed without the County's prior approval. Proposed changes must be formally requested using the applicable Grant Project Modification Form provided by the County. Changes may not begin until the County has issued an approval, which may also require the execution of an amendment to this Agreement.
- 14. <u>Maintenance</u>. Grantee agrees to assume responsibility for continuous long-term maintenance and public safety of open space lands, trails, recreation facilities, amenities, signage or other projects funded by the Grant Funds.
- 15. <u>Failure to Comply and Reimbursement of Grant Funds.</u> The Grantee understands and agrees that the County may require the Grantee to reimburse the County if any portion of the Grant Funds are not used in accordance with its approved Grant Proposal and this Agreement. Failure to comply with the terms of this Agreement shall result in default and the Grantee shall be ineligible for any future Grant

Funds until the violation is remedied or after such other time period as determined by the County.

- 16. <u>Remedies.</u> The rights and remedies of the County as set forth in this Agreement shall not be exclusive and are in addition to any other rights or remedies provided by law.
- 17. <u>No Waiver of Rights</u>. A waiver by either Party to this Agreement of the breach of any term or provision of this Agreement shall not operate or be construed as a waiver of any subsequent breach by either Party.
- 18. <u>Relationship of the Parties</u>. The Grantee shall perform all duties and obligations under this Agreement as an independent contractor and shall not be deemed by virtue of this Agreement to have entered into any partnership, joint venture, employer/employee, or other relationship with the County.
- 19. <u>No Third Party Beneficiaries</u>. Nothing in this Agreement shall give or allow any claim or right of action whatsoever by any third party, including, but not limited to, any agents or contractors of the Grantee.
- 20. <u>Severability</u>. Should any one or more provisions of this Agreement be determined to be illegal or unenforceable, all other provisions nevertheless shall remain effective; provided, however, the Parties shall forthwith enter into good faith negotiations and proceed with due diligence to draft a provision that will achieve the original intent of the Parties hereunder.
- 21. <u>Written Amendment Required.</u> This Agreement may be amended, modified, or changed, in whole or in part, only by written agreement duly authorized and executed by the County and the Grantee.
- 22. <u>Venue.</u> Venue for the trial of any action arising out of any dispute hereunder shall be in Arapahoe County District Court, pursuant to the appropriate rules of civil procedure.
- 23. Notices. Notices, as referred to in this Agreement, shall be sent to:

- 26. <u>Incorporation of Exhibits.</u> Unless otherwise stated in this Agreement, any exhibits, applications, resolutions, or other documents referenced in this Agreement shall be incorporated by reference into this Agreement for all purposes.
- 27. <u>Section Headings</u>. The headings for any section of this Agreement are only for the convenience and reference of the Parties and are not intended in any way to define, limit or describe the scope or intent of this Agreement.
- 28. <u>Assignment.</u> The rights, or any parts thereof, granted to the Parties herein may be assigned only with the prior written consent of the non-assigning party.
- 29. Extent of Agreement. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement of the Parties hereto. The Parties agree that there have been no representations made regarding the subject matter hereof other than those, if any, contained herein, that this Agreement constitutes the entire agreement of the Parties with respect to the subject matter hereof, and further agree that the various promises and covenants contained herein are mutually agreed upon and are in consideration of one another.
- 30. <u>Signatures.</u> The signatories to this Agreement represent that they are fully authorized to execute this Agreement and bind their respective entities.

The City of Littleton and Littleton Public Schools are collaborating on the Runyon Elementary School Playground Renovation Project. Currently, Runyon is closed for one year for roof and renovations with funds from the LPS Bond that was passed in 2013. Unforeseen issues were discovered when construction started for the roof, which caused the project cost to go over the budget, not leaving any money for any part of the playground renovations. The playground is closed for safety reasons, and some of the structures have been project to make way for

trucks and equipment. The school building renovation project is expected to be completed by August 2016 in time for students to return to school for the 2016–2017 year. The 460 plus students who will benefit from the playground renovations are being housed at LPS's Whitman Facility for the current school year.

The Runyon playground is the only playground with a three-mile radius or more. The closest playground is approximately 3.5 miles, and, although it is ADA-compliant, it does not have special equipment for children with disabilities, making Runyon's new playground unique to the community. The Runyon playground design was based upon input from the school and local community. The information was given to a strategic committee comprised of the school principal, physical education teacher, special education teachers, para-educators, LPS wellness coordinator, district operations, and parents. The playground was thoughtfully designed to include all 460 plus students within the Runyon school and approximately 3,080 children between the ages of preschool and fifth grade in the surrounding neighborhood (a two-mile radius). It would also benefit over 10,000 student athletes through South Suburban and Littleton Soccer who utilize the fields.

Runyon Elementary School has a center-based special education program, which serves students with multiple and significant needs. These students are unable to walk, run, and play on a typical playground. The new playground was designed to be an exciting and challenging environment while still serving students with significant needs. Inclusion in play activities will increase students' social interactions with peers of all abilities, which is an important part of learning for all children within a community environment. The scope of the project includes updating outdated thirty-year old structures that have surpassed their ten-year lifespan. Most of the climbing equipment is no longer being manufactured; as it breaks, parts are no longer available for replacement, creating a dangerous environment for children, and the removal of structures leaves a lackluster playground. Without funding from the Arapahoe County Open Space Grant, this project would not be possible.

The entire playground, approximately 15,655 square feet, will be renovated. The playground plans and project budget were developed by All Around Recreation with input from the planning committee at Runyon Elementary School. Littleton Public Schools' current policy for awarding contracts for playgrounds is to sole-source with All Around Recreation as the vendor. The components of the project include relocating an existing Berliner climber (rope climbing system) and hammock to a new play area; adding two bay arch swings with four seat belt swings, a Berliner cloud nine swing (several children can swing at one time on this round hammock like structure), a Henderson standup spinner (children stand on a platform and hold handles while they spin), and a Berliner Slack line (a tightrope structure that encourages a sense of agility, achievement, and power in a playful environment). Berliner is guaranteed for the full lifetime of the structure; as long as it is installed, it is guaranteed. Another play area will get a new Henderson wheelchair-accessible custom play structure with spiral, double, twister and starglide slides; spinners; overhead ladder; balance stepping stones; balcony with push panel; vertical climber; transfer station for wheelchairs; site play (eye-level games); mini maze wheel and math panel; orbis fitness structures; and overhead play for upper-body fitness including ladders, upper body spinners, loop-to-loop monkey bars and a hilltop climber (see plan in Section G photos). Ground-level play events, overhead activities, and climbers all contribute to children's strength and aerobic fitness. The modern design of Orbis's fitness structures have a

unique arched base that puts the focus on fun and fitness for children aged 5 to 12. This emphasizes the athletic nature of the playground, with climbing, swinging, hanging, running, and jumping taking center stage. Henderson and Orbis have a minimum guaranteed life span of 25 years.

Another area will get new sand play material with a single-post fabric shade structure and an ADA sand table. There will also be a two-tier seat wall and one tetherball court in this area. There will be a quiet area with outdoor seating, which can be used for myriad activities and community functions. A log balance beam with log steppers for balance training will be installed in crusher fines for ADA access. Four basketball courts and two tetherball courts will be installed in the asphalt area, and the volleyball court will be updated with new poles, net, and sand. Also included in the scope of work is a music area that was inspired for a different kind of fun, playful, and interactive experience to excite and encourage children to play instruments. The Freenotes outdoor musical area will host tuned drums (five drums of different height and sounds), a manta ray (chime tubes), a pegasus (twenty-three resonated aluminum bars), and contrabass chimes (towering aluminum chime tubes). All play areas will have engineered wood chip fibers (at the recommended manufactured depth for safety) or crusher fines to be ADA compliant.

The results of this project will include promoting children's physical health and creativity, providing more opportunities for play, enhancing relationships among community members, and improving the physical environment. The playground is open before and after school hours, weekends, holidays and summer for use by the community. Residents of Littleton (over 38,000 within a two-mile radius, including 9,000 children pre K–12), the Runyon school community (460 students), and visitors to the trail system and athletic fields will greatly benefit from this updated playground for many years to come. The projected date for completion is mid-August 2017.

Sand play (\$2,100), with 12' single-post fabric shade (\$2,200), an ADA sand table and a 19 LF two-tier curved seat wall (\$9,650) in the north play area. 200 SF of crusher fines (\$450) will allow for ADA access. One tetherball (\$600) will be installed in the north area.

A Henderson custom play structure, wheelchair accessibility, orbis fitness attachments, slides and ground play panels will be installed in west area 1 (\$80,125).

The west play area 2 will be expanded and house the relocated Berliner Merkur and hammock (\$6,136), adding a 2-bay arch swing (\$2,800), Henderson standup spinner (\$1,500), Berliner cloud swing 9 (\$8,100), and a Berliner slack line (\$3,700).

West play area 3 will get volleyball posts and nets (\$1,384) with additional 2' of sand. Four basketball hoops will be installed into the asphalt and lined for two basketball courts (\$4,476).

A Themed Concepts fallen log balance beam (\$3,165), three log steppers (\$1,005) and four boulder steps (\$2,750), and two tetherball posts (\$400) will be installed in the south play area. A 473 SF concrete walk (\$8,550) will surround the Freenotes outdoor music area: tuned drums (43,260), manta ray (\$4,200), pegasus (\$4,100), contrabass chimes (\$5,100) in 1400 SF of crusher fines surfacing (\$2,752). The area will host a 25' fabric sail shade (\$5,100). A two-tiered, 42 LF seat wall (\$13,500) will be installed and attached to the existing gazebo.

Resurfacing of the asphalt will connect all play areas for \$86,700. Pea gravel will be removed (\$8,350) in all play areas and replaced by engineered wood chip fiber (safety surfacing) layered over fabric in a 12-inch, naturally compacted depth (\$10,925). Cost of shipping, installation, bonds and permits is \$96,629.20. Total Project Cost: \$377,029. Cash match: \$95,000.

Currently, Runyon is closed for one school year for roof renovations with funds from the LPS Bond that was passed in 2013. Unforeseen issues were discovered when construction started for the roof and the costs went over the budget, not leaving any money for playground renovations. The playground is closed for safety reasons, and some of the structures have been removed to make way for trucks and equipment. The school building renovation project is expected to be completed by August 2016 in time for students to return to school for the 2016-2017 year. The 460 LPS's students who will benefit from the playground renovations are being housed at Whitman Facility for the current school year. The playground project goal is to replace, improve, and update the playground at Runyon Elementary School by adding new playground structures, and moving two existing playground structures. The ultimate aim is to create an all inclusive playground, with a musical area and outdoor seating areas that will be used by school children, neighborhood families, and local residents. The project will improve the student and community experience by taking the existing playground and creating new spaces with new outdoor structures. The expected results would be an increase of park users and greater diversity of users' ages and abilities.

The existing playground at Runyon Elementary School was installed over 30 years ago, with the exception of a Berliner Climbing Sphere (which will be moved to a new space and repurposed). Currently, the play areas are filled with pea gravel and several stand-alone structures that have outlived their lifespan/warranty of ten years, and are no longer being manufactured. When they break, parts are not available for replacement, creating a dangerous environment. The removal of the play structures leaves less equipment to play on. The entire playground, approximately 15,655 square feet, will be renovated. The new playground was designed by All Around Recreation with input from the planning committee at Runyon Elementary School after they collected information from the school and community. Littleton Public Schools' current policy for awarding contracts for playgrounds is to sole-source, and All Around Recreation is the vendor.

All pea gravel will be removed, and engineered wood chip fibers (safety surfacing), layered over fabric in a 12-inch, naturally compacted depth, will fill play areas to comply 2016 Standard and Small Grant Application 11.03.2015 Page 12 of 24

with ADA accessibility for individuals with disabilities. Runyon will replace the existing playground structures with appropriate play features for ages 5–12. The scope of the work includes restructuring the sand play area with new borders and a 12' single-post fabric shade. Additionally, an ADA sand table and a 19 linear foot, two-tier curved seat wall will sit in the north play area. 200 square feet of crusher fines will allow for ADA access. A tetherball will be installed, and the asphalt will be painted with four square and hopscotch.

The west play area will have a Henderson wheelchair-accessible custom play structure with spiral, double, twister and starglide slides; spinners; overhead ladder; balance stepping stones; balcony with push panel; vertical climber; transfer station for wheelchairs; site play (eye level games); mini maze wheel and math panel; orbis fitness structures; and overhead play for upper-body fitness ladders, upper body spinners, loop-to-loop monkey bars, and a hilltop climber (see plan in Photos Section G) will be installed in the west play area. This will enable children of all abilities to play together. A second play area will be expanded and will house the relocated Berliner Merkur and hammock (a rope climbing system), also adding a two-bay arch swing with four seat belt swings, a Henderson standup spinner (a favorite new spinning activity with a modern look) for use in an upright position with a non-skid base for safety (spinners keep children active and engaged while they develop core strength, balance and coordination. Spinning is also an example of vestibular play, which is critical to brain development) and a Berliner Cloud 9 swing (an accessible swing which allows several children at one time to fly "on the cloud"). The swing also allows children with special needs to enjoy the swinging movement with other children or a care person. The Berliner slack line is a low to the ground tightrope structure for balance play and more complex stunts which include jumping and turning.

The volleyball court in the west play area will get new volleyball posts and nets with an additional two feet of sand. Four basketball hoops will be installed into the asphalt, and the asphalt will be lined to create two basketball courts. These areas are used during recess and to meet core educational standards in physical education.

A quiet area of the playground will be created in the south play area. This area includes a fallen log balance beam with three log steppers and four boulder steps that will assist in balance skills for all kids (as well as children with special needs) who like to hop and jump. A 473 square feet concrete walk will surround the Freenotes outdoor music area: tuned drums come in a set of five of different heights and sounds; the manta ray has individual chime tubes that are suspended by nylon coated stainless steel cable; the chimes on the two sides are repeated and it has four mallets, making it a great instrument for two people to play magical music together; the Pegasus is a hefty metallophone made with resonated aluminum bars in the key of C major and A minor, which resonates like a gong; and the contrabass chimes are stunning in both their towering appearance and low-resonant tones. The contrabass chimes provide an outdoor music experience through powerful sounds that are both heard and felt. All

Freenotes musical instruments are designed to withstand the outdoor elements and will be installed in 1,400 square feet of crusher fines surfacing to inspire the love of music and joyful play, adding a different kind of fun to the playground experience. The area will host a 25-foot fabric sail shade and a two-tiered, 42 linear feet seating wall, which will be installed and attached to the existing gazebo for more outdoor seating, play, and educational opportunities.

Resurfacing of the asphalt will connect all play areas. The asphalt will be scraped three inches down and then resurfaced three inches deep and top coated. It will be stenciled with four square and hopscotch designed to match the school mascot, the Runyon Ram.

Berliner meets and exceeds all current standards and is guaranteed for the full lifetime of the structure; as long as it is installed, it is guaranteed. Orbis fitness attachments and Henderson play structures are designed to meet or exceed the current CAN/CSA Z614, ASTM F1487 and CPSC standards. Henderson is an active participant on both the CAN/CSA Z614 and ASTM F1487 standards. Allied Flo-Coat® galvanized steel tubes, topquality powder-coat paint finishes, and stainless steel hardware make these structures durable to all weather conditions. Henderson and Orbis have a minimum guaranteed life span of 25 years. The playground structures will be composed of prefabricated materials (when applicable) embedded in the ground and encased in concrete as per the manufacturers' guidelines. The existing equipment will be recycled (if possible) once removed from the site. All proposed improvements will include products made to survive the Colorado weather (fluctuating temperatures, winter freezes, etc.), the high visitor use, and potential vandalism. Henderson and Berliner systems have state-of-theart manufacturing, producing some of the highest quality net structures, which are certified by the international Playground Equipment Manufacturers Association and exceed any other nets in the industry. LPS has plans in place to maintain these amenities at Runyon.

The design of the playground also took into consideration the Playworks Recess program that the school incorporates into recess and physical education classes. Playworks recess is a set of games that create an environment for every child on the playground to feel included, be active, and build valuable social and emotional skills. Playworks offers an essential opportunity for children to explore their imaginations, to connect with other kids, and to stretch and grow physically, emotionally and socially. Any child is welcome and able to play in any game or engage in free or imaginative play on play structures or components on the playground. Free play has an integral affect not just on physical, social, emotional, and cognitive growth. Keeping kids playing is critical to their happy and healthy development, which has been a driving force in strategically planning this project.

The school often serves as a singular recreation opportunity for children and parents in the community. The playground is adjacent to open space and trails that make it easily accessible and an inviting place to stop and play for those using the trails. The new project will support 460 plus students within the Runyon school, approximately 9,000

children between the ages of preschool to 12th grade in the surrounding neighborhood (a two-mile radius) and over 10,000 student athletes through South Suburban Parks and Recreation and Littleton Soccer who utilize the fields. The project will be managed by LPS Operations and the expected completion date of this project is August 2017.

2. Describe the community/neighborhood and user groups the project will serve. Discuss the type of users (children, adults, seniors, families, sports leagues, youth groups, etc.) the project will serve and estimate the number of user groups annually that will benefit from the project. Runyon Elementary School is part of Littleton Public Schools (LPS). The school has a population of over 460 students (which could increase with new school zoning in the next few years) and includes a special needs population. The school is connected to the community by the Lee Gulch Trails system. The playground provides outdoor park amenities to the local neighborhoods, district sport programs, private sports organizations, and community organizations like SSPRD, Littleton Soccer, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, with close to 400 participants on any given day during the appropriate season. The school serves as a singular recreation opportunity for children (over 9,000 school age children with a two-mile radius) and families (close to 16,000 households) in the neighborhood. Looking at intergovernmental agreements with the City of Littleton, SSPRD, and other youth leagues, the estimated number of users would be around 500 on any given day. Over 400 participants from youth and adult leagues play and practice in programed sports on the Runyon playground fields. The new playground will support all the families and spectators who visit to watch families' games, leagues, and tournaments.

Runyon is a neighborhood school located in the Ridgeview, Bellevue Heights, Mountain Range View, Southbridge, and Southbridge Preserves neighborhoods. There are 243,749 residents who live within a five-mile radius of the school connected by the trail system and streets. There are 38,345 residents who live within a two-mile radius of the school, which is considered walking distance. It can be estimated that there are between 38,745 and 243,729 possible users of the playground in the service area. The Lee Gulch Trail provides a significant connection from the Highline Canal Trail near Littleton Hospital to the Platte River Trail. This 4.6 mile trail joins the Mary Carter Greenway to the Big Dry to the Highline, which makes a 14-mile continuous loop. The trail is a combination of crusher fine and concrete surface, so it is highly recommended for cross bikes and walking/running. Along this trail system, users will have direct access to Runyon Elementary School. The Littleton population represents a wide range of ages, ethnicities, economic groups, and households including youth, young adults, married couples, families, and seniors. All playgrounds/ athletic fields in LPS are open to the public before /after school hours, weekends, holidays, and summer. There are signs posted at all LPS playgrounds promoting availability and usage of playgrounds. The new playground will

attract resident users of all ages and abilities to enjoy and play together for years to come.

The Runyon playground renovation project was identified by the City of Littleton and Littleton Public Schools based on the age of the playground and the need for a community park. The closet community park is approximately 3.5 miles and does not have the inclusiveness for children of all abilities as the does the proposed project for Runyon. The schools in the City of Littleton were looked at and prioritized by need and location, making the Runyon project a priority. During 2015–2016, Runyon Elementary School is closed for a major roof and interior renovation. The roof structure and abatement of asbestos, which was found after the initial budget was formed, took the renovation plans over-budget, at which time funds were diverted from projects not required by code and contingency budgets to cover the costs, but this left no money for playground upgrades. Students are currently bused to Whitman Facility for the 2015–2016 year and will return to Runyon for the 2016-2017 school year. The project is a part of the local city system-wide master plan: the playground renovation will create an opportunity for more residents of all ages and abilities to play where they live.

A Dynamic Littleton – Policies 1.1: Generate more opportunities for residents to live, shop, and play where they work and to work, shop, and play where they live. Based on community demand, the age of the playground structures, and anticipated increase of the park's use, the proposed needs are a top priority for the school district

and the City of Littleton. All playground improvements are needed for the playground to meet current standards and provide more accessible and inspiring experiences for visitors. The City of Littleton has committed to funding a percentage of the project for \$50,000. LPS Operations will match with in-kind funds, and Runyon is committed to contributing \$45,000 for the cash match needed for the project. Most of the existing play structures were installed over 30 years ago and have outlived their ten-year lifespan. The playground is lacking in modern, challenging play equipment and needs updating to meet current ADA standards. The proposed playground renovation improvements will meet these ADA standards, provide age-appropriate play areas, and create more accessibility for students and visitors with/without disabilities. Because of the major renovation at Runyon, during 2015–2016 the playground is closed for safety reasons and has taken a beating. Some pieces have been moved for access to the school and to house construction equipment and supplies and may not be able to be reinstalled as per manufacturer specifications, therefore and creating dangerous conditions. The asphalt is cracked and heaving in some areas, which could be a potential dangerous tripping hazard. There are 9,000 school age children (2-mile radius) in the community who would benefit from this renovated playground. The closet park is 3.5 miles away and does not have an inclusive playground to meet the needs of children with disabilities. The community has rallied around the project and been very vocal at City of Littleton meetings in 2014–2015 which led to the priority of the project. There are currently no other grants available that could cover the scope and cost of this grant, and the community would be hard pressed to raise money over the next few years to renovate this project piecemeal. Therefore, if funding was not provided by the Arapahoe County Open Space Grant, these benefits would be lost if this project was not funded.

Planning for Runyon's playground started in 2014 with a planning grant of \$10,000 from the City of Littleton. A number of neighborhood community meetings were held where the overall concept of the new playground was discussed, and the needs for all students and the community were determined. Playground features/structures were voted on by the students, parents, and community with the use of a photo survey. Student, parents, and neighborhood community members were asked to pick the top three elements they would like to see incorporated into the design of the playground. The survey was shown at a number of PTO meetings to accommodate parents and other community members. The principal, PE teachers, special education teachers, staff, parents, and the district wellness coordinator met once a month to choose features for a new playground based on information collected from students and the neighborhood community. A playground

architect was hired to develop conceptual plans. The conceptual plans were given to All Around Recreation, who developed the final plans and budget for the project.

The design and engineering aspects of the playground are finished and the project is shovel-ready. All Around Recreation will apply for bonds and permits with the City of Littleton. The project does not necessitate a change in zoning. The cost for permits needed by All Around recreation is \$5,000.

In correlation with the project timeline, the Runyon playground renovation project will stay within the two years of being awarded the Arapahoe Open Space Grant Funds. LPS's purchasing department, the director of operations, and the operations staff have discussed the scope of work and have coordinated all aspects of planning, design, and construction of the playground. Designs for the playground are complete and the playgrounds are sole sourced through All Around Recreation. After the award of the Arapahoe Open Space Grant in June 2016, construction is slated to begin in the spring of May 2017. The project is expected to be completed by mid-August 2017.

7. Efforts to obtain public input occurred during the planning process of the playground. Community meetings were publicized to the school community, City of Littleton, SSPRD, and local residents in 2014 when the playground planning process started. The Students and community were surveyed to determine the types of playground structures and environment that was needed. A committee composed of the school principal, physical education teacher, staff, special education teachers, parents, and the district wellness coordinator met with a playground architect to design conceptual plans for the

playground based on the collected information. The City of Littleton partnered with LPS for a percentage cash match of the project in 2014 as a priority for the next playground project. There is no opposition to the playground renovation project.

100 percent of the cash match is secured from the City of Littleton and fundraising efforts of the PTO at Runyon Elementary School. The City of Littleton has budgeted \$50,000 as a cash match for the playground renovation. The PTO at Runyon has raised \$45,000. LPS Operations and Maintenance will contribute in-kind by adding cement borders around play areas and the removal of old play structures. The project was bid by All Around Recreation and a budget was created. Unless the scope of work changes because of unknown conditions, the project will stay within budget. The City of Littleton understands that any costs or overruns are their responsibility.

There is full support from the user groups at Runyon Elementary School, Runyon School Aged Child Care, Littleton Soccer, South Suburban Parks and Recreation District, and the adjacent communities. SSPRD and Littleton Soccer utilize the athletic fields adjacent to Runyon's playground for practices and games with over 10,000 athletes. Depending on the season, over 500 athletic users could visit the playground after school and weekends on a daily basis. The different leagues appreciate the value of having accessible playgrounds in close proximity to the playing fields. Parents/guardians can safely watch one child play in the game while the other plays safely on the nearby playground. Having a playground that meets the current ADA guidelines with updated structures and shelter creates a space where families can gather before, during, and after athletic events.

This is a renovation project with a pre-existing playground. There are no scenic, historical, or cultural values affected by this project. The open space and trails connected to the school will not be affected by the renovation, nor will the trees and natural landscaping between the school playground and the open space area.

11. Discuss the ownership and legal access to the proposed project site, including right of access without trespassing on adjacent property. Runyon Elementary School is owned by Littleton Public Schools. There is encouraged access to the community before and after school hours and on weekends. There is ample parking in the school's parking lot and on adjacent streets. There is also access from Heritage High School on the opposite side of the open space via trails from their parking lot. The Lee Gulch Trail system connects the playground to the neighborhoods and to the Mary Carter Trail, the South Platte trail system, and many community amenities. Littleton Public Schools has an intergovernmental agreement with South Suburban Parks and Recreation District for use of fields for various athletic leagues. There are no encumbrances for use by the community of the playgrounds.

12. Describe long-term maintenance of the project site and components. Estimate the annual costs to maintain the site, how those numbers were calculated, how you intend to fund maintenance and who is responsible for maintenance. Littleton Public Schools' operations and maintenance department will be responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of the playground, keeping it in high quality condition for its useful life. The annual cost for maintaining the playground is projected to be \$500.00. The estimates were derived from available information, quotes from vendors, and based on past experience for playground maintenance budgets at other schools. The funding for the maintenance of this project is from the annually-funded capital reserve budget for operations and maintenance, with \$75,000 specified for LPS playground maintenance. The budget is reviewed annually and any adjustments for new

construction are updated at that time. General (year-round) maintenance provides in-kind support that includes sweeping, grooming of vegetation where appropriate, litter pick up, snow removal, weed management, and routine repair. The school's facility manager and the operations and maintenance department provide routine maintenance of the playground. Runyon Elementary School has motion sensors on the roof to deter any vandalism and has not had any issues in the past. If there is vandalism of the playground, such as tagging structures with paint, the equipment is easily cleaned, and LPS will return all equipment back to its former state. We do not expect an increase of maintenance costs due to vandalism. LPS also carries insurance.

13. Describe how this project addresses inclusivity per the Americans with Disabilities Act guidelines.

Runyon Elementary School has a center-based special education program, which serves students with multiple and significant needs. These students are unable to walk, run, and play on a typical playground. The project addresses inclusivity by creating an ADA-accessible playground with elements that can be used by children of all abilities. Play areas and play structures were strategically picked to address these needs. Crusher fines will be used for access in some areas and engineered wood chip fibers will be used in all play areas to comply with the Consumer Product Safety Commission's guidelines, the American Society for Testing and Materials (ATM) Standards, and /or ADA accessibility standards.

Information will be sent to the school community and a ribbon cutting event recognizing Arapahoe County Open Space Sales Tax Money would be hosted during the school year upon completion of the project.

POLICY QUESTION:

Does city council support adoption of an Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) with Arapahoe County to receive grant funds to implement the first phase of Hudson Garden's River Integration Project?

BACKGROUND:

City council approved the submission of a grant application, at the request of Hudson Gardens, to fund the first phase of the River Integration Project. Staff was notified on May 24, 2016 that the project was awarded \$400,000 in funding from Arapahoe County Open Space.

STAFF ANALYSIS:

This is the standard IGA required by the county to accept grant funds from the Open Space Program.

FISCAL IMPACTS:

In the 2015 budget, the city council approved \$400,000 in open space matching funds for the project. The city staff will act as the administrative agent for the grant.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends approval of the resolution.

PROPOSED MOTION:

INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT REGARDING 2016 GRANT OF ARAPAHOE COUNTY OPEN SPACE PROGRAM FUNDS PROJECT NAME: PHASE I RIVER INTEGRATION AT HUDSON GARDENS

This Intergovernmental Agreement ("Agreement"), is made and entered into by and between **THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF THE COUNTY OF ARAPAHOE, STATE OF COLORADO**, (the "County") and the **CITY OF LITTLETON**, a municipality and political subdivision of the State of Colorado (the "Grantee") (collectively, "Parties" and individually a "Party").

WHEREAS, on November 4, 2003, and on November 1, 2011, the voters of Arapahoe County approved a county-wide sales and use tax to be deposited in the Arapahoe County Open Space Fund and used for specified open space purposes as set forth in County Resolution No. 030381, as amended by Resolution No. 110637 (Open Space Resolution); and

WHEREAS, the Open Space Resolution authorizes the County to award discretionary grants from its Open Space Fund to municipalities and special districts, as more fully set forth therein; and

WHEREAS, on May 25, 2016 the County approved the Grantee's Grant Proposal for the Phase I River Integration at Hudson Gardens ("Grant Project"), which is attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein as Exhibit A, subject to the execution of an intergovernmental agreement and subject to the terms and conditions contained herein; and

WHEREAS, this intergovernmental agreement is authorized by Article XIV, Section 18 of the Colorado Constitution and COLO. REV. STAT. § 29-1-203.

NOW, THEREFORE, the County and the Grantee agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Amount of Grant.</u> The County hereby awards Grantee an amount not to exceed **\$400,000** ("Grant Funds") for the Grant Project from the Arapahoe County Open Space Fund.
- 2. <u>Use of Grant Funds</u>. The Grantee agrees that it shall only use the Grant Funds for the Grant Project, as described in Exhibit A.
- 3. <u>Disbursement of Grant Funds.</u> Subsequent to execution of this Agreement, the Grant Funds shall be paid via ACH transfer on a reimbursement basis upon receipt of the approved status report and documentation of expenditures as outlined in Paragraph 10 below and no more often than bi-annually. No more than 75% of the grant funds will be reimbursed prior to the Final Report approval. The final 25% of grant funds will be reimbursed following the project inspection and review and approval of the Final Report and project deliverables.
- 4. <u>Time for Use of Grant Funds</u>. The Grantee agrees that the Grant Project must begin within 60 days of the award notification. The Grantee agrees that the Grant Project will be completed and the Grant Funds will be expended by no later than

two years from the date of this fully executed Agreement, unless a longer period of time is otherwise agreed to by the County in writing. The Grantee understands and agrees that if the Grant Project cannot be completed by the end of the agreed upon time period the County may require that the Grant Funds be refunded to the County Open Space Grant Fund, be re-distributed to another agency and/or be used for another viable and timely grant project.

- 5. <u>Interest on Grant Funds</u>. The Grantee further agrees that, after receipt of the Grant Funds, the Grantee will use any interest earned on the Grant Funds only for the Grant Project as set forth in Exhibit A.
- 6. Administration of Grant Project. The Grantee shall be responsible for the direct supervision and administration of the Grant Project. The County shall not be liable or responsible for any cost overruns on the Grant Project, nor shall the County have any duty or obligation to provide any additional funding for the Grant Project if the Grant Project cannot be completed with the awarded Grant Funds. Grantee also agrees to comply with all local, state and federal requirements while completing the Project unless specifically waived.
- 7. <u>Grant Project Site Visits</u>. Upon 24 hours written notice to the Grantee, the Grantee agrees to allow the County to make site visits before, during, at the completion of and/or after the Grant Project.
- 8. Acknowledgement of County by Grantee. The Grantee agrees to acknowledge the County as a contributor to the Grant Project in all publications, news releases and other publicity issued by the Grantee related to the Grant Project and agrees to allow the County to do the same. If any events are planned in regards to the Grant Project, the County shall be acknowledged as a contributor in the invitation to such events. Grantee shall cooperate with the County in preparing public information pieces, providing photos of the Grant Project from time to time, and providing access to the Grant Project for publicity purposes. Event information, event materials and press release information related to the Grant Project must be sent to the County Grants Program Administrator for review and filing.
- 9. Required Sign at Project Site. The County agrees to purchase a standard sign for each grant project. Grantee agrees to pay the sign cost to the County for each grant project. Grantee agrees to erect and permanently maintain at least one sign in a publicly visible area in recognition of the Grant from the Arapahoe County Open Space Program. If the Grantee wishes to use their own sign and design, the Grantee must submit the sign location, design, and wording to the County Grants Program Administrator for approval prior to manufacture and/or installation of such sign. Such sign shall be erected prior to the completion of the Grant Project or its public opening, whichever is earlier.
- 10. <u>Report Requirements</u>. On or before **January 31**st and **July 31**st annually, the Grantee agrees to provide the County with Grant Project Progress Reports that conform to the format provided by the County. Each Grant Project Progress Report shall include supporting financial documentation as requested in the form

provided. Upon completion of the Grant Project, the Grantee also agrees to submit to the County a Final Report that conforms to the format provided by the County; a final spreadsheet comparing the original budget to actual expenses that certifies Grant Funds used in compliance with the Open Space Resolution; and GIS data with location and boundaries of the Grant Project. The Final Report shall also include supporting financial documentation as requested in the County report form and high resolution photographs of the progress and finished results of the Grant Project. The Grantee further agrees to provide the County with digital copies of said photographs, delivered as separate high resolution jpeg images. The Final Report shall be submitted within three (3) months of Grant Project completion unless a longer period of time has been agreed to by the County in writing. The County shall be allowed to use information and images from these reports in publications, public information updates, and on the County's web site.

- 11. <u>Failure to Submit Required Reports</u>. Upon written notice from the County's Open Space Grants Program Administrator, informing the Grantee that it has failed to submit any required status report and/or final report, the Grantee shall submit such reports to the County through the County's Open Space Grants Program Administrator within thirty (30) days, and, if it fails to do so, the Grantee shall be deemed to be in violation this Agreement *pursuant to Paragraph 15*, *below*.
- 12. Record Keeping Requirements. The Grantee shall maintain a complete set of books and records documenting its use of the Grant Funds and its supervision and administration of the Grant Project. The County or any of its duly authorized representatives shall have reasonable access to any books, documents, papers, and records of the Grantee which are pertinent to the Grant Project for the purpose of making an audit, examination, or excerpts. The Grantee shall keep all books, documents, papers, and records, which are pertinent to the Grant Project, for a minimum of three years from the project completion date.
- 13. <u>Changes to Grant Project</u>. The Grantee agrees and understands that its Grant Project, once it has been approved by the County, may not be changed without the County's prior approval. Proposed changes must be formally requested using the applicable Grant Project Modification Form provided by the County. Changes may not begin until the County has issued an approval, which may also require the execution of an amendment to this Agreement.
- 14. <u>Maintenance</u>. Grantee agrees to assume responsibility for continuous long-term maintenance and public safety of open space lands, trails, recreation facilities, amenities, signage or other projects funded by the Grant Funds.
- 15. <u>Failure to Comply and Reimbursement of Grant Funds.</u> The Grantee understands and agrees that the County may require the Grantee to reimburse the County if any portion of the Grant Funds are not used in accordance with its approved Grant Proposal and this Agreement. Failure to comply with the terms of this Agreement shall result in default and the Grantee shall be ineligible for any future Grant

Funds until the violation is remedied or after such other time period as determined by the County.

- 16. <u>Remedies.</u> The rights and remedies of the County as set forth in this Agreement shall not be exclusive and are in addition to any other rights or remedies provided by law.
- 17. <u>No Waiver of Rights</u>. A waiver by either Party to this Agreement of the breach of any term or provision of this Agreement shall not operate or be construed as a waiver of any subsequent breach by either Party.
- 18. <u>Relationship of the Parties</u>. The Grantee shall perform all duties and obligations under this Agreement as an independent contractor and shall not be deemed by virtue of this Agreement to have entered into any partnership, joint venture, employer/employee, or other relationship with the County.
- 19. <u>No Third Party Beneficiaries</u>. Nothing in this Agreement shall give or allow any claim or right of action whatsoever by any third party, including, but not limited to, any agents or contractors of the Grantee.
- 20. <u>Severability</u>. Should any one or more provisions of this Agreement be determined to be illegal or unenforceable, all other provisions nevertheless shall remain effective; provided, however, the Parties shall forthwith enter into good faith negotiations and proceed with due diligence to draft a provision that will achieve the original intent of the Parties hereunder.
- 21. <u>Written Amendment Required.</u> This Agreement may be amended, modified, or changed, in whole or in part, only by written agreement duly authorized and executed by the County and the Grantee.
- 22. <u>Venue.</u> Venue for the trial of any action arising out of any dispute hereunder shall be in Arapahoe County District Court, pursuant to the appropriate rules of civil procedure.
- 23. <u>Notices.</u> Notices, as referred to in this Agreement, shall be sent to:

- 27. <u>Section Headings</u>. The headings for any section of this Agreement are only for the convenience and reference of the Parties and are not intended in any way to define, limit or describe the scope or intent of this Agreement.
- 28. <u>Assignment.</u> The rights, or any parts thereof, granted to the Parties herein may be assigned only with the prior written consent of the non-assigning party.
- 29. Extent of Agreement. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement of the Parties hereto. The Parties agree that there have been no representations made regarding the subject matter hereof other than those, if any, contained herein, that this Agreement constitutes the entire agreement of the Parties with respect to the subject matter hereof, and further agree that the various promises and covenants contained herein are mutually agreed upon and are in consideration of one another.
- 30. <u>Signatures.</u> The signatories to this Agreement represent that they are fully authorized to execute this Agreement and bind their respective entities.

Executive Summary: The Hudson Gardens & Event Center ('Hudson Gardens') is a 30-acre multiuse facility that serves as a destination for people throughout the Denver metropolitan area. It welcomes nearly 160,000 guests annually who visit for a variety of purposes including recreational opportunities, social gatherings, access to nature, learning opportunities, and entertainment experiences. Since opening in 1996, it has evolved from a gated facility with controlled entry points to a public open space that offers free admission.

The facility features two entrances; one is located along South Santa Fe Drive and the other lies along its western perimeter which is adjacent to the Mary Carter Greenway Trail ('Trail'). The Trail is a 9.8 mile paved trail located along the South Platte River corridor, enjoyed by

approximately 577,000 users per year. It is part of the 270-mile Front Range Trail System and provides connections to many recreational destinations within the Denver Metropolitan region.

The junction between Hudson Gardens and the Trail is an existing trailhead and is a popular gathering place and hub of activity. It features a seasonal snack shop, a shaded picnic structure, movable tables and chairs, and restrooms.

Despite the high usage of this area, Trail users are not attracted into Hudson Gardens, and Hudson Gardens' visitors are not attracted onto the Trail. Contributing factors include indirect trail connections between the facility's parking lots, Santa Fe entrance, and the Trail entrance; the absence of signage and property identification at the junction between the Trail and Hudson Gardens; the small size and discreet location of the Trail entrance; and a fence along the western edge of the property that creates a physical barrier between the Hudson Gardens and the Trail.

Integrating the Trail with Hudson Gardens is the subject of this project. The project was identified as a "quick win" in the South Platte River Corridor Vision Report (2013) and identified as a priority in Hudson Gardens' ten year Facility Master Plan (2014). A visitor survey of Trail users and Hudson Gardens' visitors validated the need and community support for this project, and planning efforts began with the goals of enhancing connectivity and access to the Mary Carter Greenway Trail and South Platte River corridor, broadening the experiences of Trail users, and increasing public visitation to Hudson Gardens.

A master plan for 'River Integration' was completed in 2014. The project is composed of four phases and the improvements include:

- Phase I: The creation of direct connections between Hudson Gardens' Santa Fe
 entrance and its Trail entrance (the existing trailhead), the development of a new
 access point to the trailhead, and the construction of a new parking facility to serve
 Trail users;
- Phase II: The addition of nature play exhibits and site amenities that enhance the
 experiences of those that use the Trail and visit Hudson Gardens and the creation of
 additional facility access points to and from the Trail;
- Phase III: The construction of an additional direct connection to the Trail entrance from the Santa Fe entrance and improvements within Hudson Gardens that provide environmental learning opportunities;
- Phase IV: The improvement of an undeveloped parcel lying immediately north of Hudson Gardens and the existing trailhead.

It is the first phase of the River Integration project for which grant funding is requested from Arapahoe County Open Space (ACOS) in 2016. It includes the creation of a new parking lot and an ADA-accessible concrete trail along the northern property boundary that permits

direct pedestrian and bicycle access to and from Santa Fe to the Trail via Hudson Gardens' property. This phase also includes improved interior trail connections that enhance access to and from the Trail via Hudson Gardens' Santa Fe entrance. Both the new trail originating from the new parking facility, and the reworked interior trails, will culminate at the Trail entrance, which will be redeveloped into a more welcoming and accessible entry point to the facility.

The River Integration project will support other recent community investments along the South Platte River corridor by providing much-needed additional parking facilities and improved public access to the Trail.

The conceptual plans for River Integration have been developed by Stream Design, LLC. The construction budget for this project is \$932,238. A cash match of \$532,238 has been secured by the City of Littleton and project partner Hudson Gardens. The project is slated to begin construction in late 2016 and be completed by late fall/winter 2017. Once built, the project will be managed and maintained by Hudson Gardens and supported by the South Suburban Park and Recreation District (SSPRD), the property owner. The project will be available and open to the public at all times, including times that are outside of Hudson Gardens' normal hours of operation.

The estimated project budget is \$932,238, which includes eligible design and construction costs. Design expenses reflect those for consultants from Stream Design, LLC, inclusive of schematic designs, design development, construction drawings, and bidding period services. Administrative costs for the City of Littleton and Hudson Gardens are not included.

The City of Littleton and Hudson Gardens are requesting \$400,000 from ACOS and are matching the project at 57% with \$532,238 in cash. General site development costs including demolition, earthwork, mobilization, design, and construction observation will be paid by the City of Littleton's and Hudson Gardens' respective matches. The remainder of the City of Littleton's match will cover landscaping, signage, furnishings, and shade structures. Grant funds from ACOS will be allocated toward the paving and surfacing of all trails and the parking lot, furnishings, retaining walls, fencing, and stairs, expenses related to drainage and water quality, and shade structures and shelters.

Hudson Gardens has committed a total of \$227,114 towards this project, which includes \$132,238 in eligible matching funds (reflected in this grant budget) and \$94,876 in contingency funds (not included in this grant budget) to be used for unforeseen circumstances that arise during construction.

The Hudson Gardens & Event Center ('Hudson Gardens') is a 30-acre multiuse facility that serves as a destination for people throughout the Denver metropolitan area for a variety of purposes. Among its offerings are recreational opportunities, gathering spaces, access to nature, learning opportunities, and entertainment experiences. The property spans 30 acres and features horticultural collections and display beds, public art, an outdoor amphitheater, three separate event facilities, and an abundance of wildlife and native areas. It welcomes nearly 160,000 guests annually through daily Garden visitation, classes, field trips, family programs, and private and public events including a popular summer concert series and holiday light display.

Since opening in 1996, Hudson Gardens has evolved from a gated facility with controlled entry points to a public open space that offers free admission. The facility features two entrances; one is located along South Santa Fe Drive and the other is along its western perimeter which lies adjacent to the Mary Carter Greenway Trail ('Trail'). The Trail is a 9.8 mile paved trail located along the South Platte River corridor, enjoyed by approximately 577,000 users per year. It is part of the 270-mile Front Range Trail System and provides connections to many recreational destinations within the Denver Metropolitan region.

The junction between Hudson Gardens and the Trail is an existing trailhead and an important component of Hudson Gardens' connectivity to the City of Littleton and surrounding communities. The area features the entrance to Hudson Gardens, a small seasonal snack shop, a shaded picnic structure, movable tables and chairs, and restrooms. Unfortunately, unsafe conditions often arise at the junction during peak Trail-usage times, caused by the convergence of multiple types of Trail users. Nevertheless, the area remains a popular destination and hub of activity along the Trail for cyclists and other recreational users.

Despite the high usage of this area, Trail users are not attracted into Hudson Gardens, and Hudson Gardens' visitors are not attracted onto the Trail. Contributing factors include indirect trail connections between the facility's parking lots, Santa Fe entrance, and the Trail entrance; the absence of signage and property identification at the junction between the Trail and Hudson Gardens; the small size and discreet location of the Trail entrance; and a fence along the property's western edge that creates a physical barrier between Hudson Gardens and the Trail.

Eliminating these barriers and integrating the Trail with Hudson Gardens is the purpose of this project, the goals of which are to enhance connectivity and access to the Mary Carter Greenway Trail and South Platte River corridor, broaden the experiences of Trail users, and increase public visitation to Hudson Gardens. Heightened visitation will introduce new and

expanded audiences to Hudson Gardens, enabling the institution to more widely connect its mission, exhibits, and programs with the greater public. In addition, connecting Trail users with the rich recreational, cultural, educational, and artistic amenities within Hudson Gardens will enhance the regional value of the South Platte River corridor and diversify the range of experiences available to Trail users.

With these goals in mind, a master plan for 'River Integration' was completed in 2014. The project is composed of four phases and its components include:

- Phase I: The creation of direct connections between Hudson Gardens' Santa Fe entrance and its Trail entrance (the existing trailhead), the development of a new access point to the trailhead, and the construction of a new parking facility to serve Trail users;
- Phase II: The addition of nature play exhibits and site amenities that enhance the
 experiences of those that use the Trail and visit Hudson Gardens and the creation of
 additional facility access points to and from the Trail;
- Phase III: The construction of an additional direct connection to the Trail entrance from the Santa Fe entrance and improvements within Hudson Gardens that provide environmental learning opportunities;
- Phase IV: The improvement of an undeveloped parcel lying immediately north of Hudson Gardens and the existing trailhead.

The purpose of this grant application is to request funding for Phase I of the River Integration project. This phase includes the creation of new parking lot with approximately 45 parking spaces and an ADA-accessible concrete trail along the northern property boundary that permits direct pedestrian and bicycle access to and from Santa Fe Drive to the Trail via Hudson Gardens' property. Phase I also includes improved interior trail connections that enhance access to and from the Trail via Hudson Gardens' Santa Fe entrance. Both the new trail originating from the new parking facility, and the reworked interior trails, will culminate at the Trail entrance, which will be redeveloped into a more welcoming and accessible entry point into the facility.

Phase I of the River Integration project will include redesigning the junction between Hudson Gardens and the Trail, which will address the unsafe conditions posed by the current design and blend the character of Hudson Gardens with the characteristics of the South Platte River corridor. An oval-shaped bluegrass lawn will anchor the redeveloped entryway, supported by amenities such as bench seating, shade provided by both trees and tensile shade structures, additional bike racks, and improved picnicking facilities. The area will also offer cultural elements that include artistic features, public art relocated from other areas of Hudson Gardens, horticultural display beds, and an interactive digital kiosk that acts as a guide to the adjoining areas and region.

All improvements will be congruent with open space specifications and meet accessibility standards. The project area will be available and open to the public at all times, including times that are outside of Hudson Gardens' normal hours of operation.

The conceptual plans for River Integration, including Phase I, are attached in part G. The plans were developed by Stream Design, LLC with feedback from Hudson Gardens' personnel and users. Construction of the project will be competitively bid and managed by Hudson Gardens. Once built, ongoing maintenance will be performed by Hudson Gardens.

2. Describe the community/neighborhood and user groups the project will serve. Discuss the type of users (children, adults, seniors, families, sports leagues, youth groups, etc.) the project will serve and estimate the number of user groups annually that will benefit from the project. Because the River Integration project connects to the Trail and Front Range Trail System, the project's service area spans a wide geographic reach throughout the Denver metropolitan region. The project will serve both Trail users as well as visitors of Hudson Gardens. Recent total user-counts estimate that the Trail is utilized by approximately 577,000 users annually. This figure is based upon automated and manual user-counts conducted in 2015 near the southern terminal point of the Trail. Given Hudson Gardens' close proximity to the data collection point, the number of Trail users who pass by Hudson Gardens is assumed to be similar to the annual number of Trail users. Approximately 325,000 of the Trail users are cyclists, while the remaining 252,000 users are pedestrians (runners, walkers, or those on rollerblades or skateboards). Other common user groups along the Trail include fishermen, wildlife observers and photographers, and whitewater activity participants.

Hudson Gardens primarily serves the southwest Denver, Colorado metropolitan area. In 2014 (the most recent attendance data available), the facility welcomed 157,718 visitors, 85% of whom were from Arapahoe, Douglas, Jefferson, and Denver counties. The population demographic of these counties is generally reflective of that of the state of Colorado as a whole.

3. Describe the planning process that identified this specific project as a priority. Is this project listed as a priority in a master plan, site specific plan or other adopted planning document? Multiple planning processes have identified the River Integration project as a priority, including those by the City of Littleton, the South Platte Working Group, and Hudson Gardens.

Littleton's Citywide Plan (2014) is part of a significant planning process designed to provide direction for the city's evolution and future priorities. A collaborative effort between citizens of

Littleton and the City's planning board, the Citywide Plan identifies the South Platte River as one of the City's most important assets and highlights the collective desire to focus public and private investments along the South Platte River corridor. The River Integration project is reflective of these priorities, primarily because the project site is located along the South Platte River corridor and the project improves public access to the River and enhances the experiences of those visiting the River and adjacent Trail.

The South Platte River Corridor Vision document (2013), created by the South Platte Working Group, describes the River Integration project at Hudson Gardens and identifies it as a priority project along the South Platte River corridor. The South Platte Working Group is comprised of local land officials and municipalities that work collectively to identify, advocate for, and support improvement projects along the South Platte River corridor. The Vision document describes Hudson Gardens as an important asset and missed opportunity along South Platte River. It provides a detailed description of the benefits of integrating Hudson Gardens with the Trail and outlines specific recommendations on how to structure the improvements to maximize the benefits to all users. The design of the River Integration project is a direct reflection of the recommendations cited in this document.

Hudson Gardens' Facility Master Plan (2014) outlines a strategic, phased plan for capital improvements at Hudson Gardens over the next ten years. Development of the Master Plan included active engagement and involvement from a variety of constituents including Hudson Gardens, SSPRD, key partners, neighbors, local residents, volunteers, and officials from the City of Littleton. The River Integration project was included within the Master Plan's schedule of projects for 2015-2016. The project accomplishes many strategic purposes outlined within the Master Plan including improvements to physical connectivity, the strengthening of Hudson Gardens' physical presence, the development of enhanced learning opportunities, and maximization of resources.

4. Discuss the need and urgency for this project and why it is a priority. What opportunities will be lost if this project is not funded now?

Without the improvements proposed by the River Integration project, Hudson Gardens will continue to represent a missed opportunity along the South Platte River corridor. Accessibility to the Trail from Santa Fe Drive will continue to be compromised due to parking constraints and too few public access points. Local and regional Trail users will miss the opportunity to experience Hudson Gardens, which is a vibrant element of Littleton's cultural and recreational scene, and Hudson Gardens' nearly 160,000 annual visitors will continue to be unaware of the rich recreational amenities on the opposite side of the fence line.

Receiving funding from ACOS creates the opportunity to leverage additional funds to support subsequent phases of the River Integration project, making it more likely that future phases of the project are completed, and in a shorter timeframe.

Failing to receive funding from ACOS would likely result in one of two scenarios for the Phase I improvements: either Phase I is divided into two or more smaller phases, dramatically extending the timeframe for completion of the project; or, the project scope for Phase I is reduced by approximately one-half (which is the extent of the project that can be completed with the funds already secured). Both scenarios reduce the project's benefit to the community and may lead to lost momentum and community support.

Planning for the River Integration project began in 2012 when Hudson Gardens began development of its Facility Master Plan, and the project was identified for inclusion within its schedule of projects. During this same time, Hudson Gardens participated in meetings of the South Platte Working Group, where the project was identified as a priority.

In July 2014, Hudson Gardens engaged the services of Stream Design, LLC to develop the initial concepts for the multi-phased project in preparation for a request to engage the City of Littleton as a project partner and secure funding support. The City of Littleton subsequently awarded Hudson Gardens \$400,000 in funding from its 2015 budget. Receipt of funds was contingent upon a 50% match (\$200,000) from Hudson Gardens, which was then budgeted by Hudson Gardens in 2015.

Hudson Gardens and Stream Design subsequently entered into contract to refine and complete the conceptual design for Phase I of the project during 2015. In that same year, the project was presented to several external stakeholders including SSPRD, the South Platte Working Group, and the Arapahoe County Open Space and Trails Advisory Board. In summer 2015, upon completion of the Phase I conceptual design, the City of Littleton committed to assist Hudson Gardens with raising the additional capital to support construction of Phase I of the project, which included the opportunity to partner for submittal of an ACOS grant application.

Prior to this application, Hudson Gardens has paid \$44,883 towards design services that were necessary to prepare for this project for funding proposals. These expenses are not included in the project budget as part of Hudson Gardens' cash match.

In accordance with the project timeline, Phase I of the River Integration project will be completed within two years of receiving grant funding. Preliminary design work is complete; engineering and construction documents will be completed in the coming months. Construction is anticipated to begin in fall 2016 and be completed in fall 2017, with the final report submitted in late fall/winter 2017. All permits (demolition, building, electrical, grading, and erosion control) will be obtained by the project's general contractor as part of the construction process. Permitting expenses are included within the mobilization estimates, which amount to an estimated \$60,206. The project does not require any changes in zoning and will not require a 404-permit as the only water resource affected by this project is Hudson Gardens' Wetlands, which is not considered "waters of the United States" and does not connect to the South Platte River.

7. Discuss any efforts to obtain public input, disseminate public information, develop partnerships, develop partnerships for cash funding or in-kind contributions, and garner community support specifically related to this project. Information about the Phase I River Integration project at Hudson Gardens was first provided to the public during a Littleton City Council study session in August 2014, and again in fall 2014 when it was included in the City of Littleton's 2015 budget which was available for public review and comment. The project has been shared and discussed at meetings of SSPRD, the South Platte Working Group, and at facility master planning meetings at Hudson Gardens, all of which included public representation and opportunities for comment.

In September 2015, a visitor intercept study of Trail users and Hudson Gardens' users was conducted to introduce the project and evaluate the conceptual design of the Phase I improvements. The survey was also made available in hard copy format at Hudson Gardens' Welcome Center and distributed electronically to segments of Hudson Gardens' audience base including members, volunteers, and donors. Responses were collected for a two week period and the feedback was used to modify and refine the conceptual design. No opposition has been received concerning this project.

8. How much of your planned cash match is secured? How much still needs to be raised and what are your plans for raising additional funds? What is your back up plan if you are unable to raise those funds? Do you understand that all overruns are the responsibility of the applicant/grantee? One hundred percent of the cash match is secured. The City of Littleton committed its match, \$400,000 in cash, in its 2015 budget. Hudson Gardens has committed its \$132,238 match in its 2016 budget and will budget additional funds in its 2017 budget as necessary to complete the project. The commitment of these funds are referenced in the letters of support that are attached in Part G.

The trail components of Phase I of the River Integration project at Hudson Gardens will occur on land currently developed as trails and service roads. The parking facility will be constructed on land currently housing Hudson Gardens' maintenance facility, and the redesigned trailhead/junction between Hudson Gardens and the Trail will be located in an area currently utilized by Hudson Gardens as a garden railroad exhibit and horticultural display beds.

The project site includes a significant natural feature, the 1.25 acre 'Wetlands'. The Wetlands is a remnant oxbow of the South Platte River and currently serves as storm water detention. Its shoreline is dominated by aquatic and terrestrial herbs, grasses, rushes, and sedges, and woody plants consisting mostly of Plains Cottonwood trees. The Wetlands also serves as habitat for a variety of fauna including raccoons, red fox, toads, Western Painted turtles, snapping turtles, muskrats, and a multitude of bird species including Great Blue heron, Black-crowned Night Heron, Northern Flicker, Belted Kingfisher, Mallard, and Wood Duck. The eastern bank of the Wetlands is currently very steep and will be slightly graded to allow for ADA accessibility of the 2016 Standard and Small Grant

interior trail improvements. Following grading for the trail, the bank will be revegetated with native plant species, which will enhance the ecological value of this area. The proposed improvements will not otherwise disturb the Wetlands or any other natural resources.

11. Discuss the ownership and legal access to the proposed project site, including right of access without trespassing on adjacent property. The Phase I River Integration project will occur at Hudson Gardens, which is owned by SSPRD. The District acquired the property in 1997 from the King C. Hudson and Evelyn Leigh Hudson Foundation, Inc. and entered into a management agreement with the Foundation at the same time. A copy of the management agreement and deed are attached in Part G. Executive Director Rob Hanna of SSPRD has provided a letter evidencing SSPRD's support of the project, permission to access and improve the property, and commitment to long-term maintenance, which is attached.

The Trail is constructed on a recreational easement provided by the Colorado Water Conservation Board to SSPRD. Parts of the project site are also located on an easement provided by the Southwest Metropolitan Water and Sanitation District. The project does not violate the restrictions of either easement and both groups support the project with no objection, as evidenced by their letters of support which are attached in Part G. Copies of all easements have been provided to the ACOS Grant Administrator. There are no other third-party encumbrances that will affect access to the project site during construction or after completion of the project.

12. Describe long-term maintenance of the project site and components. Via a management agreement with SSPRD (attached), the King C. Hudson and Evelyn Leigh Hudson Foundation, Inc. is responsible for all maintenance requirements on the property, which will include the Phase I River Integration project. Should the Foundation cease to operate the facility, maintenance responsibilities will shift to SSPRD.

Once completed, maintenance needs for this project will consist mostly of those related to the trails and planting beds. Maintenance of the trails will not include any significant additional expense as the total linear feet of new and/or improved trails is similar to current conditions. additional trail maintenance costs arise, they can be easily absorbed by the annual trail maintenance budgets of Hudson Gardens and SSPRD, who currently work jointly to perform trail maintenance at Hudson Gardens. The planting beds will require regular maintenance, which may require the addition of a seasonal employee between the months of April and October each year, incurring an additional annual expense of \$15,600. The budget impact for additional irrigation will be negligible, as Hudson Gardens has ample supply of irrigation water available at a very low annual cost. The umbrellas for the picnic tables will require periodic replacement due to wear and tear, and these additional costs can be absorbed by Hudson Gardens' annual maintenance budget.

13. Describe how this project addresses inclusivity per the Americans with Disabilities Act guidelines.

Accommodations have been made to ensure accessibility of all project areas. The proposed improvements will be designed and constructed to current ADA standards, including compliant slopes, grades, and trail widths that permit safe access for those who require mobility assistance. Signage will follow ADA guidelines for height, material, lettering, and finishes.

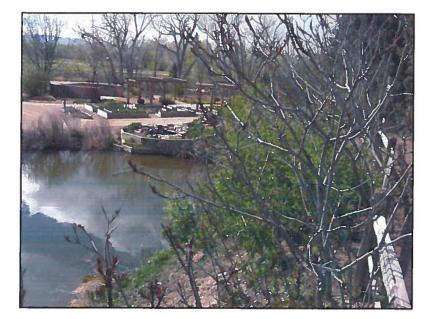

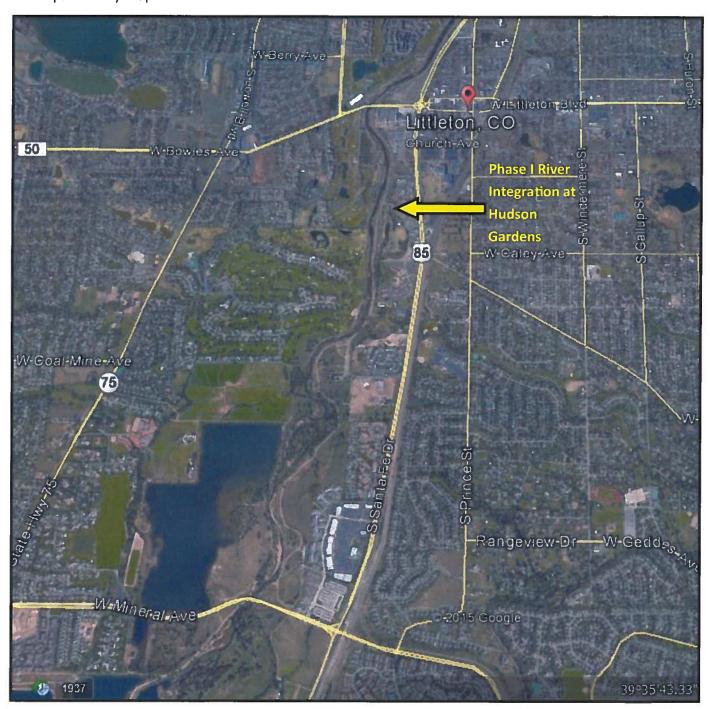

MANAGEMENT AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into as of this 24th day of November, 1997, by and between SOUTH SUBURBAN PARK AND RECREATION DISTRICT, a quasi-municipal corporation and political subdivision of the State of Colorado ("District"), and KING C. HUDSON AND EVELYN LEIGH HUDSON FOUNDATION, INC., a Colorado nonprofit corporation ("Foundation").

RECITALS

- A. Foundation has on the date shown above transferred to District those assets listed on Exhibits A and B attached hereto and made a part hereof. Foundation has retained other assets not shown on Exhibits A and B.
- B. District has on the date shown above assumed or discharged liabilities of Foundation listed on Exhibit C attached hereto.
 - C. District is advancing funds as needed to Foundation.

NOW, THEREFORE, for valid consideration, the receipt and adequacy of which is hereby acknowledged, it is agreed as follows:

AGREEMENT

- 1. <u>MANAGED ASSETS</u>. District hereby engages Foundation to manage the assets listed on Exhibits A and B hereof (the "Gardens"), and Foundation hereby accepts such engagement.
- 2. <u>FUNDING</u>. District shall furnish operating funds to Foundation up to the amount of \$350,000 during 1998. Subject to annual appropriation by District, additional operating support and capital funds shall also be provided by District to Foundation in 1999 and subsequent years in such amounts as the parties agree is reasonable and necessary to perpetuate the Gardens in accordance with the Statement of Intent (the "Statement") attached to the Agreement between the parties dated November 24, 1997 by which Foundation conveyed the Gardens to District, .
- 3. TERM OF AGREEMENT. The term of this Agreement shall be for a period commencing on the date hereof and terminating on December 31, 1998. The term of this Agreement shall be extended automatically for successive one year periods unless District shall give notice to Foundation on or before December 1 of any year that, notwithstanding the Statement, District is not able or willing to appropriate funds to aid in the operation of the Gardens for the upcoming calendar year.
- 4. **TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT**. Either party may terminate this Agreement at any time for cause upon a written notice. For this purpose, cause shall mean: (i) any substantial default under this Agreement that is not substantially cured within 60 days after written notice of default is given by the non-defaulting party to the defaulting party; (ii) any violation of law that

adversely affects the Gardens; or (iii) the bankruptcy, insolvency, involuntary assignment to creditors or dissolution of either party. Notice shall be delivered by (a) hand; (b) certified mail, return receipt requested; or (c) facsimile transmission followed by mailed notice. In the event of termination, Foundation shall return possession of the Gardens to the District, and shall transfer to District all interests then held by Foundation in any real or tangible personal property that is then affixed to or used in connection with or otherwise integral to the operation or maintenance of the Gardens and any other property attributable to any transfer from District; however, all other assets then belonging to Foundation, including without limitation all endowment funds and other cash or investments, shall remain the sole and separate property of Foundation.

- USE OF ASSETS. Foundation shall manage the Gardens for the term of this Agreement and during ordinary and regular business hours as a regional display garden which shall include without limitation: compatible horticultural, educational, cultural, recreational and fundraising uses, activities and events; the charging of admission; solicitation of donations; sale and offering for sale all of the goods, wares, and merchandise; and the performance of such services as are usually incident thereto. Foundation shall operate for as many hours per day, including holidays, as are required to accommodate satisfactorily, economically and efficiently all prospective patrons. Said hours of operations shall be determined by Foundation, subject to reasonable requests for change by District. Foundation shall comply with all federal, state, county and city laws, ordinances, requirements or regulations; defend against the violation of same in good faith; and diligently conduct any necessary proceedings to prevent and avoid any adverse consequences of the same and holds District harmless for any violation by Foundation. Within the limits of the financial resources available to it, Foundation will at all times carry a full and complete stock of items and will maintain adequate personnel for the efficient service of its customers, patrons and donors, and in general, employ its best judgment, efforts and abilities to carry on operations in a manner calculated to produce the maximum educational benefit to the public.
- 6. <u>DEDICATION OF FOUNDATION EFFORTS</u>. So long as Foundation continues as the manager of the Gardens under this Agreement, Foundation will use its best efforts to raise the maximum amount of support possible for the operation, maintenance and improvement of the Gardens through annual fund-raising, membership development, capital campaigns, special events and functions, gift shop sales and other means. Furthermore, so long as Foundation continues as the manager of the Gardens under this Agreement, Foundation will use all of its own assets for the exclusive benefit of the Gardens and the various programs and activities of Foundation carried out in conjunction with its management of the Gardens. Any property of Foundation used to improve the Gardens or that becomes affixed to the Gardens shall become the property of District.
- 7. LICENSES LAWFUL OPERATION. Foundation shall maintain in force and pay, at Foundation's expense, all fees for licenses required and taxes due (federal, state, county or city) in connection with the operation of the Gardens.
- 8. <u>NO PARTNERSHIP CREATED</u>. Nothing herein contained shall be deemed, held or construed to make the District a partner or an associate of Foundation in the conduct of operation of the Gardens nor to render the District liable for any debts, liabilities or obligations incurred by Foundation in the conduct of said operation, it being expressly understood and agreed that the

relationship between the parties hereto is and shall at all times remain that in which Foundation is an independent contractor.

9. MAINTENANCE AND REPAIRS: ALTERNATIONS AND ADDITIONS. Foundation shall, at Foundation's sole cost and expense, but within the limits of the financial resources available to it, keep in good order, condition and repair the foundations, exterior walls (including the interior surface of walls), all windows, doors and plate glass, canopy, downspouts, gutters, parking lot, curbs, sign poles, parking light poles and roof of the buildings, and as necessary, or when required by governmental authority, make modifications or replacements thereof, and make all such repairs, modifications or replacements which become necessary or desirable by reason of Foundation's use of the Gardens or the negligence of Foundation's customers, invitees or employees, unless and to the extent the damage or loss resulting is covered under any policy of insurance of the District and such loss or damage is paid to or on behalf of District, pursuant to such insurance policy.

Foundation shall, as operator, decorate, maintain and keep in good order, condition and repair and replace as required the interior of the buildings, including electrical equipment, plumbing and sprinkler systems applicable to the buildings, if any, installed therein, glass, carpeting, window coverings, furnishings or fixtures, with glass, carpeting, window coverings, furnishings or fixtures of the same of similar quality.

- Gardens, with the District as an additional named insured, the cost of which shall be an operating expense. The minimum insurance District expects Foundation to carry is (i) property insurance covering the current value of the buildings and other improvements at the Gardens (but not including plants) and (ii) liability insurance with a coverage of \$150,000 per person and \$600,000 per occurrence. Foundation shall also carry Worker's Compensation and Unemployment Compensation Insurance and any other insurance required to comply fully with Laws of the State of Colorado.
- 11. ACCOUNTING. It is expected that Foundation will be subject to the financial policies and practices of District to the extent applicable and as required. District shall have the authority, without limitations, to review and audit all accounting records; including banking relations, investments, liabilities, cash controls, obligations, dispositions, checks, creditor's statements and invoices, accounts receivables, claims, financially related correspondence, etc. to assure compliance and propriety of all such transactions. However, the obligations for complying with all such policies, sound financial practices, and record retention shall remain the duty and obligation of Foundation.
- 12. <u>LIENS</u>. Foundation agrees that it will pay or cause to be paid all costs for work done by it on the buildings or the Gardens, and Foundation will keep the Gardens free and clear of all mechanic's liens.
- 13. ASSIGNMENT. Foundation shall not sell, assign, or otherwise transfer any of Foundation's interest in this Agreement or in the Gardens without prior written consent of District.

14. <u>NOTICES</u>. All notices, demands and requests which may be or are required to be given by either party to the other shall be in writing to:

- 15. <u>UTILITIES</u>. Foundation agrees to pay as all utility charges in the form of gas, electricity, and other utility charges that apply to the Gardens and where possible to have said utilities be in Foundation's name.
- 16. PERSONAL PROPERTY. Foundation has retained all of its assets not shown on Exhibits A and B ("Retained Assets" including those reflected on Exhibit D). The Retained Assets shall continue to be owned and managed by Foundation and assets acquired by Foundation in the future shall be owned and managed by Foundation, all consistent with the terms of this MANAGEMENT AGREEMENT, to the extent such assets relate to or become affixed to the Gardens.
- 17. <u>INSPECTION REPORTS</u>. Foundation agrees to provided District copies of any and all inspection reports developed by governmental entities with authority over the Gardens.
- 18. <u>OTHER PROVISIONS</u>. Foundation will exercise its best efforts to advertise and promote the operation and its services to its potential customers and donors.

This contract shall be interpreted by Colorado law. If any portion of this contract shall be deemed to be unenforceable, such unenforceability shall not affect the balance of this Agreement.

PROTOCOLS AND STANDARDS OF CONDUCT

Adopted 02/02/2016

I. Purpose and Intent

The Charter of the City of Littleton provides the founding document for all issues concerning protocols and standards of conduct as a primary reference, and the City of Littleton is committed to maintaining high ethical standards. The City operates in a representative democracy to serve the citizens of Littleton and ensure the community's needs are met. Public servants have a special responsibility to carry out their duties with integrity. In order to preserve the confidence and trust of the public, the Protocol and Standards of Conduct provides uniform rules to guide the conduct of the City's Council and board and commission members, hereinafter referred to as Boards.

Non-substantive changes to this document may be made and then distributed to Council.

II. Meeting Protocols

- A. Public input and observation are an important part of the democratic process. Council/Boards should make the public feel welcome and should refrain from showing any sign of partiality, prejudice or disrespect toward an individual participating in or attending a public forum. Members of City Council/Boards should be made to be fair and impartial in listening to public testimony. City Council will be accepted any written comments if they include the name and address of the sender. Comments to be included in City Council's packets will be sent to the City Clerk no later than 1:00 p.m. on the Thursday before the Tuesday meeting. If there are issues that need to be addressed after packets are distributed, the correspondence received by the City Clerk by noon on the Monday before a public hearing and disseminated to City Council via email and will be collated; any documents received after the 12:00 p.m. on the day of a Council meeting will be disseminated the night of the City Council meeting.
- B. Council expects civility among and between Council, Boards, and members of the public while in meetings. Disrespectful behavior will not be tolerated. Any person who makes offensive, insulting, threatening, insolent, slanderous or obscene remarks or becomes boisterous or who makes threats against any person or against public order and security while in the Council Chamber shall be removed at the direction of the Mayor from the meeting, unless permission to remain is granted by the majority vote of the Council members present.

- C. Council/Boards should show respect for each other at all times. Disagreement and debate are constructive and expected. An effective Council/Board is composed of members who are able to agree to disagree without personalizing issues.
- D. Members of the Council/Boards and the public are expected to refrain from sidebar conversations to the greatest extent possible so as not to detract from the speaker who has the floor.
- E. Because scheduled meetings are the intended forum for public debate and dialog, Council expects all Council/Board members to keep an open mind without prejudgment, to work collaboratively to identify promising options, to openly discuss and evaluate options, and to listen to the concerns of other Council/Boards prior to making a decision. Additionally, it should be understood that acknowledgement of individual opinions and ideas, especially those that differ from one's own, is what allows the best discussion and decision for the community.
- F. Council/Boards are expected to attend meetings having reviewed all the materials and to be prepared to ask questions, make comments, and discuss all issues.
- G. To attain efficiency, Council/Boards should simply state, "I agree" rather than restating a point.
- H. Council/Boards should ask the Mayor/Chair to intervene if discussion on agenda becomes repetitive.
- I. Council/Boards should consider the best interests of the City and the ramifications to all the citizens and businesses while considering issues.
- J. Council/Boards should refrain from undermining the Council/Board as a whole or undermining an individual member. Members should feel comfortable communicating the reasoning for their voting decision. However, after the decision has been made, the member should support the decision of the body and move forward.
- K. It is improper during roll call for any Council/Board members to state or attempt to state the vote or sentiments of any absent Council/Board member.
- L. Any Council/Board member who is unable to attend a scheduled meeting shall notify the Mayor/Chair or City Manager at least 24 hours in advance of said meeting, if possible.
- M. Council/Boards agree to bring non-substantive changes to items on the agenda to staff outside of a public meeting and retain substantive items for public discussion with Council/Board.
- N. The City Council is responsible for making policy. The City staff is responsible for implementing policy. Council members and staff should understand the difference between creating policy and implementing policy and be respectful and supportive of each

- role. In the development of policy recommendations to the City Council, alternatives should be evaluated and addressed by staff.
- O. The City Council desires to have all City Council, Planning Board, Historic Preservation Board, Board of Adjustment, Board of Appeals, and Licensing Authority regular, special, and study meetings televised and recorded. When creating any working groups or committees, the City Council shall determine whether the purpose of the committee warrants its meetings being recorded and televised.

III. Confidential Information

Confidential information shall not be disclosed to anyone other than City Council, Boards or City staff whose official duties are related to the subject matter of the confidential information. This protocol shall not be construed as prohibiting the City Manager and City Attorney from distributing confidential information to the extent reasonably necessary to implement Council direction.

IV. Making Public Statements

- A. When giving a written or oral personal public opinion concerning issues facing or involving the City, all Council, Board or Commission members shall refrain from making statements on behalf of the City or the body upon which he or she serves, unless such person has explicitly been authorized by the respective body. When acting as, or perceived as acting as, a representative of the official body he or she represents, an individual must always uphold the approved Council, Board or Commission point of view.
- B. Any comments made by a Council/Board member at a meeting of another board should be assumed to be the Council/Board member's personal views or opinions and not the official position of the Council/Board unless stated otherwise.
- C. Council reports are intended to communicate to other Council members about meetings and information that are of value and beneficial to the body as a whole.

V. Council/Boards and City Employee Communications

A. To foster open communication and the public policy-decision making process, it is the desire of Council to ensure an evenness of communication between Council/Boards and staff as well as between Council/Board members. This means all Council/Board members expect to receive information that is relevant to the Council/Board's policymaking authority and deliberations as well as to the education and knowledge of individual members.

- B. All City Council and Board and Commission members shall use city email for email communication on any city issues.
- C. Council/Boards should seek direction from the City Manager if there is any doubt regarding the appropriate level of contact with City employees.
- D. Council/Boards should make reasonable attempts to notify the appropriate City staff members in advance of public meetings about key questions and discussion points that they would like addressed during the public meeting.
- E. For routine questions or requests (e.g., code complaints, questions regarding agenda items), Council/Boards should contact the City Manager's Office or the appropriate City department director with information about the request. These requests can be made at any time rather than waiting for a formal referral at a Council/Board meeting. It is the responsibility of staff to ensure an evenness of information when questions are asked of staff that relate to an issue that might come before the Council/board and disseminate information accordingly. Legal questions should be initiated through the Deputy City Attorney whenever possible and appropriate.
- F. Requests for additional information or reports that staff determines would take a significant amount of staff time/resources shall be referred to the City Manager for review and possible consideration by the Council/Boards as a whole and agreed upon as something that merits an investment of City resources.
- G. Critical comments about specific City employees' performance should only be made to the City Council appointees that include the City Manager, the City Attorney and the municipal judge through correspondence or conversation outside the public setting.
- H. All Boards shall be given sufficient and reasonable advance notice of a Council meeting for which the Board either will be the subject of an agenda item or is being requested to participate in the Council meeting agenda, allowing for scheduling and preparation.

VI. Involvement in Administrative Functions

- A. Members of Council/Boards shall refrain from influencing the recommendations made by staff or the information provided by staff to the Council/Board as a whole.
- B. Members of Council/Boards should have the same information for decision-making purposes. The Council/Boards may expect staff to provide each member with identical information on items scheduled for deliberation, even when requested by only one member.

VII. Council Conduct with Boards and Commissions

- A. The City Council has established several Boards and Commissions as a means of gathering more community input. Citizens who serve on most Boards or Commissions are advisors to the City Council. They are a valuable resource to the City's leadership and should be treated with appreciation and respect. Council members should refrain from having any ex parte communications with Boards concerning issues and/or applications before any quasi-judicial body. Council communication with Boards shall be solely through a joint work session or through Council liaisons as set forth below.
- B. Since the attendance of three or more Council members constitutes a legal Council meeting, Council members should advise the City Clerk at least 24 hours in advance of their planned attendance, or at another function where discussion of City business is anticipated so that appropriate and timely public notification can be prepared and posted.

VIII. Council Meetings with Boards and Commissions

- A. To elevate the communication between individual Boards and Council and to even the flow of information, the Council may meet with the Council-appointed Boards at a Study Session at least yearly, or on an as-needed basis as requested by the Board/Commission or the City Council.
- B. To facilitate positive relations between the Boards and the Council, the Mayor may appoint a Council liaison to the Fine Arts Board, Library Board, and Museum Board. The Council may, at its sole discretion, choose to appoint liaisons to other Boards and Commissions as it deems appropriate. The role of the liaison shall be to convey current and relevant information on Council activities to the individual Board or Commission; to provide input as requested; and generally provide a conduit of Council activity and actions.

IX. Council/Board and Commission Conduct With the Public

- A. Council/Boards should be cordial, welcoming, and respectful to the public in all situations.
- B. Council/Boards should be welcoming and respectful to speakers without exception.
- C. If necessary, public comments received during a public meeting will be followed up by staff at a later time or as directed by the Council/Board. It is not anticipated nor expected for staff to respond during that meeting unless specifically requested by the Council/Board.
- D. Questions from the Council/Board to speakers should seek to clarify or expand information. Members should avoid challenging or criticizing speakers. If a speaker is off the topic or exhibits behavior or language that is disruptive or disrespectful, the Mayor

or Chair should interrupt, focus the speaker, and reestablish the order and decorum of the meeting.

X. Personal Expectations

A. Responsibility.

- 1. I understand that the community expects me to serve with dignity and respect and be an agent of the democratic process.
- 2. I avoid actions that might cause the public to question my independent judgment.
- 3. I do not use my office or the resources of the City for personal or political gain.
- 4. I am a prudent steward of public resources and actively consider the impact of my decisions on the financial and social stability of the City and its citizens.

B. Fairness.

- 1. I promote consistency, equity and non-discrimination in public agency decision-making.
- 2. I make decisions based on the merits of an issue, including research and facts.
- 3. I encourage diverse public engagement in decision-making processes and support the right of the public to have access to public information concerning the conduct of the City's business.

C. Respect.

1. I treat my fellow City officials, staff, commission members and the public with patience, courtesy, civility, and respect, even when we disagree on what is best for the community and its citizens.

D. Integrity.

- 1. I am honest with all elected officials, staff, commission members, boards, and the public.
- 2. I am prepared to make decisions for the best interest of the public whether those decisions are popular or not.
- 3. I take responsibility for my actions even when it is uncomfortable to do so.
