4. The plat shall provide utility easements requested by Public Service Company of Colorado/Xcel Energy.

Purpose and Recommendation

As previously reviewed with the Board and consistent with its earlier direction and authorization, a negotiated confidential settlement has been reached resolving all claims at issue in that pending civil rights lawsuit titled *Wyatt T. Handy and Ashlee M. Handy v. Mailroom Clerk Luenza #13083 and Unknown Mailroom Clerk*, Case No. 16-cv-02110-WYD-MEH, pending in the United States District Court. This report seeks the Board's final approval of the settlement and execution of the mutually approved Settlement Agreement and Full and Final release.

Background

The Handys commenced their lawsuit for monetary damages for alleged violations of civil rights as a result of Arapahoe County Detention Facility mailroom clerks rejecting mail in 2014-2015 that Wyatt Handy sent to Ashlee Handy while Ashlee was detained in the jail. The Handys allege violations of freedom of speech under the First Amendment and procedural due process under the Fourteenth Amendment. The suit has been vigorously contested.

Discussion

The settlement resolves all claims plaintiffs asserted or could have asserted related to the mail rejections and is being recommended for the Board's approval as an economically prudent and cost-saving resolution of those claims. The County and defendants being dismissed from the case under the terms of the settlement will not be admitting any liability or fault for any of the claims. The specific agreement terms are confidential and not to be shared beyond the parties.

Alternatives

Reject the settlement proposal and proceed with the defense on all claims.

Fiscal Impact

As discussed and authorized by the Board in previous discussions.

Recommendation

Request and Recommendation

Request the Board of County Commissioners to authorize the Chair of the Board of County Commissioners to sign an MOU with the State of Colorado (the State) to share vault space at the Deer Trail radio site.

Background

The State of Colorado provides a public safety communications capability via the statewide Digital Trunked Radio System (DTRS). Arapahoe County owns a radio communication site located in Deer Tail, CO, a part of the DTRS. The State will replace the existing Arapahoe County owned microwave path connecting Deer Trail & Zap (Bennett) sites to the DTRS, as well as add a microwave path from Deer Trail to a State owned radio site, creating a microwave loop for better system redundancy and capacity.

Links to Align Arapahoe

Sharing space in the Deer Trail radio site with the State ensures we continue to provide quality of life and safety to the citizens of Arapahoe County while practicing fiscal responsibility.

Discussion

The State of Colorado is currently in the process of replacing all of its microwave radio systems throughout the state. At the same time it is augmenting the microwave systems to expand capacity and redundancy in the DTRS. This MOU is designed to establish a cooperative relationship in the operation of a joint communication system and communications sites. The sharing of communications facilities are actions that may substantially reduce costs and enhance communications for the State and the County.

The County acknowledges that the State is providing good and adequate consideration for the use of the towers and facilities by providing the benefit of shared public safety voice communications to public safety first responders and government agencies in Arapahoe County.

Alternatives

The alternative is for Arapahoe County to continue as we are currently and the State to find another alternative to add redundancy and capacity to the system.

Fiscal Impact

There is no adverse fiscal impact, as the State is fully funding the equipment and installation.

STATE OF COLORADO GOVERNOR'S OFFICE OF INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY (OIT) PUBLIC SAFETY COMMUNICATIONS NETWORK (PSCN)

For

SHARED COMMUNICATIONS SITE/S IN THE STATE OF COLORADO

1. Memorandum of Understanding (MOU):

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is entered into this ______day of ______, 201____, by and among the ARAPAHOE COUNTY BOARD of COMMISSIONERS on behalf of the ARAPAHOE COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE, located at 13101 E. BRONCOS PARKWAY, CENTENNIAL, CO, 80112, and the State of Colorado, Office of Information Technology, Public Safety Communications Network; 601 East 18th Avenue, Suite B100; Denver, Colorado 80203.

2. Purpose:

The Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office, hereinafter referred to as the "County", and the State, hereinafter referred to as the "State", and collectively hereinafter referred to as the "Parties", have entered into this MOU to set a framework for allowing the State to co-locate public safety communication equipment at one or more tower sites owned and operated by the County, and to share communication equipment for the support of public safety communications in Arapahoe County.

3. Statement of Mutual Interests and Benefits:

The State provides a public safety communications capability serving state agencies and participating federal and local government entities. As part of this responsibility, the State is seeking to improve reliability, redundancy and capacity of public safety communications in Arapahoe County. The County provides public safety communications for county public safety first responders and local government entities.

This MOU is designed to establish a cooperative relationship in the operation of a joint communication system and communications sites ("Site/s" as further defined herein). The sharing of communications facilities are actions that may substantially reduce costs and enhance communications for the State and the County. The County acknowledges that the State is providing good and adequate consideration for the use of the towers and facilities, as stated herein, by providing the benefit of shared public safety voice communications to public safety first responders and government agencies in Arapahoe County.

4. Parties Agree:

- 4.1 Each Party shall be responsible for engineering, providing, installing, operating, and maintaining the necessary equipment within its own system, except as specified in Exhibits attached to this MOU.
- 4.2 Unless specifically authorized, neither Party's employees, representatives, contractors or agents shall add, remove, modify, adjust, alter, install, or otherwise physically touch appliances, equipment or structures owned by the other Party without expressed written consent from the owner of the appliance, equipment or structure.
- 4.3 Future commercial use of tower sites will not be permitted if such commercial use interferes with the operation of County or State public safety emergency communications system/s.
- 4.4 The Parties will license and manage frequencies assigned to them in accordance with FCC regulations.
- 4.5 Parties shall coordinate to provide needed capacity in the form of facilities, antenna space, etc.
- 4.6 To the extent legally possible and within the legal control of the County, the State shall have access to the Site/s for equipment maintenance, repair, upgrade and replacement purposes at all times, twenty-four hours a day, 365 days a year, weather and safety permitting. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the State shall be responsible for obtaining its own vehicular access to the Site/s.
- 4.7 The State shall own, license, operate, monitor, maintain, and manage the State's public safety microwave radio network connecting the Deer Trail site to Zap and the Deer Trail site to Last Chance sites (collectively referred to as "Site/s" herein). The public safety microwave radio network is inclusive of microwave radios, antennas, rectifiers, batteries and associated equipment.
- 4.8 The State shall continue to own, license, operate, monitor, maintain, and manage the State purchased public safety Digital Trunked Radio System (hereinafter "DTRS") equipment located at the Site/s, where applicable.
- 4.9 Radio frequency interference caused or created by radio equipment owned, operated or maintained by either Party at the Site/s shall be considered an immediate threat to public safety and shall be immediately resolved by the interfering Party. All costs associated with the identification of radio frequency interference shall be borne by the interfering Party. Should harmful interference occur to either Party's equipment, the County and State will work together to identify the source of interference. If the State's equipment is determined to be the cause of interference, the State shall correct the problem and pay all costs associated with the remedy. If the County's equipment is determined to be the cause of the interference, the County shall correct the problem and pay all costs associated with the remedy.
- 4.10 Each Party shall notify the other Party 48 hours in advance, when possible, should it become necessary to temporarily sever an interconnection or to interrupt a circuit elsewhere in its system that would affect the operation of the other Party's equipment or circuits.

- 4.11 The State shall notify the County by calling the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office public safety dispatch center 24 hours prior to entry to the Site/s. It is understood that the possibility of unforeseen circumstances creating a public safety emergency may preclude the ability to provide the requested 24-hour notice, and immediate access to the Site/s may be necessary for protection of life and property.
- 4.12 The State shall be liable for losses arising from personal injury, death or property damage caused by the negligent or wrongful act or omission of any employee of OIT in accordance with the Colorado Government Immunity Act, §24-10-101 et seq., C.R.S., and Part 15, Article 30, Title 24, C.R.S. Nothing in this MOU shall be construed to waive, limit, or otherwise modify any governmental immunity that may be available by law to the State, its officials, employees, contractors, or agents, or any other person acting on behalf of the State and, in particular, governmental immunity afforded or available pursuant to the Colorado Governmental Immunity Act, Title 24, Article 10 of the Colorado Revised Statutes.
- 4.13 The County shall be liable for losses arising from personal injury, death or property damage caused by the negligent or wrongful act or omission of any employee of Arapahoe County in accordance with the Colorado Government Immunity Act, §24-10-101 et seq., C.R.S., and Part 15, Article 30, Title 24, C.R.S. Nothing in this MOU shall be construed to waive, limit, or otherwise modify any governmental immunity that may be available by law to the County, its officials, employees, contractors, or agents, or any other person acting on behalf of the County and, in particular, governmental immunity afforded or available pursuant to the Colorado Governmental Immunity Act, Title 24, Article 10 of the Colorado Revised Statutes.
- 4.14 The County shall maintain and keep current all property leases, rights-of-way, easements, permits, etc. relevant to the Site/s. The County grants permission to the State and its authorized employees, agents, and contractors to enter its associated buildings, towers, easements and rights-of-way to locate, install, inspect, test, operate, maintain, and remove the equipment provided for in this MOU; provided that proper advance arrangements are made with the Party owning such buildings, towers, easements and rights-of-way. This MOU does not grant any right, privilege, or interest in land.
- 4.15 Upon County request, State will provide a list of all frequency licenses issued by the National Telecommunications and Information Administration ('NTIA') or the Federal Communications Commission ('FCC') authorizing operation of State radio equipment at the Site/s.
- 4.16 Upon County request, State will submit a list of names of employees, representatives, contractors or agents requiring possible access to the Site/s.

5. Non-Fund Obligation Document

This instrument is neither a fiscal nor a funding obligation document. Any endeavor involving reimbursement or contribution of funds between Parties will be outlined in separate agreements.

6. No Third Party Beneficiary Rights:

Except as otherwise stated, this MOU shall inure to the benefit of and be binding only upon the Parties hereto and their respective successors and assigns. No third party beneficiary rights or benefits of any kind are expressly or impliedly provided herein.

7. Terms of MOU:

This MOU will become effective upon receipt of the last required signature and will remain in force for a period of twenty (20) years or until terminated upon one hundred and eighty (180) days written notice to the other Party of the intent to terminate. Either Party may propose changes to this MOU during its term. Such changes will be in the form of an amendment and will become effective upon signature by all Parties to the amendment. The term of this MOU may be extended upon mutual written agreement of the Parties.

8. Authorized Representatives of The Parties:

- 8.1 Each Party shall designate a representative who is authorized to act on its behalf with respect to those matters contained herein that are the functions and responsibilities of the authorized representatives of the Parties. Any Party may change the designation of its authorized representative upon oral notice given to the other, confirmed by written notice.
- 8.2 The authorized representatives shall not have the authority to change any of the terms or conditions of this MOU.

9. Insurance:

Each Party shall at its sole cost and expense, maintain insurance on or self-insure its inventory, equipment, and all other property associated with this equipment against loss resulting from fire or other casualty.

10. Control and Possession of Systems:

Each Party shall remain in exclusive control and possession of its own telecommunications system and equipment and this MOU shall not be construed to grant any Party any rights of ownership, control, or possession of the other Parties' systems or equipment, other than those, which may be specifically set forth herein or in exhibits hereto.

11. Non-dedication of Equipment:

The Parties do not intend to dedicate, and nothing in this MOU shall be construed as constituting a dedication by any Party of its rights, or equipment, or any part thereof, to the other Party or any customer or member of the other Party.

12. Uncontrollable Forces:

No Party shall be considered to be in default in performance of any of its obligations under this MOU when a failure of performance shall be due to an uncontrollable force. The term "uncontrollable force" means any cause beyond the control of the Party affected including, but not restricted to, failure or threat of failure of facilities, flood, earthquake, storm, fire, lightning, epidemic, war, riot, civil disturbance or disobedience, labor dispute, labor or material shortage, sabotage, restraint by court order or public authority or action or nonaction by, or failure to obtain the necessary authorizations or approvals from, any governmental County or authority, which by exercise of due diligence and foresight such Party could not reasonably have been expected to avoid and which by exercise of due diligence it shall be unable to overcome. Nothing contained herein shall be construed to require a Party to settle any strike or labor dispute in which it is involved. Either Party rendered unable to fulfill any obligation under this MOU by reason of uncontrollable force shall give prompt written notice of such fact to the other Party and shall exercise due diligence to remove such inability with all reasonable dispatch.

13. Notices:

Any notice, demand or request pursuant to this MOU herein shall be in writing and shall be considered properly given when delivered in person, sent by either registered or certified mail, or sent by national overnight delivery service, postage prepaid addressed to the other Party's principal offices.

Notices to the State shall be sent to State of Colorado, Office of Information Technology, Public Safety Communications Network; 601 East 18th Avenue, Suite B100; Denver, Colorado 80203.

Notices to the County shall be sent to the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office, attn.: Telecommunications Coordinator, 13101 E. Broncos Parkway, Centennial, CO. 80112.

14. Waivers:

Any waiver at any time by a Party to this MOU of its rights with respect to a default or any other matter arising under or in connection with this MOU shall not be deemed to be a waiver with respect to any subsequent default or matter.

15. Binding Obligations:

All of the obligations set forth in this MOU shall bind the Parties and their successors and assigns, and such obligations shall run with the Parties' rights, titles, interests, and with all of the interests of each Party to this MOU.

16. Effect of Section Headings:

Section heading titles appearing in this MOU are inserted for convenience only and shall not be construed as interpretations of text.

17. Governing Law:

This MOU shall be construed and interpreted in accordance with the Federal laws of the United States and laws of the State of Colorado.

Exhibit A

DEER TRAIL COMMUNICATIONS SITE ARAPAHOE COUNTY

A. At the DEER TRAIL site the County Shall:

- Provide space on the County owned tower for installation of ONE (1) cross pol microwave dish antenna 8' in diameter pointed to the ZAP site in Arapahoe County and ONE (1) microwave dish antenna 6' in diameter pointed to the State LAST CHANCE site in Washington County.
- 2. Maintain tower to industry standards.
- 3. Provide space in the County owned building for all necessary State radio equipment, as agreed upon by both parties. The equipment includes two (2) 7 foot racks for the DEER TRAIL to ZAP equipment, each rack with a footprint of 20" by 20 ½", and two (2) 7 foot racks for DEER TRAIL to LAST CHANCE microwave equipment each with a footprint of 20" by 20 ½".
- 4. Maintain building and air conditioning equipment.
- 5. Provide electric utilities to power and sustain the equipment at the site.
- 6. Maintain its own radios and associated equipment.
- 7. As site manager, approve new users of the site.
- 8. Establish MOU's with new users.
- 9. Provide and maintain backup generator to sustain equipment in the event of a commercial power outage, which includes fuel for the generator.
- B. At the DEER TRAIL site the State Shall:
 - 1. Own, license, operate, maintain, monitor and manage State owned radios and associated equipment, including all State owned microwave network equipment.
 - Remove County owned microwave radio antennas and ancillary equipment communicating with the ZAP site. All County owned microwave equipment remains the property of the County. When removed by the State, County owned equipment will be returned to the County for reuse or disposal, as the County deems proper.
 - 3. Purchase and install new microwave radios, antennas and ancillary equipment communicating with the ZAP and LAST CHANCE sites.
 - 4. Provide the County with bandwidth needs on the State microwave network equivalent to operational needs at the time of signing of this MOU.
 - 5. The State agrees to negotiate in good faith for future bandwidth capacity realized by the County, as those needs are identified.

6. In the event the County terminates, or otherwise allows the lease, permit, out grant, rights of way, easements, etc. to expire, the State reserves the unconditional right to remove all state owned assets and equipment from the site.

Purpose and Recommendation

Arrow Electronics, Inc. is requesting the Board to authorize the Chair to sign an Incentive Payment Agreement for refunds of 100% of the personal property taxes associated with the new business facilities located at 9151 E. Panorama Circle, Centennial, Colorado 80112. This Agreement is for 10 years and involves tax years 2018 – 2027. Arrow also requests to terminate two Incentive Payment Agreements between the County and Arrow Electronics Inc. dated January 26, 2010, for the location 24 Inverness Place East, Englewood, Colorado and March 29, 2013, for the location 181 Inverness Drive West, Englewood, Colorado effective as of December 31, 2018.

Background and Discussion

Pursuant to Section 30-11-123, CRS, the Board of County Commissioners has the authority to enter into agreements for refunds of personal property taxes levied for County purposes associated with new business facilities in the County or associated with existing business facilities that expand such that they qualify as "new" business facilities. The Board met with representatives of Denver South Economic Development Partnership and Arrow Electronics, Inc. at a study session and generally agreed to the concept of a new incentive payment agreement, subject to negotiating an acceptable contract. This agreement is a "standard" incentive payment agreement relating to a new business facility, is for a term of ten (10) years and involves a refund of 100% of the personal property taxes levied by the County.

Arrow Electronics Inc. is moving to a new facility within Arapahoe County and closing two other locations. Arrow Electronics Inc. desires to terminate two Incentive Payment Agreements for the two closing locations.

Alternatives

This is one of the few economic "incentives" available to a County.

Fiscal Impact

Obviously, this is a refund of taxes received by the County and it reduces the funds available for other County expenditures. The statute allows for the County to adjust its tax levy to recoup the total of all incentive payments; however, the Board has not made such an adjustment in previous years.

INCENTIVE PAYMENT AGREEMENT

This Incentive Payment Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into as of ______, 20___, by and between the Board of County Commissioners of the County of Arapahoe, State of Colorado (the "County") and Arrow Electronics, Inc., a New York Corporation (the "Taxpayer").

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of Sec. 30-11-123, C.R.S., the County has the authority to negotiate for incentive payments or credits with taxpayers who establish new business facilities or who expand existing business facilities; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to this legislation, a county and a taxpayer may negotiate a contract for an incentive payment or a credit from a county to a taxpayer relating to the new or expanded business facilities; and

WHEREAS, the County and the Taxpayer previously entered into an Incentive Payment Agreement dated January 26, 2010, for the location 24 Inverness Place East, Englewood, Colorado and an Incentive Payment Agreement dated March 29, 2013, for the location 181 Inverness Drive West, Englewood, Colorado (the Previous Incentive Agreements"); and

WHEREAS, the Taxpayer plans to consolidate its operations at a new location and terminate the Previous Incentive Agreements after December 31, 2018 in order to allow for possible incentive payment for tax year 2017 paid in 2018; and

WHEREAS, the County and the Taxpayer desire to negotiate a contract regarding a new business facility.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS AGREED by the County and the Taxpayer as follows:

1. The Incentive Payment Agreement between the County and the Taxpayer dated January 26, 2010, for the location 24 Inverness Place East, Englewood, Colorado and the Incentive Payment Agreement between the County and the Taxpayer dated March 29, 2013, for the location 181 Inverness Drive West, Englewood, Colorado will hereby be terminated as of December 31, 2018.

2. The Taxpayer will establish new business facilities as defined in Section 39-30-105 (7)(e), C.R.S. in the City of Centennial, a municipality in Arapahoe County, Colorado. This new business facility is/will be located at 9151 East Panaroma Circle, Centennial Colorado 80122. The purposes and functions of this new business facility include Global Shared Service Operations, IT, IoT, America's sales operations, and America's back office support.

3. The Taxpayer shall comply with all of the provisions of Sections 39-5-107 and 39-5-108, C.R.S., concerning the filing of personal property schedules associated with the taxable personal property located at or within such new business facility and used in connection with the operation of such new business facility.

4. Prior to any payment from the County, the Taxpayer shall invoice the County by June 15th, begining in the year 2019 for the incentive payment and provide the County with the Taxpayer's tax statement, appropriate documentation of proof of payment of the County business personal property tax.

5. Upon completion of Paragraph 4 above, the County shall make an annual incentive payment, to the Taxpayer, which payment shall equal one hundred percent (100%) of the amount of taxes levied by the County for the County mill levy upon the <u>taxable personal</u> <u>property</u> directly attributable to such new business, located at or within such new business facility and used in connection with the operation of such new business facility. This incentive payment relates to the tax levied only by the Board of County Commissioners of Arapahoe County for county government and not to any other tax levied by another taxing entity.

6. These incentive payments to the Taxpayer shall be made by the County on or about September 1 of each year for ten (10) years, beginning in 2019, as set forth in Exhibit A, provided the Taxpayer has paid, and is therefore not delinquent in the payment of, its property taxes, and the Taxpayer has complied with the provisions of this Agreement.

7. The County shall inform the municipality, in which the Taxpayer's new business facility is located, of this Agreement. The Taxpayer shall be responsible for negotiating separate incentive payment agreements with the affected municipality.

8. The term of this Agreement shall commence as of the date written above for tax year 2018 collected in 2019, and shall expire ten (10) years later, after the 2027 tax year with taxes collected in 2028.

9. Pursuant to Section 29-1-110, C.R.S., financial obligations of the County payable as set forth herein after the current fiscal year are contingent upon funds for that purpose being appropriated, budgeted and otherwise made available. This Agreement may be terminated on January 1 as to any fiscal year for which funds are not appropriated. The County shall give the Taxpayer written notice of such nonappropriation.

10. The Taxpayer shall not assign or transfer its interest in this Agreement without the written consent of the County, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld. Any unauthorized assignment or transfer shall render this Agreement null, void and of no effect as to the County.

11. This Agreement may not be modified, amended or otherwise altered unless mutually agreed upon in writing by the parties hereto.

12. In the event of default of any provision of this Agreement by the Taxpayer, the County will provide 30 days written notice to the Taxpayer to cure said default. If said default is not so cured within the 30-day period, this Agreement may be terminated by the County without further notice. In the event of termination by the County, no damages, liquidated or otherwise, shall inure to the benefit of the Taxpayer. In the event of termination, no refunds of previous payments shall be required of Taxpayer. Taxpayer loses on it prospective payment benefits.

13. Unless otherwise agreed in writing, this Agreement and the interpretation thereof shall be governed by the laws of the State of Colorado.

14. Should any provision of this Agreement be determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional or otherwise null and void, it is the intent of the parties hereto that the remaining provisions of this Agreement shall be of full force and effect.

15. Notices to be provided under this Agreement shall be given in writing either by hand delivery, or deposited in the United States mail, certified mail, return receipt requested, with sufficient postage, to the following persons:

16. This Agreement represents the entire and integrated agreement between the parties and supersedes all prior negotiations and representations whether written or oral. Nothing herein shall be deemed to create any contractual relationship, either express or implied, between the Taxpayer and any other consultant or contractor or material supplier to Arapahoe County. Nothing herein shall be deemed to give anyone not a party to this Agreement any right of action against a party which does not otherwise exist without regard to this Agreement.
